

BUILD RESIDENT DIES FROM INJURIES DUE TO IMPACT OF AUTO

A. G. Webb Struck Down on Street Passes Away Three Hours Later; Manslaughter Charge is Filed.

Charge of manslaughter was sworn to by D. A. Webb, 50 of A. G. Webb, Monday afternoon and filed with Probate Judge C. A. Hill, who bound a warrant thereon. The complaint charges that a man-alcohol, in a drunken condition and at a reckless rate of speed, struck and killed Webb, who was riding in a Chevrolet coupe that hit the curb and overturned on the roadway, and the driver, who was charged with driving on for an instant, and then drove on leaving his victim lying upon the pavement.

The driver of the car was arrested though one is said to be Charley Davis, farm hand southwest of Twin Falls. Webb was killed up after the accident and hurried to the hospital in Twin Falls, where medical assistance was given him but he died Sunday night. He is survived by his widow, three sons and a daughter.

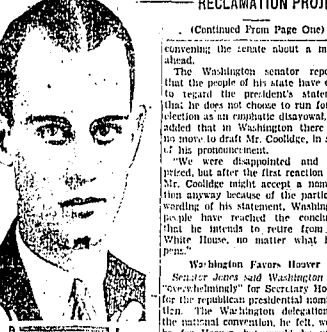

AMERICAN LEGION CONVENTION CALLS 'NANKES TO PARIS'

For 20,000 Men and Women Who Suffered Their Utmost in World War Paris is Once Again Capitol of World.

PARIS, Aug. 29.—For 20,000 American men and women who offered their utmost to their country in the world war, Paris has again become the capital of the world.

A band playing, larger than was ever gathered before in a crusade for peace has turned toward France under the banner of the American Legion to commemorate the first anniversary of the United States in the world war.

For some the precise invasion of Paris will be the occasion of the child's first visit to the experiences of a decade ago. But Paris will unfold her flags for the first time to a throng of veterans and their men who got no nearer the western front than American communities.

The inauguration of the Legion to its present headquarters in Paris is under way. It began August 10, when the vanguard sailed from New York. It will reach the city on August 31 and September 10, when 16 steamships will sail from New York, New Orleans, Honolulu and other ports.

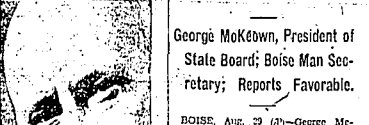

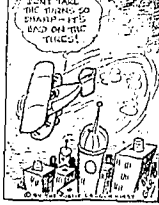

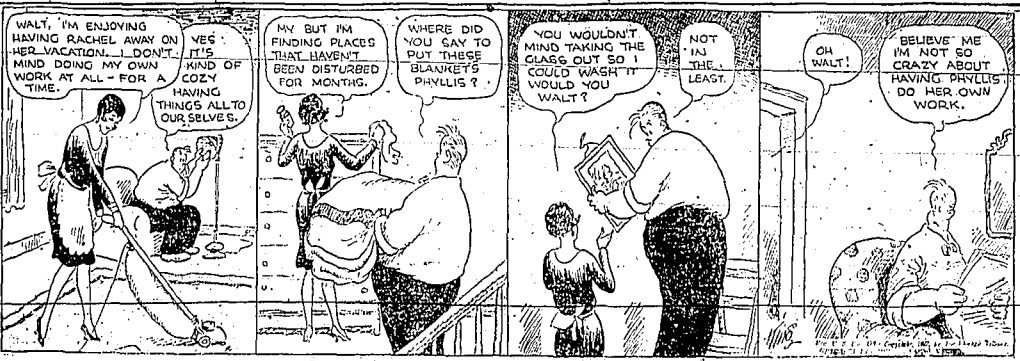

Our opportunities, Bishop Richardson asserted, are multiplied 100 fold and as our opportunities grow, so do our responsibilities to meet the larger needs of our day.

FRENCH HUMORISTS SAY MURDER WITH PISTOLS, SAFE WAY

Code Strictly Forbids Strangling One's Wife, Chopping Her Into Pieces or Using Poison to End Her Life.

By The Associated Press PARIS, Aug. 29.—French humorists are beginning to insist that the safest way to commit murder is with a pistol.

More than 1000 have expressed their opinions in recent years have been in the opinion of a number who have said pistols are still enjoying life and freedom.

Commenting upon this, Maurice Perle of the Parisian says it has become an established custom that the proper manner of committing a crime is to shoot, like wearing clothes, after dinner at the dining table.

"It is strictly forbidden to strangle a wife or a rival in love, or to give them a dose of cyanide or arsenic. But the revolver remains authorized."

Urges Stating Fires PARIS, Aug. 29.—The sight of fire apparatus whirling through the streets is a common sight in France.

One serious fire paper has suggested that wooden huts be put in the streets to be set fire every now and then, in order to provide amusement for the public and a rest of sleep for the firemen.

"In the villages where wooden houses are almost unknown, there is indeed a rare thing. Sometimes there exist on the one end of the year to the other. But the 'pumpers' and the public have their fun just the same, every year a day is set aside just to test the speed of the volunteers, who hustle from home and workshop to pull the pump to the scene of the blaze."

French Bulldog Truck PARIS, Aug. 29.—A big truck that carries its load off the ground and carries it underneath the chassis is saving time and labor in French industrial plants.

The chassis and motor stand seven feet high, on four legs that carry the wheels. There is a clearance of five feet under the framework and four feet-eight-inches under the motor.

The truck is run over the load, which is set a few inches off the ground. The operator, like hands, raises under the weight to be carried, and they are elevated by the motor power, and the truck then carries its load.

Is New French Sport PARIS, Aug. 29.—Automobile racing is a new sport shortly to be demonstrated in a match to shortly here and Andre Mercur in an automobile.

Mercur, in trials, has sent his engine the jumps with ease and without accident. His highest jump recently was 67 feet, during which his car rose seven feet above the ground.

TEST OUTLINED IN REPORT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—Results of a scientific test to determine the relative merits of the silk and rayon stockings are set forth in a report made to the American Home Economics association.

The tests carried on at Iowa State College covered nine brands of hose in two weights worn for more than a year under as nearly uniform conditions of wear and handling as possible. They indicated that service-weight silk hose gave nearly twice the wear of rayon. Rayon gave one-half the wear of service-weight silk and about equal wear as compared with chiffon. The cost of rayon is about one-half that of silk.

All hose tested were fast to perspiration, but not to washing and sunbight. There were practically no differences or similarities in life. The better brands contained little weighting, but much crimp.

Handing—stainability—elasticity—decreased by exposure to sunlight, but greatly decreased by perspiration. Laundering did not injure the appearance of silk hose, but made rayon less lustrous, looser in weave and harsher in texture.

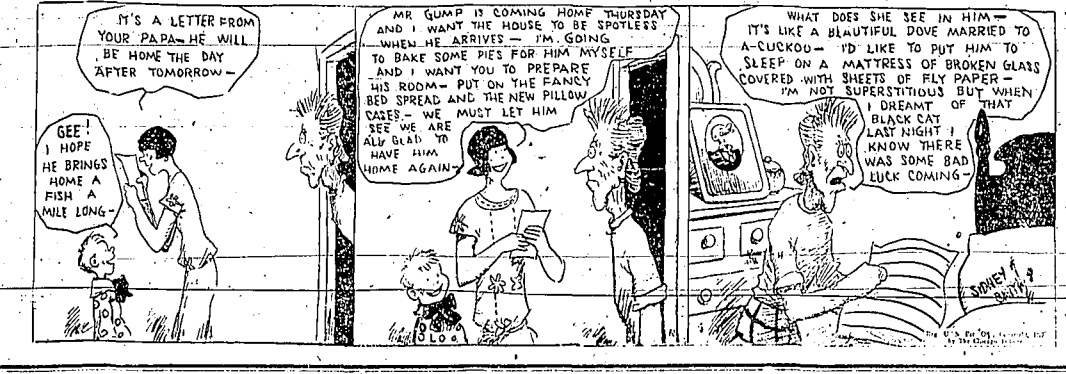
