HOSPITAL ATTENDANTS GET BABIES MIXED UP

Judge Looks Forward to Conference With Masters of Medicine to Determine Identities.

CLEVELAND, O., Sept. 16 (AP)—While a heart broken mother in a hospital here tonight prays for the return of her baby, a judge and a baby girl, Judge Carl V. Weigand, looked forward to a conference Monday morning with masters of the medical profession who might aid him in solving a tangle that would test the wisdom of a Solomon.

The proceedings in criminal pleas court, where Judge Weigand presides, forced him to prepare a personal visit to the hospital to determine the identity of the babies today, until Monday. Last Saturday the tangle was brought to the bar of Justice in Judge Weigand's court when Sam Smith, father of the child, instituted habeas corpus proceedings demanding that Father-park hospital officials be required to return the child to his mother.

"Clinical Record." Mrs. Smith nursed a baby girl to-night which hospital officials claim is the child born to her husband. The child, said that the tangle resulted from a "clinical error" made at the hospital. But the doubt of a medical profession, which has a reputation for its accuracy, is not the only thing that would lead to the possibility that he would spend every penny he has to establish the truth.

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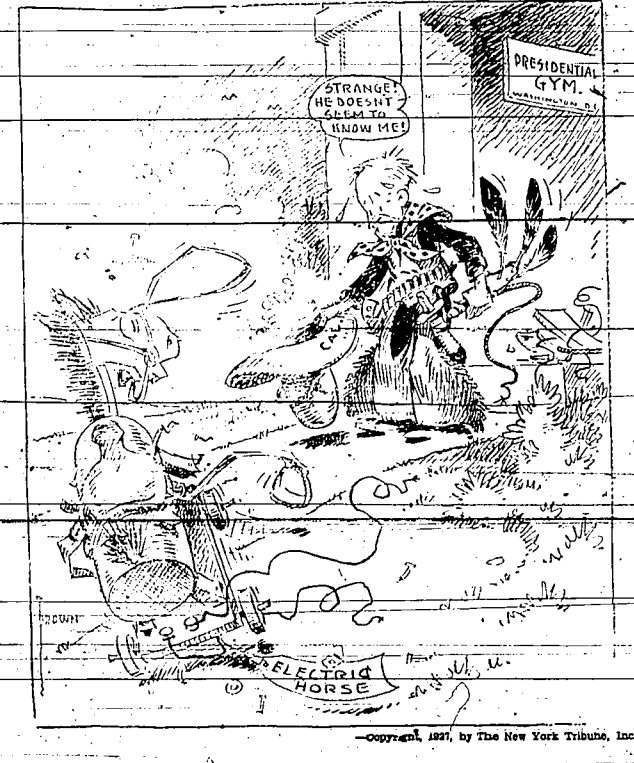

NEW TRESPASS LAW INTERESTS HUNTERS

Sportsmen Turn Attention to Legislative Act as Opening of Pheasant Season Nears.

The pheasant season will open this year on October 10, for two months and ten days, the legislature has decided. It is anticipated that this there will be a great deal of interest in the new trespass law covering hunting on lands enclosed by a fence or other barrier within the meaning of the statute.

Test of Law
Whenever a tract of land shall be enclosed by a fence or other barrier and signs legibly printed or painted in the English language warning persons not to trespass thereon shall have been posted, in a conspicuous manner on each side thereof on or near the boundaries at intervals of not more than 60 rods, it shall be a misdemeanor for any person to enter upon the land enclosed by such fence or barrier for the purpose of hunting or trapping any animal or bird, or for the purpose of entering such land in the exercise of any right or privilege which is not a right or privilege of the owner of such land.

Extra Provision
Provided, however, that if the owner of his salaried office or tenant in common, or if the owner of a tract of land, shall not be required under the provisions of this section to post warning signs on his land, he shall be deemed to have consented to the entry of any person for the purposes stated in this section.
