DEMPSEY ENGAGES IN SECRET MANEUVERS

Ex-Champion Boxes With Partners Under Glare of Flood Lights With Flynn Present.

LINCOLN FIELDS, Grete, Ill., Sept. 13 (AP)—Under the glare of the spot lights, Jack Dempsey engaged in another mysterious session of moonlight maneuvers at his training camp tonight, with Jerry Barrad out but manager Flynn, Javy Lavard and Gus Wilson, trainers and the essential sparring partners.

When darkness descended on the place, all the newspaper correspondents and photographers were chased out and the premises searched for scraps by Fred Tanscott, Chicago columnist. After dinner, all members of the Dempsey household of 47 people were told to take a walk down the road for an hour. It was during the walk that Dempsey engaged in his secret workout, as he did last Sunday night.

New Sparring Partner

A new sparring partner with a reputation of having a great left hand, Armand Emanuel of San Francisco, was slated to trade punches with Dempsey, along with Allentown Joe Gans, and other regular members of the camp.

Dempsey did not boxing today, nor any road work. In the sweltering heat of mid-afternoon, with the thermometer around 95, he climbed into his ring for a light session with the punching bag. He whaled away at the light bag for four rounds and drove punches into the heavy swinging target for two more, while Jerry the Greek attempted to hold the bag stationary.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 13 (AP)—In a sensational round match which almost ended in a simultaneous knockout in the sixth round, Benny Bass of Philadelphia battered his way to victory Monday night over Red Chapman in a bout that carried with it recognition by the Pennsylvania state athletic commission as featherweight champion of the world. The battle was staged at the sesqui-centennial stadium here.

Both were so exhausted from this grilling round that they had little left and spent most of the tenth and final round clinching.
