PEKIN HAS THRILLING EXPERIENCE IN WALK

Roadway, 60 Feet in Air—Wide Enough for Four—Ancient Chariots to Pass, Deserted.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—An afternoon stroll atop the city wall surrounding China's capital is a never-to-be-forgotten experience. This road is 60 feet in the air and wide enough for four ancient chariots to pass. It is now deserted save for scattered sentries. Duffs of grass and craggy bushes have sprouted their way from between the ancient bastions. At intervals a cavernous half-collapsed tower offers shelter to numerous bats and an occasional beggar along the 14-mile battlements.

The scenic beauty described by the National Geographic society changes constantly. Now on the right one looks down in the luck gardens of the palace; to the left, a view of a bit of Hoi An. Behind, the American marine guard is having band practice while the office wives are entertaining at a tennis set.

The tramper crosses the wall and passes down a narrow alleyway to the quarter known as Chien Men Wei, or "outside Chien gate." Hundreds of "backhows" are threading their way through the narrow streets. They are hurrying on errands to Lanchow street—Silver street or Furniture restaurants—accompanying with orders and bills. Perhaps they seek the joys of Pekin duck, noodles and antique eggs. Flamingo signs announce these wares along with advertisements for Japanese liver pills and American cigarettes.

The top of the wall grows more rugged and uneven. Great stones project from the surface, foundations of ancient temples. On the outside of the ramparts stretch quiet fields. Toward the city one has a view of the courtyard of a Chinese middle class home. Women in blue cotton trousers and bound feet hobble about their household tasks. Great yellow carts back in the sun, blinking at the chattering black and white ruggies on the roof. Goldfish swim about flat earthenware jars.

The street outside a vender of sweet meats is calling his wares, with a long-sounding accompaniment to a high nasal tone. He carries a bamboo pole on his shoulder and bundles swing from both ends. One contains his steaming trays of hot-beh-n, another the manufacture of reinforcement. Youngsters buy scarlet crab-apples strung on a willow sprig and boiled in-sweet.

Further along, Pekin's wall shelters an ancient astronomical observatory, where bronze instruments are silhouetted against the sky line. Twisted copper dragons form the feet of great brass spheres and circles in some way connected with the movement of the stars. The layman wonders over mysterious "the universe" as "no" is taken down from the top of Hsien Men gate. It is evening and rickshaw lanterns flash in the long straight miles of Hsien Men street.

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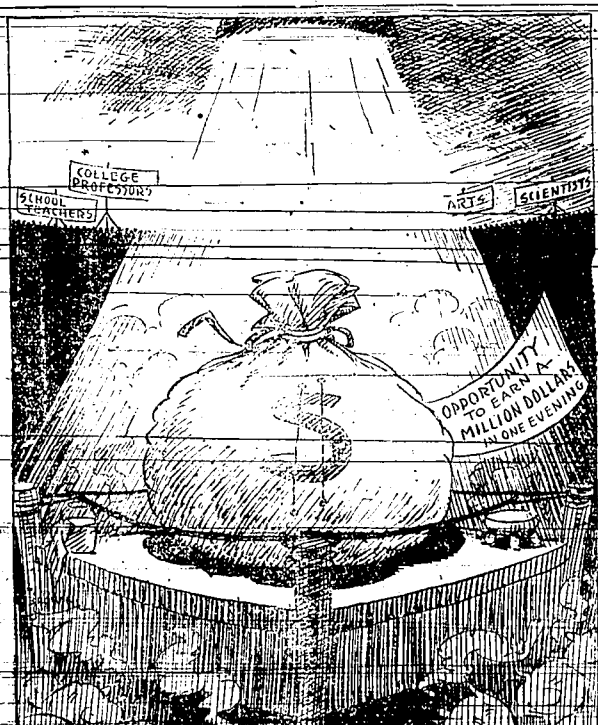

STEADY PRACTICE IS REASON FOR WINNING TENNIS CHAMPIONSHIP

Jean Rene Lacoste, Champion in World of Tennis, Triumphant Over Americans, Is Youth of Few Words.

NEW YORK, Sept. 23 (AP)—Jean Rene Lacoste, who has won the tennis championship of the United States, for the second time, is a youth of few words but many tennis triumphs.

On the Sunday afternoon after his second triumph for France in the Davis cup challenge round over "Big Bill" Tilden, Rene rolled up to a New York hotel in a taxi. From behind a check of tennis records—74 of them—and a bag of golf clubs, the little, trim Frenchman emerged.

"Congratulations," said the first tennis man to greet him. "Well, thanks," he replied, in perfect English. "That was all. As to 'how he did it,' Lacoste shrugged his shoulders as if to say, 'It is done, for I certainly got about it, but why discuss it?'"

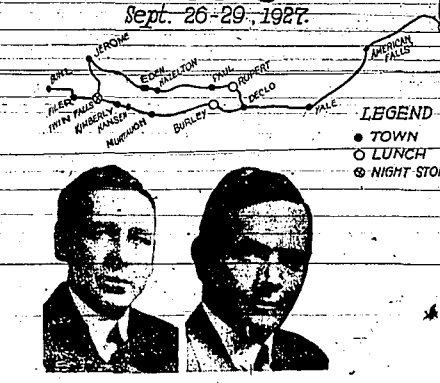
Tennis seems so simple to this youth of 24 that he can explain it in terms of long and hard-fought matches of the game and its tactics, some-what-tinged with no particular formula for success. He is a quiet, unassuming youth with all his powers of concentration and determination, seldom excited. Lacoste is keen application to the game, like the other drivers of competition and steady practice, but the difference now is that while the Frenchman has been training and practicing to support him, "Big Bill" has passed the day when he could still travel at top speed after a succession of long and hard-fought matches.

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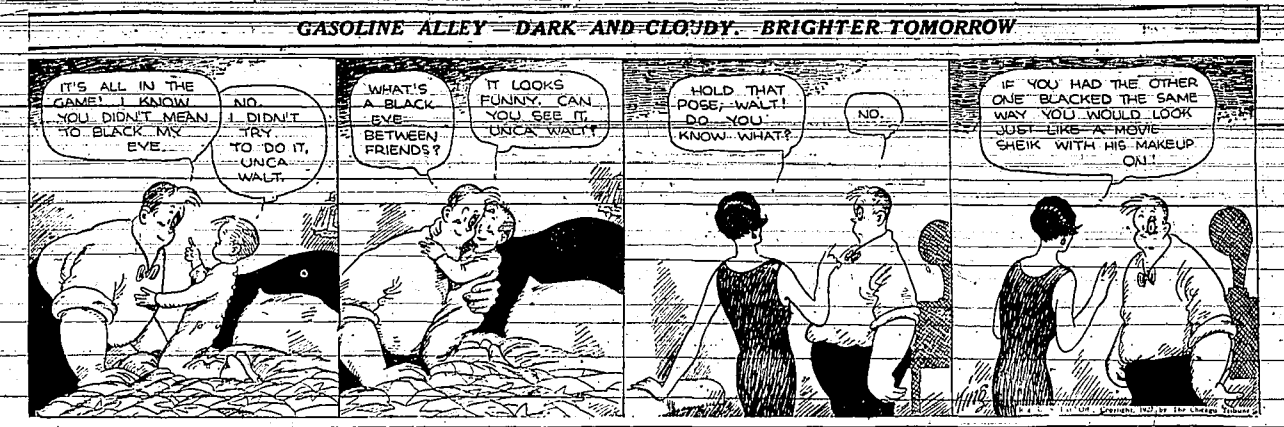

WHEAT ADVANCES ON CONDITIONS ABROAD

Shortage of Moisture in Australia and Argentina Affects Wheat Crop; Corn Down.

CHICAGO, Sept. 23 (AP)—Widespread need of moisture in Australia, together with insufficiency of rains locally, here, led to higher prices today for wheat. Corn values went down as a result of nearly complete absence of frost which has been predicted.

Critical drought conditions are reported today to be affecting the wheat crop through Australia, except the western part of the commonwealth. Uncertainty over the outlook for bread wheat supplies from the eastern hemisphere was also aroused by word that more rain is wanted in Argentina, Argentinean inspectors reported.

Continuing temperatures as well as actual failure of frost predictions, weakened the corn market. Oats were steadied by good cash demand. Provisions were irregular.
