SOUTH IDAHO FOLKS PLEASE FAREWELL FOR PRESIDENT COOLIDGE

Rapid City Recounts Events of Summer as Time for Chief Executive's Departure for Nation's Capital Approaches.

(By The Associated Press) RAPID CITY, S. D., Sept. 8.—With a week this is planned to be nearly the whole of this gateway to the Black Hills, to the people of Rapid City bid goodbye to President Coolidge tomorrow in a way that they hope will show their appreciation for the summer White House. The White House fire will ring to tell the people the time has arrived for them to go to the high noon of their life. Coolidge has had his private office. The stores and factories have been asked to close for three quarters of the year. The people will make a speech and the president was expected to respond briefly.

Rapid City Grateful As the time comes for the departure for Washington, Rapid City folks are counting on the events of the summer and what they have meant to them. John B. Green associated with the number of commerce, put it into words in this way: "The visit of the presidential party has meant much to Rapid City, viewed from any angle. It is the highest honor that could be offered us and we are grateful." "Among other phases we want to regard a president of the United States as a very likable human being. We have met most of the official party and were very much interested in them. Through our friends, the correspondents, we have seen our region in a new light. More than that, we have seen the previous fortune in the past year and we appreciate it. The people are very much interested in the 'flashed-on-eyes' screen in the country."

City Wants Chief to Return. "The people here want the president to enjoy his sojourn here and derived great benefit from it. We are pleased to have him here and we are sure that the honors and benefits that accrue to us from his recognition, and because we are sure that the president will return."

Mr. Coolidge received a large number of persons today to shake hands and confer with them. The people were lined for either today or tomorrow.

After leaving the executive offices, he motored to the state school of mines, which is located here, and inspected its laboratories and the experiments it is making in the interest of the student mining. The Black Hills are rich in minerals of many sorts and has the largest mine in the world.

Announcement was made today that the degree of doctor of science would be conferred on the president.

RAILWAY ANNOUNCES OFFER TO COMPETITOR

Head of Northern Pacific Road Outlines Terms to Be Presented to Milwaukee Road.

PORTLAND, Sept. 8.—President Charles Donnelly, Milwaukee Pacific railway, today outlined the terms under which the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railway would be offered a joint use of tracks to enter Portland from Spokane and Tacoma. The offer includes rights on the Spokane, Portland and Seattle line.

First—The Milwaukee to pay one-half of the annual interest charges on capital investment in the tracks to be used jointly. Annual interest charges would be computed on the basis of five per cent. The Milwaukee to be accorded entire equality in all respects between Spokane and Portland. It should have the same rights that a joint owner would have. Will Consider Other Issues. If the Milwaukee wants to compete for traffic with the Northern Pacific tracks between Tacoma and Portland, already shared with the Great Northern and the Union Pacific system, Northern Pacific would be glad to consider the proposition of extending the use of the tracks to the Milwaukee on the same terms that it is shared by the three roads," according to Donnelly. The terms of the offer include the division of the annual interest charges on the capital investment between the parties. The Milwaukee to pay one-half of the annual maintenance charges on the line on the basis of the actual use of the particular line, and equal rights to all participating lines. These terms do not provide for sharing terminal facilities. The Milwaukee would have to acquire its own facilities in Portland.

Potato Ration Per Citizen to Be Low

CHICAGO, Sept. 8.—(AP)—Potatoes, though everybody will have to get along with less than two and two-thirds bushels of potatoes per capita this season. A report from the government bureau of agricultural economics says that if the United States potato crop amounts to but 11,000,000 bushels as it was estimated, the quantity available for ration purposes may be only 8,700,000 bushels. Assuming a population of 110,000,000 persons, approximately 218,000,000 bushels would be required for food at the rate of two and two-thirds per capita, which has been assumed as the correct quota.

PRIME MOVEMENT SLOW BOISE, Sept. 8.—(AP)—Movement of Idaho grapes to the national markets this year is slower than in previous years. It is comparatively slow at present because of present low quotations for the season's crop. Growers hope the demand will improve and prices increase if the shipper can get in more fruit.

Five Inches of Rain Falls in Spring-Canyon; Streets of Price Are Transformed Into Rivers; Citizens Leave Homes.

(By The Associated Press) PRICE, Utah, Sept. 8.—(AP)—Heavy rain, already here for three days, fell in Spring Canyon, Utah, today, and five inches of rain fell in Price, Utah, today. Streets were transformed into rivers, causing considerable property loss and the closing of many camps in the nearby canyons from their homes. A considerable number of the damage done by the rain was to the highway. One main highway was washed out. The Grand Western railway tracks washed away. A new channel in the Price river cut through the city.

Kansas City Pays New Top Price for Cattle

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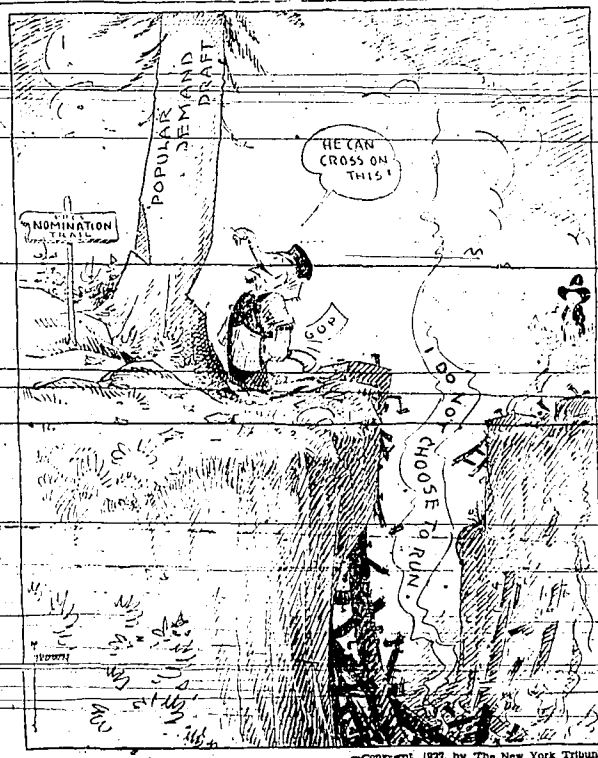
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BYRD FORESEES AIR LINES ACROSS OCEAN WITH AID OF SCIENCE

Radio Direction Finders, Fog Penetrating Devices, and Paralyzing Flares Some of Contrivances Which Will Help Flyers.

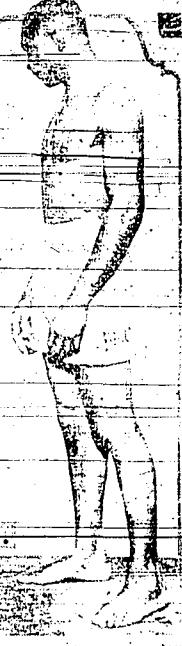

### MIDWAY GAMES IN LINE OF ATTACK IN PENDING LITIGATION

#### Ministerial Association Takes Lead in Action for Suppression of Devices Alleged to Violate Terms of State Law

None of the games on the midway at Twin Falls county fair have been cited by Sheriff M. E. Finch as in violation of the state law. On the other hand, it was stated, the sheriff has never inspected all of the games and other attractions on the midway, and on the second occasion early Wednesday afternoon he and Deputies C. E. Jones and W. S. Brown visited out to the operators of some of the games, their judgment as to compliance with the law in prohibiting the operation of games of chance, certain of the knowledge were held against them.

#### Sheriff to Slew Complaints

Indications had seemed pointed to launching order of an attempt to close some of the games and to prosecute the operators. On the strength of representations made during the day by members of the Ministerial Association and other persons, O. W. Whelan, county attorney, caused a minority of complaints to be drafted. The same complaints were to be filed out of Justice of the Peace John E. Dashiell's court in Twin Falls. Evidence of the complaint was being held up late last night for inclusion of more detailed information required by the magistrate.

Information that was in conference with the prosecuting attorney for a long time during the afternoon and evening, while the complaint was being drafted included Rev. H. G. Humphreys of the Methodist church, Rev. A. C. Pearson of the Presbyterian church, Rev. C. C. Curtis of the Christian church, Rev. C. W. Rank of the Methodist churches, and J. E. Hubbard, all of Twin Falls. Rev. J. Elliott, pastor of the Christian church, and Buhl and Kimberly, spent the afternoon on the midway, apparently an interested observer of the several attractions.

#### Midway Closes Temporarily

The entire midway, with the exception of "hot dog" stands, closed down for an hour or more Wednesday afternoon, following the sheriff's visitation, operators of the ferris wheel and other rides and the side shows called a strike in sympathy with the operators of the game that the sheriff had declared illegal.

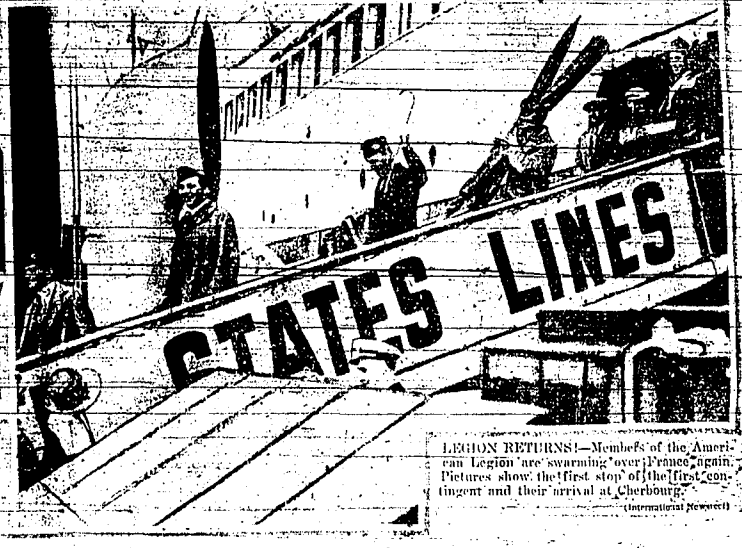
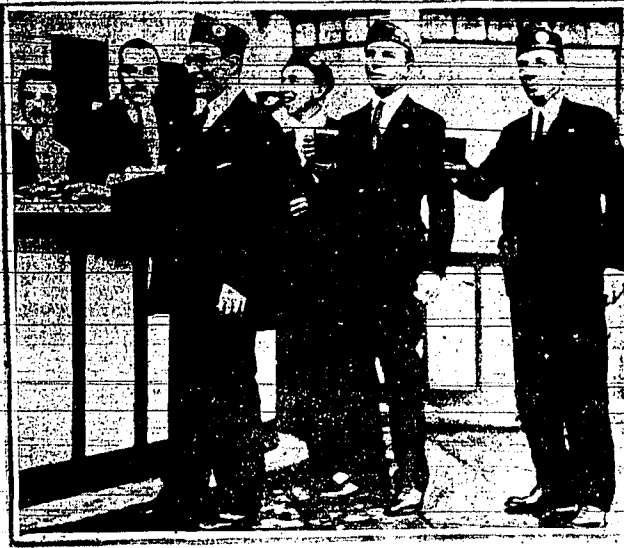

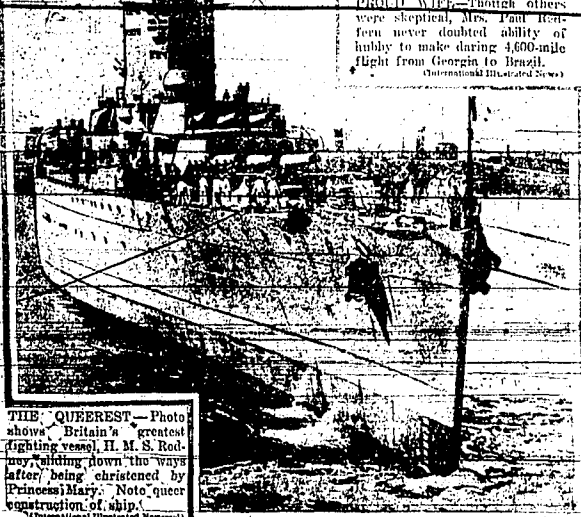

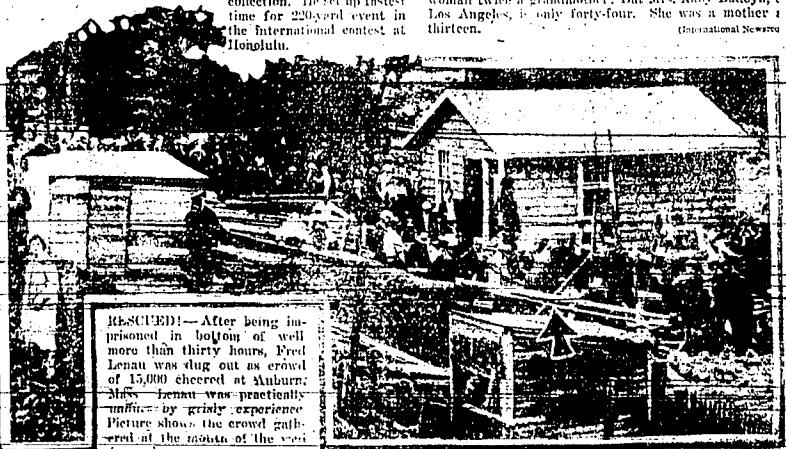

### REDFERN SIGHTED OVER VAST SWAMP

#### Orinoco Delta Above Which Airman Is Reported to Have Been Seen, Is Marshy Region.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—The Orinoco Delta, above which Paul Redfern, Newark, Georgia, aviator, reported to have been seen, is reported to have been sighted in a vast low-lying region of tropical swamps heavily wooded and intersected by numerous outlets of the Orinoco, says a bulletin from the Washington, D. C. headquarters of the National Geographic Society.

The triangular delta, which is embraced between two great branches of the great river is about 700 square miles in extent. It lies on the coast of Venezuela just south of the island of Trinidad and about 1000 miles north of the equator. The area which the Georgia aviator is reported to have been seen, is the chief town. Going to the Sun, is the nearest to the equator. The climate is hot and the country thinly populated.

Swamp Obsolete Land Built up

"The delta has been built up by the deposit of sediment brought down by the Orinoco, which is ranked among the 10 largest river systems of the world, and the third largest stream in South America. It has several main mouths and about 40 smaller ones which discharge muddy, fresh water into the Atlantic ocean. The main mouth empties into the Gulf of Paria, between Trinidad and Venezuela, the freshwater of which is noted by Columbus in his voyage of 1498.

"These outlets are connected by a series of narrow canals or backwaters, few of which are navigable on account of sand and jungle obstructions. The main channels, however, are navigable to steamers which continue to the very foot of the Andes mountains. Communication is carried on largely by water since tropical jungles and swamp lands obstruct land traffic.

"The Orinoco Delta is one of the landmarks on the northern coast of South America between Port of Spain, on the island of Trinidad, and the coast of British Guiana, a narrow isthmus which lies the air route to the Amazon valley in Brazil.

Little Change in Centuries

"The forestation of the delta is so heavy that floating logs and vegetation form embankments. The current is strong enough to change the channel of the stream. Much of the country is continually flooded, and the region presents difficulties of land travel that have hitherto prevented development. Coosa is the chief article of trade with the outside world.

"Most of the inhabitants of the Orinoco Delta are Indians, friendly, but extremely poor, without resources to develop their rich delta lands. They dwell on plantation clearings where they raise tropical fruits and vegetables of all kinds. This diet is supplemented by a great variety of fish as well as turtles.—These Indians are famous for their giant canoes made of single logs.

"The delta of the Orinoco was first explored by Spanish adventurers of the sixteenth century, who have left small traces of their influence. Most of these Indians died of fever and hardships, but such as returned to Spain electrified the country with their tales of creper, untamed jungles, alligators, gorgeous plumed flamings, and black silent rain forests. One of the most romantic figures connected with the region was Sir Walter Raleigh, who sailed up the Orinoco in search of the mythical land of El Dorado. The physical aspect of the country has changed very little to the present day."

### QUIET LIFE LED BY NEW PEARL CENTER OF WORLD

#### La Paz Possesses Something of Elusive Sheen of Famous French Industry at New York

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—La Paz, Mexico, the pearl center of the New World, has something of the softness and elusive sheen of its famous French counterpart. The pearl fishing industry here is a quiet life in the little city as it flows through a same, that sleep content, toward the end of the long peninsula of Lower California.

In as far as its pearls are concerned, the National Geographic society believes La Paz has fallen upon its days. The world was ruffled some years ago by the discovery of a recently the little post-war purchasing of luxuries has died down in the "Wild West" days. The pearl divers of seamen put out from their harbors, each with its three or four canoes and their crews of three or four.

"It was a fascinating gamble for every well as owner. In addition to the pearl divers, the pearl industry depends on the owners to divide among themselves, and any pearl found in this system was the crew's property. Many small fortunes were made by humble divers toiled and pilfered and a story is told of one illiterate canoe that received more than \$100,000 for a single haul."

NICE, Sept. 9.—Nina Wilcox Putman intends to transfer her residence from Madison, Connecticut, to the principality of Monaco. It is announced here—She has signed a contract to collaborate in the production of four motion picture comedies on the French Riviera.

"With the progress of research work, such as will be carried on at the Carnegie Institute, it should develop as the steel industry did when intensive research efforts were launched in that field."

Every phase of the printing art will be taught, including handcrafting as the ancients practiced it.

#### Norman A. Elberfeld, Former Major League Star, Is Rearing Quintet of Girl Athletes.

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., Sept. 9.—Norman A. Elberfeld, former major league baseball star and once manager of the New York Yankees, is rearing a new brood of athletes.

The one-time "Tobacco Kid" of the diamond has become an authority on bringing up the modern girl, and he is guiding five daughters to fame in the world of sport.

"Feed 'em and let 'em play," is his recipe.

"While I lived the life of a baseball star the diamond was my schoolroom," he explains. "I learned there some things which I think have been of a lot of benefit to me in rearing my five girls. I have trained them all to proficiency in virtually every American outdoor sport."
