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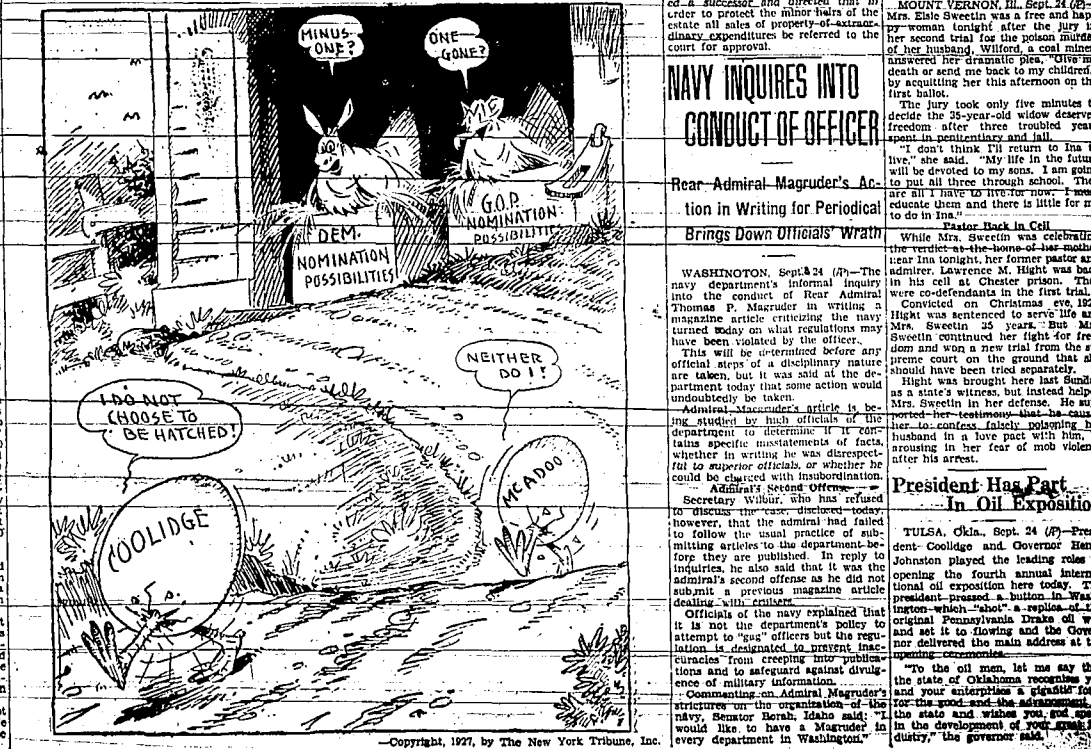

New York Giants Defeat Pittsburgh By Score of 3-1

PIRATES GO DOWN IN DEFEAT; GOTHAM TEAM NEARING FIRST PLACE

Closing Fray of McGraw's Club on Western Trip Considered One of Most Crucial; 35,000 Fans Witness Contest.

PITTSBURGH, Sept. 24 (AP)—Carrying on in the face of seemingly unmountable odds the New York Giants installed themselves into the thick of the National league championship race today a game and one-half from first place, by defeating the leading Pirates by 3 to 1 before 35,000 fans.

It was the closing fray for the Giants western trip and considered as one of the most crucial in the history of the club. The victory gave the Giants three out of four in the series and an even break with the Bush men for the season at 11 apiece.

Virgil Barnes started for New York and allowed only four hits in seven innings, when he gave way to a pinch hitter, Fred Fitzsimmons, who had downed the Corsairs 7 to 1 on Thursday and pitched the last two starts, allowing only one hit and received credit for the triumph.

Meadows was breezing along nicely until the eighth when after Harper walked two scratches he was struck by a pinch hitter Ott and Reese, filling the bases with none out. Mueller forced Harper at the plate and Mann, who ran for Ott, scored with the tying run on Littles sacrifice fly to center.

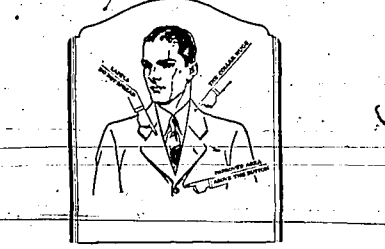

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PLUNGES TO DEATH OFF GALENA SUMMIT

J. C. Foelt, Stanley Ranchman and Road Worker, Killed in Mountain Grade Misthap.

(Special to The News)
HAILLEY, Sept. 24.—J. C. Foelt, Stanley district ranchman and road maintenance employe, plunged to death during Thursday night when his automobile left the highway within 300 yards of the crest of Galena summit on the west side, and rolled over a 150 foot grade. The body was found near the wreckage of the machine about 9 o'clock Friday morning by Lane of Ketchum and A. H. Bradford of Twin Falls.
It is reported that Mr. Foelt fell sliding about mid-afternoon Thursday, traveling alone to Ketchum, and it is believed that he met his death early in the evening. The body and the wrecked machine were found at the foot of the grade at the first turn below the summit on the west side. The machine was badly smashed but the lights were still burning when it was found next morning.
Mr. Foelt was about 50 years old and was a bachelor. He had made his home for a number of years on a ranch west of Stanley.
He is survived by his sister-in-law, Mrs. William Foelt, 402 Blue Lakes boulevard, Twin Falls, his father in law, and other relatives.
The Old Fellows Lodge, of which he was a member, will have charge of funeral services for which arrangements will be completed when word is received from his father.

WIFE BRINGS SUIT FOR DIVORCE—AGAINST—RIDER

Petition for divorce was filed against Homer Holcomb, rodeo rider, by Lucille Holcomb, Saturday, in district court here. The petition charges cruel and inhuman treatment on or about October 15, 1926, at Boise, and at times thereafter. It also states that Holcomb is of a mean, menacing and ugly disposition. He is also charged with failure and refusal to support the wife and a minor child.
Mrs. Holcomb asks \$50 for immediate relief for herself and minor child, \$25 out money, attorney's fees of \$150, and temporary alimony of \$50 during the action. A court order is requested to restrain the defendant from interfering with either the wife or child during the action. Mrs. Holcomb asks custody of the child, who is two and one-half years of age.
The Holcombs were married in Twin Falls, October 12—1921.

OFFER PROPOSITION TO USE CANAL POWER TO OPERATE PUMPS

Murtaugh District Attorney and Seattle Engineer Meet With Twin Falls Board Regarding Hansen Butte Reclamation.

Possibility of utilizing potential hydro-electric power generated at the Twin Falls dam at the point of diversion of the low line from the high line in connection with the proposed reclamation of the Hansen Butte tract of 40,000 acres, was informally discussed with the Twin Falls canal board Saturday by Shad L. Hodgin, attorney for the Murtaugh irrigation district, and W. E. Stuver of Seattle, engineer for the Pureit Sound Bridge and Dredging company.

The district was organized to reclaim the project, and the Seattle company contemplates financing the project and getting water on the land. The canal will generate about 4,000 horse power, which it was stated, would be sufficient to carry the water to the tract. Nothing definite was done, as the objection of Mr. Hodgin and Mr. Stuver was to get a line on conditions and should the plan be feasible, to meet the local farmers to consider the matter. The board proposed to give it consideration, and then went to Cass to witness the operation of the dredger which is being tried out. Mr. Stuver spent several weeks here some time ago getting data on conditions.

DISTRICT P. J. A. WILL HEAR TWIN FALLS' MAN

HOTEL PROPRIETORS TO ADOPT TIPPING HABIT IN ENGLAND

System of Charging 10 Per Cent for Service on Meal Checks Is Working Well in Italy; No Worry to Customers.

LONDON, Sept. 24 (AP)—Hotel keepers and restaurant owners in England are making another move to abolish tipping and charge 10 per cent for service on all meal checks. This system is working well in Italy and customers are freed from the worry of knowing how much and whom to tip.

"Tipping is the curse of England," says Mr. Whitley. He is of opinion that hotel staff and waiters are better off under a fixed percentage of the bill and in Italy, at least, are more respectful to customers.

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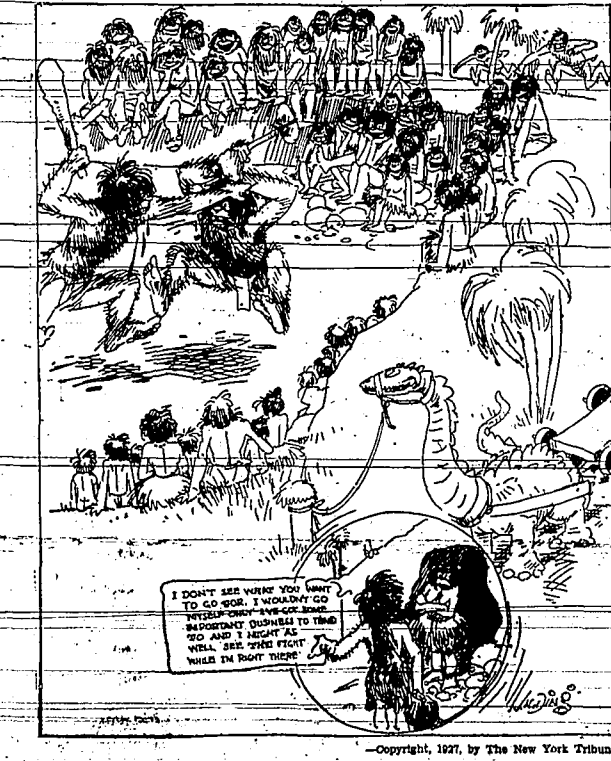

Despite his 62 years, he is still something of a Beau Brummel and an ardent theatergoer.

TYPICAL LASS OUFFENS ROAM OVER EUROPE LIVING ON CHARITY

Dispersed Over Continent Like Scattered Jewels of Shattered Crowns, Quintet of Empresses Lives With Poor Relatives

(By The Associated Press) VIENNA, Sept. 24.—Dispersed over Europe like the scattered jewels of shattered crowns, five throneless queens are living on the slender charity of relatives and friends.

Once the proud mistresses of millions of acres of land, the rulers of greater millions of people, and the possessors of untold millions of wealth, Dowager Empress Marie of Russia, Empress Zita of Austria, Queen Sophie of Greece, Queen Annetta of Portugal and young Queen Elizabeth of Greece are today without a roof or a bed they can call their own. Their return to their own homes would be sufficient to start an immediate revolution.

Saddest and saddest of all five fugitives is Empress Dowager Marie of Russia, mother of the murdered Czar Nicholas, who, broken in body and mind over the successive tragedies she has borne, beginning with the assassination of her father-in-law, Emperor Alexander II, and culminating in the brutal murder of her son and his entire family, is spending the remnant of her fragile life in Copenhagen. She was recently reported to be dying.

While the rest of the world has given up her son and family as irrevocably dead, the venerable empress insists they are still alive. At her window in Copenhagen and still burns a small lamp so that, as she says, "Nicky will know I'm still awaiting his return."

Another woman, sovereign whose cup of sorrow has overflowed is former Queen Sophie of Greece, who in her time has witnessed—the assassination of her father-in-law, King George I, of Greece; the death by a noisily bile of her eldest son, former King Alexander I, and exiling of her husband, the late King Constantine of Greece; the death of her second son, George, as assassination of her husband King King of the Helms, and more recently, the death of her brother-in-law, King Ferdinand of Rumania.

She spends much of her time in prayer and meditation in Giannina, Italy, where her beloved "Nicky" is buried.

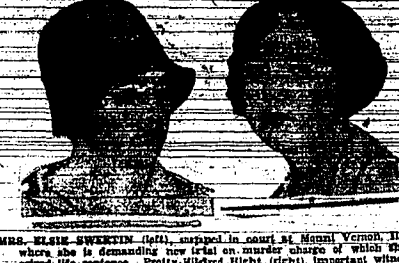

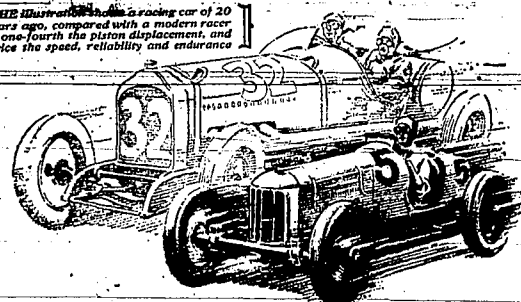

Help With Tax Load "In Idaho we have four great transcontinental railroads—the Great Northern, Northern Pacific and Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul, each of which traverses the northern part of the state serving the people there. In southern Idaho we have the Union Pacific which traverses the southern part of the state and its many branches tapping the agricultural and mineral regions. The railroads pay a great deal of tax money in the state and pay promptly and many times were it not for the taxes paid by the railroads our local taxing units of various kinds would have scant treasures."

CHURCHES' COUNCIL DENIES HEAVY LOSS

Submits Figures Showing Gain of 50 Per Cent in Membership in Last Twenty Years.

NEW YORK, Sept. 24.—Stirred by recent reports that the churches are suffering severe losses in membership, officials of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America have issued a statement declaring that the real truth is precisely the opposite. Figures are presented for 25 leading denominations, showing that they have grown almost 50 per cent in the last 20 years.

"This statement was made, according to Rev. Charles S. Macfarland, general secretary of the Federal Council of the Churches, in response to a query inquires as to the validity and significance of the public announcement accredited to H. K. Carroll in July 30 that 'the total yearly loss of Protestant churches' would approximate about 500,000."

"This estimate," said Dr. Macfarland, "has been completely misunderstood, because it had to do only with one side of the picture. It made no reference to the additions of new members year by year. For example, Rev. Frederick L. Bagley of the Congressional commission on evangelism was quoted as saying that about 30,000 members are lost from the rolls of that denomination annually, but no mention was made of the fact that some 20,000 are added to these rolls each year and that the percentage of increase in membership is greater than that of the population of the country. The fact is that the net result for all Protestant denominations has been a gain in membership considerably in excess of the growth in population. No thoughtful person should overlook the disquieting drift from active to inactive membership, to which Dr. Carroll called attention, but anyone who thinks this means that the churches are decreasing in membership simply does not know what he is talking about."

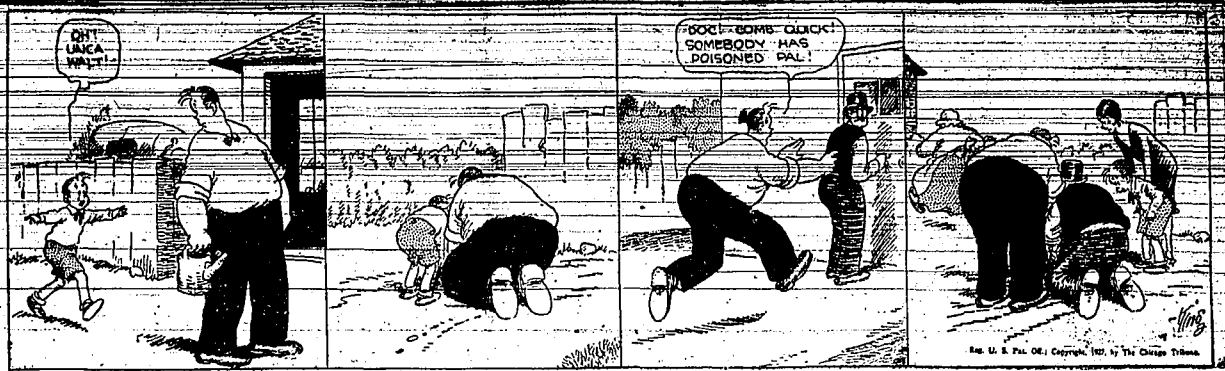

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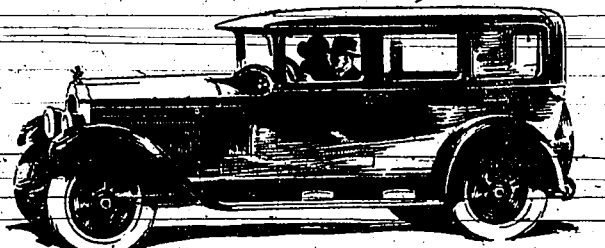
