Bruins Working Into Shape Rapidly; Twin Falls to Play Albion High School on Dedication Day of Structure.

Inclusion of a football game as part of the program of the bridge celebration was definitely achieved yesterday when Coach Platino arranged to meet the Albion high school team October 1, for the opening game of the season. The Bruins are rapidly working into shape and recent scrimmages indicate that they will furnish ample competition for their opponents.

With Perrino, Ward, Robertson and others in the backfield the Bruins have a fine combination with which to work out this type of attack, as these boys are all first.

Bruin Line Heavier

The Bruin line is heavier than it was a year ago and the experienced linemen will bear the brunt of the linemen's work. These are Piltzer, Vance and Lucas, the first two are tackle and the latter at center. He did remarkable work last season. Young Bralford, and Berg are the two leading candidates for the position at guard coming up from the grades to play their first season this year. Alvin Kempton, and Charlie Hatfield will fight it out for the center position. Paul Petzold having been declared ineligible owing to the eight semester ruling. Earl-Kewington will alternate at tackle with Bugler and Vance. Kempton was first substitute last season and should develop into a dependable lineman this year. Bill Lons, Charles Dietrich, and Johnny Maxwell are fighting it out for the end job, and Bill seems to have a little bit the edge although the others are making it tough for him.

New Material Developing

In addition to the backs mentioned above the coaches are developing considerable new material among which are Walt, Martin, Dibble, Lincoln, Frazelle and Wheeler. All these men lack experience and it will be some time before the Bruins function with the oiled smoothness they showed last year.

The linemen are being put through a hard week of tackling, charging, and blocking and they are taking their regular turn on the charging sled every evening which the coaches consider the principal essentials. Up to date they have had little or no scrimmage, but have worked on some formations until they are beginning to show a little coordination.

DEMPSEY AND TUNNEY IN PERFECT CONDITION—BOTH ARE CONFIDENT

BIG FIGHT WILL USE PHILADELPHIA TACTICS IN DEFENSE OF CROWN

Analyzing Situation Calmly at Close of Five Months' Training Tunney Can See Ahead Only Opportunity to Win.

(By The Associated Press) LAKE VILLA, Ill., Sept. 20.—The selfsame strategy that carried Gene Tunney to the heavyweight throne in the battle of the sequel-entennial at Philadelphia last fall will guide the big man in his heavy-weight crown against the former champion, Jack Dempsey, in Soldier field Thursday night.

With around 150,000 spectators watch from the blackness of the huge stadium as two giants battle for the pure of a \$1,000,000. Tunney believes he will stab Dempsey off balance continually with a cutting left hand and hammer cut just as decisive a victory with solid right crosses as he did in their first encounter a year ago.

Although the champion slues at predicting knockout victory, he believes that such an ending alone can establish a supremacy he feels over Dempsey.

Gene will enter the ring pledged to no definite style of milling, however, on what Dempsey does, how the odds and the opportunities fate throws in his path. "I may nail him with a right smash to the chest in the first seconds of fighting as I did last September. If that happens Dempsey cannot evade a knockout this time. Tunney has had nothing to do with a year's lay off from the ring. Tunney Has Year of Training

In that year of almost constant training he has built up his weight to 160 pounds and has added 100 pounds from his hips and waist to add to the 160 pounds he carried in the ring. At the same time he has improved his speed, improved his timing of punches, and improved his ability to defend himself. Tunney's main plan is to knock Dempsey out with a right jab to the heart and stomach.

MAN GIVES UP CAREER TO ASSIST DELINCTS

"Father" Gibson Known to Thousands of Men and Women in Trouble.

CHICAGO, Sept. 20 (AP)—On Washington Boulevard in the city of Chicago, a man named David E. Gibson ministers to those who come to the Catholic Shelter.

"Father" Gibson, he affectionally called by thousands of men and women who annually pour their tales of trouble into his willing ears. If they would listen to his life story they would find it as interesting as any they could tell.

David E. Gibson, David E. Gibson was a successful member of a firm in downtown Chicago. But the hall and waiting room of his office were always crowded with troubled men and women waiting to see him. Gibson didn't play golf or follow the usual recreations of a middle-aged business man. His hobby was helping the down and out.

Finally he gave up business entirely and, by rigorous self-study, became an Episcopal clergyman. He heads the Catholic shelter and his secretary is a woman who has been in the business for 20 years.

The Catholic shelter is open to anyone of any religion or race and between 75,000 and 100,000 men and women receive aid and shelter annually. College men in the dean's gown, or plain janitor seek the friendly smile and understanding eyes of "Father" Gibson with the same eagerness.

"When a machine gets out of order, it must be repaired," says Mr. Gibson, "and it is with men. The work shop for the remedying must be a place of worship."

Even his letters have sought the counsel of the Rev. Gibson and his staff. Sometimes, he said, they feel that they need a new outlook on life for a fresh start.

An ex-prisoner, pallid and bitter-faced, came to the shelter. Help was given to him and now he owns his own farm.

Last year 20 couples were married and the pastor of 28 persons were confirmed into the church, and 70 were baptized.

Now he has 30 years, the Rev. Gibson has been helping the needy. He estimates he has given aid to 500,000 persons. A million is his goal before he dies.

(By The Associated Press) CHICAGO, Sept. 20.—Pre-battle preparations for the Dempsey-Tunney heavyweight championship 16-round match Thursday night at Soldier field approached a climax today with these developments:

1—Continued reports of a decided drift in Jack Dempsey's favor, with wagers on Gene Tunney down to odds of 6 to 5 in many instances and prospects of even money betting by tomorrow.

2—A new flood of counterfeit tickets of all denominations from \$5 to \$40, announced by T. H. Rickard and resulting in increased vigilance by federal and local agents.

3—Conference of state athletic commission with rival managers of fighters' rates, together with reports that commission had further whittled down the referee candidates to three men: generally supposed to be Walter Eckstein, newspaper man; George Lydon, business man; and David Miller, wealthy sportsman and "veteran official" all of Chicago.

4—Disposal in federal court of suit by Rev. Elmer Williams to stop fight on grounds it endangers public morals and postponement until tomorrow of application for permanent injunction by Coliseum athletic club based on claims of prior contract with Dempsey to fight Harry Wills here last night.

5—Retaliation by Dempsey of alleged offer to "frame" him losing battle with Tunney last year—the basis of a \$100,000 lawsuit—by a "counterfeit" letter and assertion that he still was determined to force an answer from the title holder.

Although Tunney remained a decided favorite among newspaper critics, more than 1,200 of whom are expected from all parts of the country as well as foreign lands, the indication that Dempsey is in trim for a sensational fight was accentuated by reports that he reflected loss in narrowing of the betting odds, which have been hammered down from 10 to 1 to 6 to 5 in the last 24 hours.

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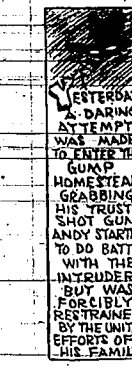
