BUYING MOVEMENT LED BY SPECULATORS

CHICAGO, Aug. 30 (AP)—Speculators are buying wheat today, and prices rallied strongly at the close. A turn for the worse in Canadian wheat prices was reported as the day drew to an end. 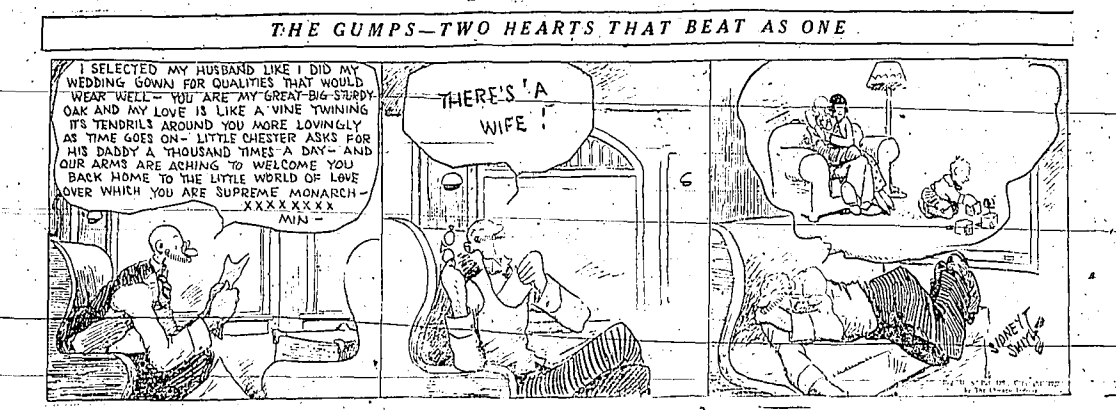

Dudley and the prosecuting attorney sought to have the case finished last evening, but Mr. Dunn said he had two witnesses who had been unable to testify, whose testimony might be important in view of developments in the state's case, and he would finish in a short time in the morning.
