PRESIDENT DISCOVERS HELPFUL CRITICISMS IN MAGRUDER'S STORY

Chief Executive Finds Redeeming Qualities in Magazine Article by Rear Admiral; Wilbur Denies Lack of Economy.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.—The White House was surprised today by President Coolidge's discovery of some helpful criticism in the controversial magazine article by Rear Admiral Magruder. Secretary Wilbur devoted to the article's charges of lack of economy in the navy and disputed them.

President Coolidge was not in complete agreement with the statements of Admiral Magruder, although he expressed as believing the article was written with a sincere desire to improve the navy. While he was without information whether the navy is actually over officered, the president does not believe that to be the case.

Wilbur, chief figures in the article, however, lifted from the article Admiral Magruder's statement that "for every dollar expended for repairs, it is necessary to require nearly four dollars to be expended to maintain a navy yard to make repairs," and cited figures which he said showed its inaccuracy.

In the meantime, the question of possible disciplinary action against the admiral's views remained unsettled. Secretary Wilbur declining to say whether he considered the article charges to be true, requested that Admiral Magruder submit any naval reorganization plan, he might have. Mr. Wilbur today received that plan.

"I have no full detailed plans for the reorganization of the navy, and the navy department is working on it," he said.

Going into Economy Phases of the article, the secretary declared the navy's budget for 1928-29 is \$101,000,000, while the total maintenance charges were \$80,000,000, from which it will be seen that the navy is not over officered.

Richard F. Reynolds, Air Line Operator and "Angel" of Broadway Show, Is Missing.

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—Richard F. Reynolds, youthful millionaire air line operator and "angel" of a Broadway show, was reported missing after his disappearance on September 16, having been traced to St. Louis and there lost.

A detective agency hired to conduct the search reported that Reynolds had checked out of the Majestic hotel there, last Thursday, saying he was going to California and would return the following Saturday.

Once Popular College Girl Held for Arson

PROBATIONER, Texas, Sept. 27.—A former popular student at the University of Texas and accused bank robber, was identified in court today in the case of a charge of arson as the young woman who appeared in a chain of circumstances surrounding the burning of a building in Round Rock, Texas, last December.

The state is seeking to show by circumstantial evidence that Mrs. Rogers burned the house, hoping that the money she had there would desert their points and leave her free to rob the bank. No attempt at robbery was made.

LEGIONNAIRES SECURE PARDON FOR AMERICAN

Bennett J. Doty, Soldier in French Foreign Legion, Twice Given Citations, Is Free.

PARIS, Sept. 27.—The visit of the American Legion to Paris brought about the pardon today of Bennett J. Doty, the American in the French Foreign Legion, seized by two Italian army officers and then given to the Syrian desert.

Doty, who was first reported to have been sentenced to death in Syria, served a few months in the Damascus prison and was transferred to Alibiville in Savole and later placed in the penal settlement at Clairvaux, Aube, where the announcement of his pardon reached him today.

Returning to Home "I am returning right home to God's country," he said when informed of his release.

"I just enlisted because I wanted to fight master Abd-el-Krim in Morocco, but they sent me to Syria. I met another American, just as good as I was. He was quite an experience. Bilizi, Missadipal, will feel as good as I do," he said.

EIGHTH ASSEMBLY OF LEAGUE OF NATIONS CONCLUDES ITS WORK

Senior Guani, Uruguay, President, Delivers Inspiring Address at Closing Session; Of Interest to American Nations.

(By The Associated Press) GENEVA, Sept. 27.—The eighth assembly of the league of nations concluded its work today with an inspiring address by Senor Guani, of Uruguay, its president, but the council of the league, which has inherited many new questions from the assembly, did not succeed in adjourning.

The exact make-up of the special committee which will study arbitration and security, commonly will also represent the American continent.

From the American standpoint the session offered interest because of the decision to remodel the league's permanent economic committee, to add to it an American member who will be designated personally and not as representing the American government.

The council decided to add Cuba and Canada to the disarmament commission, which has as members representing the American continent, Argentina.

Boise Girl Regains Use of Limbs Once Paralyzed

Miss Alice Butler, 18, Recovering Rapidly, Following Successful Surgical Operation.

BOISE, Sept. 27.—Complete paralysis of the left leg from the hips caused by the fracture of the spine in an automobile accident, was alleviated here last night through an operation by Dr. James L. Stewart, Boise. It was announced today. The operation released pressure on the spinal cord at the point of the fracture and movement of the legs was regained within a few hours.

The dedicatory address was given by H. L. Sanger, chief engineer of the power company. The National electric light association medal, was presented to J. E. Woodford of Hagerman, Idaho for saving a life.

POTATO BUG POE: There have always been mysteries in the operations of the Colorado potato beetle, commonly known as the "potato bug". It is worse in some places than others, for no apparent reason. Some patches, some counties, some states seem almost immune, while others are overwhelmed.

At last, a scientist in Ohio, where the bug has been growing rampant, makes the surprising discovery that the quality or behavior is responsible. Observation proves that beetles are very fond of potato bugs. It is a taste for it, in fact. The beetles are found in general with the potato bugs. They are permitted to multiply and operate undisturbed. They keep the potato vines pretty free from bugs. This is said to be the reason why potato patches remote from houses and roads, and near woods, are likely to have fewer bugs.

CHICAGO, Sept. 27 (AP)—Corn prices underwent a severe tumble today, the corn crop having again escaped an expected widespread frost. Heavy selling of corn futures delivered local and the day's lowest quotations were reached in the final hour. The corn market closed unchanged to 1/4c up, but lower, with a decline to 1 1/2c advance and provisions 1/2c to 3/4c down.

Which temperatures throughout the corn belt today falling to substantiate a forecast that they would get down to a winter level, the corn market began to rise right from the outset. Prices broke soon forced into operation many standing orders to let holdings go at various fixed limits and this put a stop to losses. Meanwhile, dimming prospects of serious damage to the crop of the corn crop was emphasized by an official statement that 97 per cent of the Nebraska crop is safe from frost and authoritative advice that corn is mostly safe over a considerable extent of Minnesota.

BOND IS PLACED AT \$2000 IN JOE LAMAR MANN-ACT PROCEDURE

Spanish American War Veteran Bound Over to Grand Jury, Complaint Made by Agent of Department of Justice.

Joe Lamar, Spanish American veteran, formerly of Stockton, California, taken into custody Sunday afternoon by Charles E. Jones, deputy sheriff, was formally arrested Tuesday evening by Charles L. Monahan, United States deputy marshal, on a warrant charging violation of the Mann act based on a complaint made by an agent of the United States department of justice.

Lamar entered a plea of not guilty and waived preliminary hearing. He was held under \$2000 bond to appear at the next term of the grand jury by United States commissioner A. H. Powers. Attorney W. L. Dunn counsel for Lamar, asked that bond be placed at \$1000. His father, just as he could furnish bond to that amount, but doubted whether he would be able to raise the sum named by the court. The commissioner refused to place bail at a lower figure in view of the nature of the charge. Lamar was taken to the county jail to await the posting of the \$2000 bond or the next session of the grand jury.

Traced Through Malls

Lamar and a woman who gave her name as Mrs. Rose Sells had her two children aged 5 and 7 years arrived in Twin Falls some two weeks ago and set up at the city tourist park, later moving to Wegener's tourist park which is on the Kimberly highway just to the east of Main avenue east. They failed to register at the park.

Mrs. Sells and her companion were traced here through a request sent by Mrs. Sells to the postmaster at Pruitland, Idaho, asking that her mail be forwarded to her at Twin Falls.

Through this clue a searching party composed of Sells, his sister and her husband, and his father, followed them to this city. Deputy Sheriff Charles E. Jones, at the instigation of the husband, Norman V. Sells, proceeded to the tourist camp to find that Lamar and his companion had just left. He followed them, overtaking the couple about two miles east of Kimberly. Lamar was lodged in the county jail awaiting arrival of federal officers, and Mrs. Sells returned to the park.

With the arrival of agents of the United States department of justice, today investigation was started on the charge of violating the White Slave act.

According to the story told to local officers by the husband of Mrs. Sells, Lamar was formerly the operator of a garage in Stockton, California. The Sells family, in company with Lamar, set out for Independence, Oregon, where they were employed in the fields. According to the Sells story, Lamar gave the husband a bottle of liquor and when he became intoxicated reported him to the police who lodged him in jail on a charge of drunkenness. Upon the release of Sells he discovered that his wife with the two minor children had departed in company with Lamar for parts unknown.

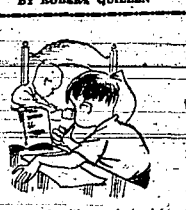
Sells and relatives immediately instituted a search which carried them some 3000 miles through Oregon, Washington and Idaho before they finally located their parties here.

Upon their apprehension Mrs. Sells immediately asserted her innocence of any guilt, stating that she did not know that Lamar intended to take her from the state, insisting that he had told her that he would merely take her to another hop field.

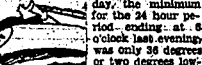
