2000 PERSONS ATTEND BUHL RODEO AND WILD WEST SHOW FIRST DAY

Program Includes Bucking and Bull-Dogging Contests; Races and Boxing Cards; Plans Made to Speed Up Performances.

BUHL, Sept. 22 (Special to The News)—Nearly 2,000 persons followed the first day parade here on this afternoon out to the rodeo grounds on Paris field to witness the opening events of Buhl's three-day rodeo and wild west show.

The afternoon program included the bucking and bull-dogging contests, races and boxing cards, and a relay race, and in the evening a four-event boxing card brought the rodeo crowds trooping back to the grounds.

Expect Bigger Attendance In anticipation of bigger attendance today, arrangements have been made for speeding up the rodeo performance, which is to open for the second day immediately following the first day.

Thirteen riders, including some of the best known rodeo performers in the country, participated in the first day's bucking contest. No decisions were announced because, Kerley, first of Walls, a champion, arrived too late for the show.

Oliver, second, coming in second day's bucking contest, planted his heels on the ground in 31 seconds. Jack Coats of Jerome was second with a time of 45 seconds and Calgary Bryan of Bruneau was third. There were five entries in this event.

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RICKARD'S DREAM OF \$3,000,000 RECEIPTS IS ALMOST REALIZED

Throng of 150,000 Persons Bring Gate Returns to Within \$200,000 of Veteran Promoter's Record Anticipation.

(By The Associated Press) SOLDIER FIELD, Chicago, Sept. 22 (AP)—Rickard's dream of something approaching a \$3,000,000 gate came true tonight when 50 gates to Soldier Field were thrown open to admit the greatest prize fight crowd in history for the sport's heavyweight championship battle between Jack Dempsey and Gene Tunney, his conqueror of a year ago.

As the shadows of dusk fell over the massive stadium, the attendance reached 150,000, with receipts in excess of \$2,000,000, a record breaking figure in prize fight history.

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**BURGlar SUSPECT  
GAINS HIS LIBERTY  
AFTER PRELIMINARY**

**Judge Grants Motion to Discharge Jim Kelley for Lack of Evidence of Guilt of Burglary.**

Jim Kelley, arrested on the morning of September 15, for alleged first degree burglary at the Diamond J. warg with Joe L. Snowden, was discharged last evening by Judge C. A. Ball, on a motion of Attorney E. V. Larson, on the ground that the evidence in this case was not sufficient to create probable cause to believe the defendant guilty. Prosecutor C. W. Witham stated that Snowden was a material witness for the state, but was in the hospital. He offered to put Ralph E. Leighton, chief of police, on the stand to repeat a conversation with Snowden, but this was refused on the ground that it was hearsay.

**The State's Case**  
A. M. Peters, merchant-policeman, and deputy Twin Falls police officer, said that at about 2 o'clock on the morning of September 15 he was attracted by a noise behind the Diamond Hardware company place of business, as he approached somebody called "Jiggers" and ran away. He saw another man with his feet out of the window and this man jumped out and followed at once by a third. He called to the men to halt, fired twice in the air and, finally, to stop them, and did stop one who proved to be Joseph L. Snowden. Snowden was shot in the leg. He got the police car and took the wounded man to the hospital. Sheriff's writer Mrs. Snowden and the defendant appeared. Kelley had a fresh cut on his face.

He returned and saw several blood spots, then the one of a dime on the sidewalk. Then he got Del Kenning of the precinct, and they went to the hardware store and arrested Kelley. When they got to the police station, Peters said, Reaney retained search and hit him on the nose. After continued refusal, he hit Kelley with a billy, after which the search proceeded, with no results so far as incriminating circumstances were concerned. Mr. Larson wanted to know whether the billy did not render Kelley unconscious until noon the next day, but the officer said he was unable to say that the defendant was unconscious at any time.

morning of the alleged burglary, Kelley seemed drunk. He did not recognize the others, whom he did not know engaged room No. 102, Snowden signing the register for the three. He left, and some time later, after the morning of the burglary, he was at the Diamond Hardware company back alley. Mrs. Snowden, who is employed at the Park, testified that she and her husband and Kelley went to the Snowden residence in the evening. They were up rather late. She went to bed perhaps at late at midnight and knew nothing more until Kelley called her to tell her that her husband was shut in the room. She called the police. She corroborated the statement Kelley made to the police that he had cut his hand on dishes at the hotel that day but could not describe the cuts and that those on the right. That was all. The court said there was probably cause to believe the burglary, but the evidence did not connect the defendant with the crime.

STEAMBOATS INVADE OUTPOST OF CHINA

Kuldzhia New River Port Lies on Central Asian Plateau North of Tien Shan Mountains

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 22.—Kuldzhia, outpost of Chinese Turkistan recently connected by rail with the rest of the world, is a growing center of trade on the roof of the world, says a bulletin from the Washington, D. C. headquarters of the National Geographic Society.

On Shortest Route Across Asia Kuldzhia is the last frontier settlement of importance in China's most western provinces. Ginkiang, better known as Chinese Turkistan, lies on the Ill River about 50 miles above the point where this great stream empties into Lake Balkash.

Overland trade routes here several hundred miles to the south, through Asia and Tashkent to a Russian port on the Caspian and Yarkand over the Chinese border. This was the route followed by Marco Polo, followed by travelers, and is being corroborated by modern discoveries.

Between this land route and the Ill River to the north are many low mountain passes through some of which engineers state will lie the future shortest transcontinental railway from Kuldzhia to Peking.

Kuldzhia was built by the Chinese on the site of the ancient Samarkand capital, and the Ill frontier city has had a chequered career. It was held for a time by Russians, and still has many Russian inhabitants.

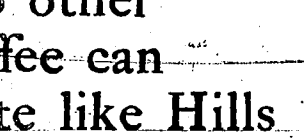

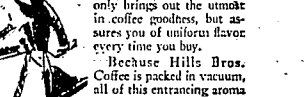
