Plumber Suggests Plan To Hurry Apple Picking

NEW YORK, Sept. 28 (AP)—Long distance cloning, one of the prime factors in the runaway race of the Yankees in the American league race, may decide the series in the favor of the opinion of Manager Miller Huggins.

"As a team," the Pirates may be better a point of two higher than Huggins said today in a discussion of pennant possibilities based on the prospect of Pittsburgh being the National league entry, "but the Yankees have a big edge in total bases, long distance hitting."

"I don't think there's much difference between the targets offered at Forbes field and the Yankee stadium in right field for one two big guns, Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig. Both are around 300 feet but on the left field side the stands are easier to reach at the Yankee stadium than in the Pirates' stronghold."

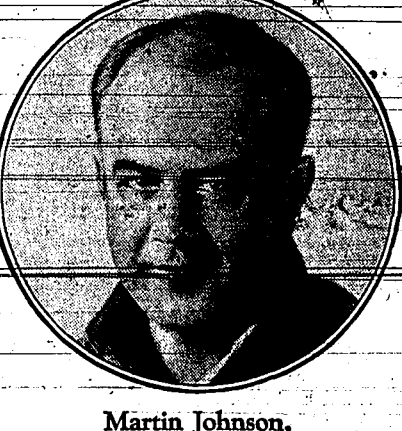

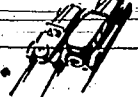

PROSECUTION OPENS IN GAMBLING CASES

Difficulties Encountered in Selection of Jurymen; Court Continues Session

After a hectic three hours spent in the selection of a jury satisfactory to both sides testimony was started in the case of the city of Twin Falls versus J. B. Barr in the court of Magistrate E. D. Reed Wednesday. More than three hours were spent in members of a panel of 11 names were examined and all preliminary challenges were exhausted by both sides before a jury of six men could be assembled to sit in judgment in the trial of J. B. Barr, operator of the club rooms over Magel's cigar store on Main avenue south, arrested on a gambling charge last Monday evening by local police officers and Deputy Sheriff E. P. Prater. Barr and three companions, C. I.

Dudley, W. M. Willis and Bert Magel, were found in the club rooms sitting about a table on which playing cards and other chips were scattered. Barr was charged with operating a gambling hall and his three companions with assisting him.

City Attorney E. M. Sengler presented two witnesses and submitted 14 exhibits for the prosecution before the adjournment of court Wednesday afternoon. The first witness called for the prosecution was Chief of Police R. E. Leighton. The chief stated that on the evening of September 28, he in company with police officers, Munro, Kempton and Sengler, and Deputy Sheriff E. P. Prater went to the club room above Magel's cigar store and found the four men named above seated about a table on which were playing cards and poker chips. As Leighton entered he saw Edwards push three chips to the center of the table.

Chief Door Unlocked. William Munro, police officer, was second witness summoned by the prosecution. He testified that he and the chief in the trial of J. B. Barr, operator of the club rooms over Magel's cigar store on Main avenue south, arrested on a gambling charge last Monday evening by local police officers and Deputy Sheriff E. P. Prater. Barr and three companions, C. I.

Edward. Both men testified that they were not in the club room in which the defendants were seated. The door leading to the room was not locked, and no resistance was offered. Exhibits presented by the prosecution were one of the two card tables found in the club rooms, a cabinet which stood at the left of the entrance to the club rooms, a stack of cards and some poker chips which were on the card table, a marked \$10 bill and some other money which was found in a drawer of the cabinet, 40 pairs containing about \$70 which was on a shelf of the cabinet; two Colt automatic revolvers and their holsters, a pair of dice, a pair of playing cards, one of them unopened, and a bag of poker chips found inside the cabinet. Other articles identified by the witnesses as having been in the cabinet, but which were not presented as evidence, were a wad of money, a chain and pen knife, a fountain pen, an automatic pencil, a spectacle case, a paper napkin, several pairs of sleeve buttons and two pairs of cuff links.

Case was adjourned after the dismissal of the second witness for the prosecution until 9:30 o'clock today. Attorneys for the defense are J. W. Taylor and John Kosharek. E. M. Sengler represents the prosecution. Members of the jury are John Rogers, F. W. Mackey, H. A. Stese, C. A. Sweninger, P. D. Brown and S. E. Rozelle.

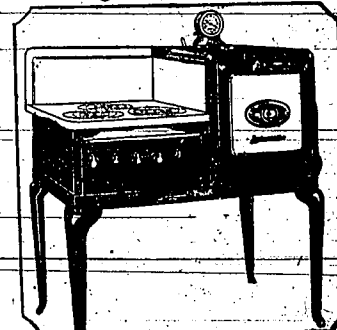

Miss Lorene, in company with two girl friends, was walking along the highway at the time. The child was taken to Twin Falls for medical treatment and she is now making recovery.

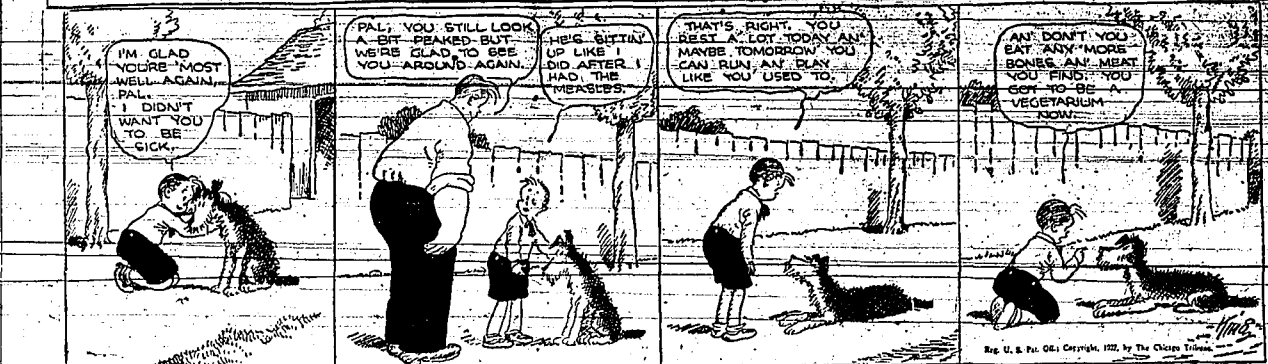
Interesting Wedding

The defendant, assisted, represented by North and Age, admit the hiring of plaintiffs without specific agreement as to price or time, but say that the audit was to be a limited audit and contend that the plaintiffs exceeded the terms of the agreement and that the charges are not reasonable. The defense that the \$1000 paid is ample compensation.
