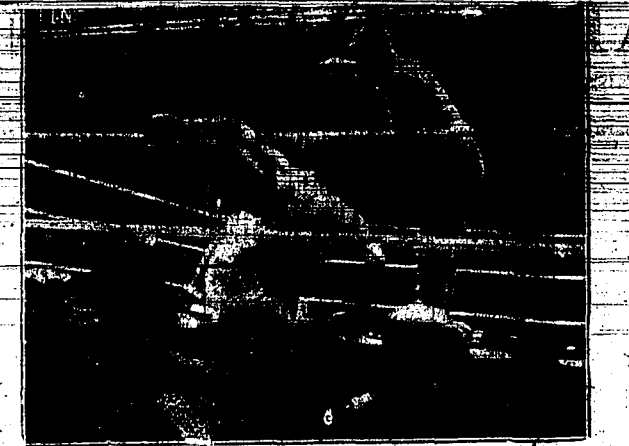

DEPENDENTS OF CREW FILE DAMAGE SUITS

Government of United States Defendant in Litigation Involving Nearly \$2,000,000. NEW YORK, Sept. 26 (AP)—Damage suits totaling \$1,750,000 were filed against the government in United States district court in Boston today by widows and dependents of 44 of the crew of the submarine S-51, which was rammed and sunk by the steamer City of Rome, off Cape Cod, on September 25, 1925. The crash which cost the lives of 33 members of the submarine crew, resulted in an indictment on July 14 last of Captain John H. Dittel, who was in command of the City of Rome, when he resumed the submarine's voyage to Boston after being charged with negligence and incompetence in his duties on the vessel.

HEAVY TAXES IS REDUCED
FIVE PER CENT FOR YEAR

Heavy Reduction in Sum Required for Bonds Is Feature of Sidewalk Contract Let.
Call for Graveling Is Made.

Twin Falls city council in session last evening agreed on a law (city of 31 miles) a reduction of the tax from the year 1926. The council also accepted the bid of C. E. Holmes for sidewalk construction, accepted a bid of \$18 to erect 226 foot sidewalks and books necessary for carrying out the new law for collecting special levy taxes; ordered advertising for bids on grading and graveling in six improvement districts, and issued permits to construct two new garages.

Heavy Tax Cut
 The cut in taxes was made after the refunding of the waterworks bonds and had been agreed on and the interest saving in connection with that transaction was considered among other things entering into the tax. The levy will take care of interest on bonds and provide for refunding payments coming due on 92-cent issues.

The levy, with the sum expected to be raised for each fund, is as follows: General fund, \$100,000; waterworks lights, three mills, \$15,000; library, two mills, \$10,000; bond one-quarter mill, \$1,250; bond interest and sinking fund, 15 and three quarters mills, \$75,000; total 31 mills, \$155,000.

The cut in bond interest and sinking fund, which last year was 2-1/2 mills. There is a quarter mill increase due to bond levy and three-fourths mill increase for the library.

Open Sidewalk Bids
 There were two bids on the sidewalks in various parts of the city, totaling something over 700 linear feet, which had not been put in by owners in districts where ordered. C. E. Holmes bid \$22 a cent per square foot, while Herman Schaefer bid 21 cent. Both agreed to make all excavations. Burley gravel will be used. City Attorney E. M. Swevel declared that in view of the decision of Judge O. M. Baum, looking that the city appeal to the court for relief in the matter of collecting taxes on special improvement districts created before this new law was enacted. It was probable that this law would not be upheld in the courts, as bond holders did not seem inclined to go to law to get the taxes collected. City Clerk O. M. Hall explained the amount of work necessary. Commissioners E. D. Smith, questions Mr. Hall at length relative to blanks required and finally expressed the belief that they were satisfactory. They may get considerably less than the maximum of \$250. It was explained. The books cover several years' taxes.

Call Sidewalk Bids
 Mr. Smith said that he had been led to believe that if bids were called again for sidewalk construction, one or more could be obtained within a limit. It was voted to issue a call.

Permits to build garages were granted to E. W. Spangler, who proposes to erect one, 10 by 20 feet on lot G, block 1, Olden addition for \$100; and to E. J. Dennis who proposes to construct one, 12 by 18 feet at 344 Seventh avenue east, for \$250.

Mrs. Sells and her companion were finally located through mail records. Mrs. Sells, it was stated, wrote to Fruitland, Idaho, at which place they had stopped, asking that her mail be forwarded to Twin Falls. Following this clue the searching party arrived in Twin Falls Sunday, about noon. Discovering that Mrs. Sells and her companion had just left the Wegener camp grounds where they had been for about a week. Deputy Jones, who had been assigned to the case, set out in pursuit, overtaking his party about two miles beyond Kimberly. LaMar was lodged in the county jail to await the arrival of federal officers from Seattle. Mrs. Sells was released and given custody of the children for this time being.

The car driven by LaMar was attached by the Wegeners for accounts due them by the LaMar-Sells party.

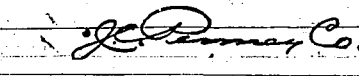

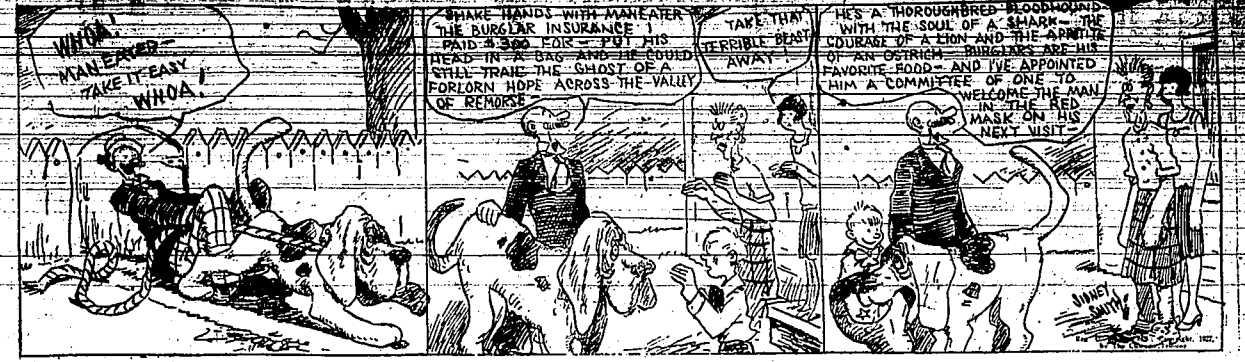

CHICAGO, Sept. 26 (AP)—Predictions of a late and extensive wheat harvest in Canada today nearly wiped out a steady advance of corn.
