ST. LOUIS 'HUNDREDS' OF HOMELESS SEEK SHELTER FROM RAIN

In Physical Aspect and Its Aftermath Tornado Was Worse; Red Cross Estimates 7800 Persons Are Affected.

(By The Associated Press) ST. LOUIS, Oct. 1.—Drenched by rain which fell intermittently, hundreds of survivors of the great St. Louis tornado which remained in their ruined homes were forced today to seek shelter elsewhere.

Both in its immediate physical aspect and its aftermath the tornado was worse than the one which struck the St. Louis area in 1902.

Los Angeles, Oct. 1.—Six armed men, advancing under cover of a machine gun manned by a seventh robber, rushed a branch of the Merchants' National bank here at noon today, held up five employees and 75 customers, clubbed a man and a woman and escaped with approximately \$4000 in cash.

Two officers stood guard at the door with flourished revolvers while outside the machine gun pointed on an expensive automobile believed to have been stolen, commanded the street in every direction.

Twin Falls Girls Scale Bridge For Motion Picture Cameramen

Fourteen young women, climbing out over the great Twin Falls-Jerome bridge early Saturday forenoon while motion picture cameramen recorded the scene, placed their lives in jeopardy and, incidentally, ruined their clothes in order to demonstrate the vast proportions of the granite structure.

The motion pictures, taken at this time and later in the day during the dedicatory services, are to be exhibited at the Twin Falls and Jerome and the civilized world by the International News Service and Hearst's Pictures.

The young women who dared death to make the pictures were Miss Helen Homestead, Miss Fern Dull, Miss Mary Colton and Miss Myrtle Johnson.

They spent all morning climbing over the huge steel towers and beams of the bridge, while the cameramen, who had been waiting for the girls to arrive, had the largest distribution of any news reel published and reaches every corner of the United States.

The Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer News produced by the International Newsreel also covered this event.

NEW YORK SECRETARY HELD ON CHARGE OF EMBEZZLING BIG SUM

Four Years Miss Anne Magovern Dances Down Primrose Path— to \$60,000; Then to Pay Piper; Takes Fortune.

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—Miss Anne Magovern danced down the primrose path—danced to a \$60,000 sum through her earnings during the last year—\$120,000—and today she was called on to pay the piper.

In this daytime she was a confidential secretary, receiving \$60 a week and the implicit trust of her employer, Edward Augustus, whose office with the Commercial Investment company in Park avenue. At night, however, she emerged from the shadows of the business world, a brilliant mouth fluttering to the brightness of the singing lights.

Her life changed abruptly during those nightly pilgrimages was not shared, though it is known that she has the time to devote to her salary. She herself summed it up in two words when she was herded with other dancers into the police lineup: "High living," she said. Admitting under the masked regard of the camera that the line-up that she had betrayed the confidence placed in her and she added, as if it were her afterthought:

"And being out with my friends."

Her name had been given her by the press. Arranged later in the day she was held in \$60,000 bail for hearing on a charge of embezzlement.

The specific charge against her mentioned embezzlement of only \$3000, but the large bail was set with police officers admitting that she had embezzled \$60,000. When attorneys for Augustus stated that the amount might be found to be even twice that sum.

Augustus told police that he had placed the confidence in his secretary and that she had given her power attorney, and placed her in control of a small separate bank account, and authorized her to sign his name to checks.

Two weeks ago he said she asked him to sign with her name to a check and something in her hand made him suspicious. He investigated and found Miss Magovern's name exercising her power of attorney, had deposited in the bank account "large sums of money."

He was not satisfied with breach of faith and she disappeared two weeks ago. Last night detectives broke into her luxurious apartment and arrested her.

"I have relatives in Danbury, Connecticut," she said today. "They own lots of real estate. They might help me make restitution."

They were mentioned particularly by Mr. Murray, leader and designer of the road, in his brief remarks by which he expressed appreciation for cooperation and support throughout the long period that culminated in the completion of the gigantic structure. They were 12-18 "rubber-tyred" engineers on the field while the highway bridge construction, and Frayre Moates of Twin Falls, engineer in charge of actual construction of the bridge.

Building of this bridge, the governor said, is a tribute not only for Twin Falls and Jerome, but for all Idaho. 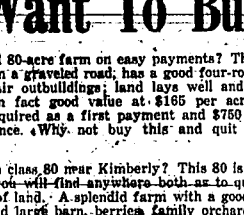

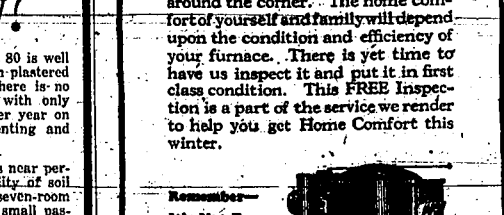

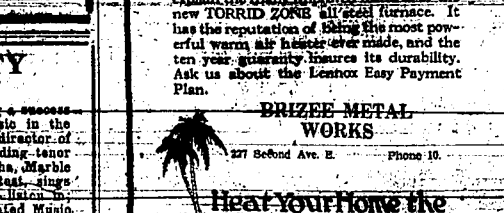

### NEW BY-LAW ORDINANCE ON SERVICE STATION

#### Continental Oil Company Denies Validity of Twin Falls Restricting Ordinance.

Constitutionality of Twin Falls ordinance, under which Twin Falls independent school district seeks to enjoin the Continental Oil company from installing a service station near Washington school, is challenged in amended answer filed Saturday by Walters and Parry in behalf of the company.

After a general denial in which each and every allegation in the complaint is denied, the answer, the answer states that the city council "did not have and do not have power or authority to enact" the ordinance in question and that the provisions are in violation of the constitution of the state of Idaho and of the constitution of the United States.

The ordinance was passed for the purpose of keeping service stations out of certain residential districts in the city limits.

The city brought action to stop the installation of the station by the Continental Oil company, papers filed in court were filed by M. M. Secretary city attorney, the school board through its attorney, Bothwell and Chapman. Intervenor for the same purpose, it is generally conceded that the case will be carried to the supreme court of Idaho and possibly to the supreme court of the United States to finally determine the power of the city to enact ordinances of this character.

### MARCH-KING STICKLER FOR PROMPT APPEARANCE

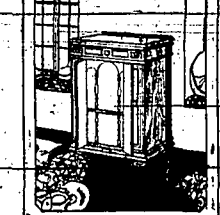

### Salmon Land Yields Immense Bean Crop

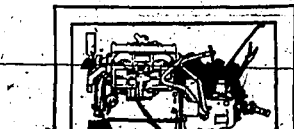

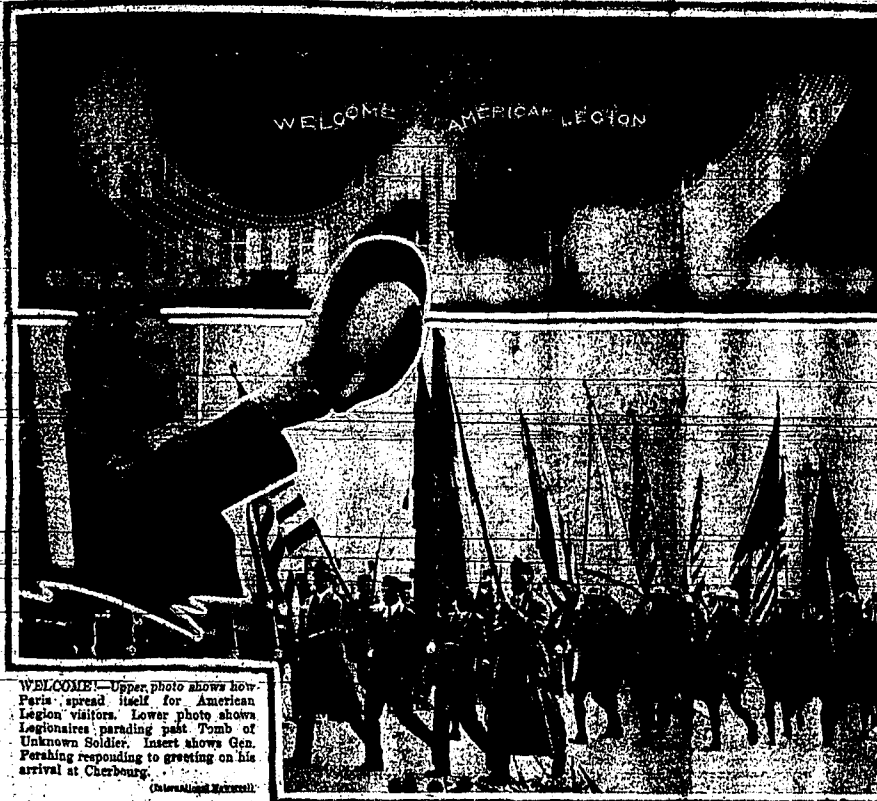
