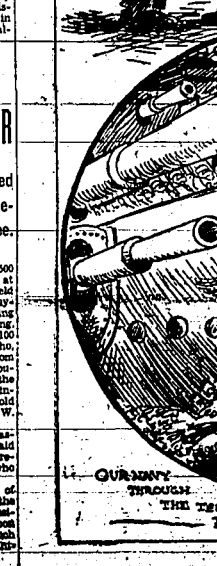

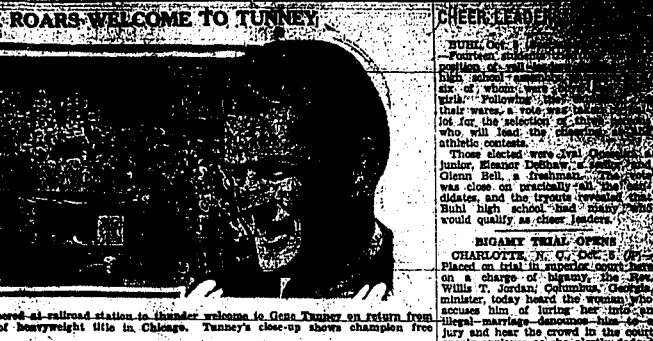

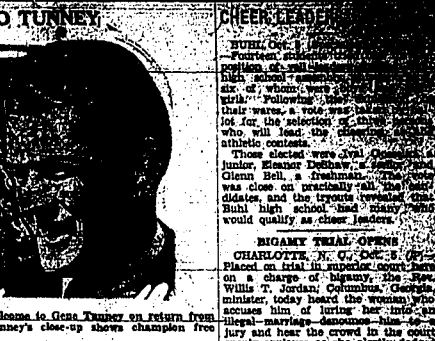

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HIGHWAY DISTRICT FILES ACTION TO SECURE EASEMENT

Court Proceedings Begin to Clear Way for Construction on Sawtooth Highway to Line of Nevada.

Court action was started Wednesday by the Twin Falls highway district to secure an easement on various tracts of land along the Sawtooth highway, otherwise known as the Yosemite to Yellowstone highway, for the construction of a road to the Nevada state line. The land in question lies between Rogerson and the Nevada state line. An easement 60 feet wide through the lands in question is asked.

Purposes of Suit
The purpose for which action was brought is to enable work to begin without delay. Most of the owners of property over which the highway will run have voluntarily signed up with the district. In some instances owners of land have delayed signing in some of their postoffice addresses could not be found and in some the title was mixed up. The suit was deemed better to clear it up by court action. All such cases were combined in the action filed by Sweeley and Sweeley, attorneys for the district.

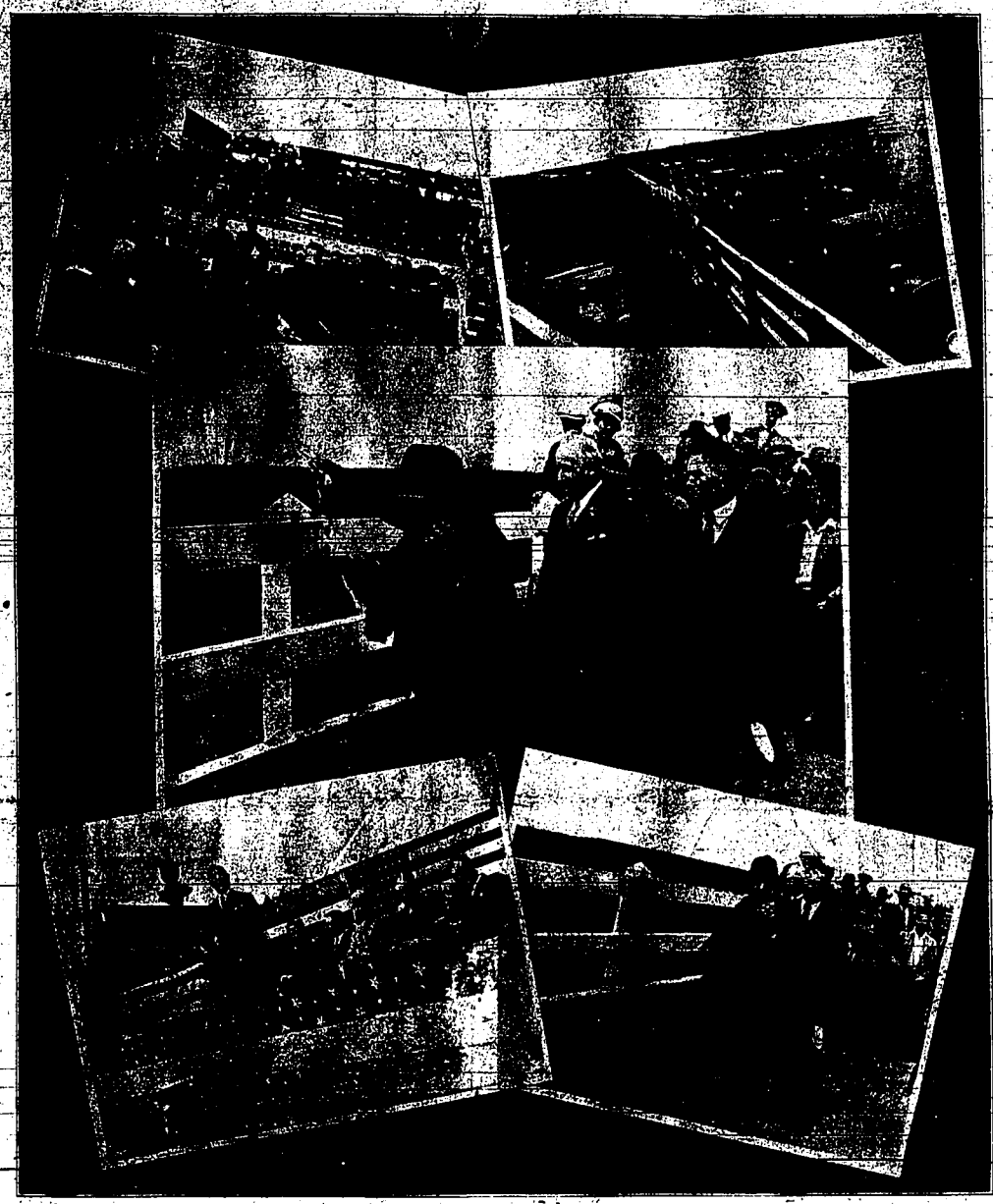

BERLIN FIREMEN IN PRAISE OF AMERICAN EXPERT OF FOLLOWING

Honorary Deputy Chief of New York City Department Considers German Capital's System of Ladders Preferable

(By The Associated Press) BERLIN, Oct. 5.—Berlin fire fighters are in the front rank of a great profession, said Robert Mainzer, honorary deputy chief of the New York fire department, in a conversation with a representative of the Associated Press.

Mainzer, known as the "millionaire fire buff," has been visiting his friend, Chief Commissioner Walter Gemp of the Berlin fire brigade.

His idea of a holiday has been to go out any night of the day or night with the firemen when the siren sounds an alarm.

"There seems little to choose between New York and Berlin firemen in the matter of smart turnout," Mainzer thinks. He timed his hosts with a stopwatch and caught them running up a 110 foot sectional ladder in one minute and 10 seconds after coming around the corner of a block. The New Yorker called that "pretty good."

In the matter of equipment the visitor said that he considered Berlin's system of sectional ladders preferable to the hook and ladder trucks of New York, which on account of their length make it a perilous operation to steer them around street corners on wet pavements. He would like to see the Berlin sectional ladders tried out in New York congested districts where old construction makes many dangerous turnings.

Berlin's method of combating flames is to use a foam which Mainzer says has been used only by private concerns in the United States, such as oil plants. In Berlin it is frequently applied to ordinary fires with great success. Commissioner Gemp told the New York expert.

Mainzer is on his first visit to Germany since the war and he was impressed by the way the German fire fighters have taken to sports. Between alarms they do long jumps, throw javelins and play football. He also noted that the German fire fighters are very clean and well dressed.

Police Men Know Language

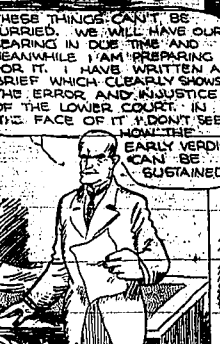

FARM MARKET ENJOY AT WORK IN CALIFORNIA CENTERS

R. L. Spangler of Boise in Los Angeles to Get Line on Produce Delivery and to Invite Recommendations.

BOISE, Oct. 5.—Making good their joint promise of several weeks ago to place a man in the market center of the country to help the Idaho farmer dispose of his crops, the Idaho State Chamber of Commerce and the state department of agriculture announce the appointment of R. L. Spangler to this place. Mr. Spangler's first work will be in the Los Angeles and San Diego markets and he has been there since October 3.

Mr. Spangler has been in charge of the farm markets bureau of the state department of agriculture and has been given leave of absence for his present work. He will visit brokers, commission merchants and buyers and convert them to the use of more Idaho produce. He will also seek out new markets for Idaho goods. For the present Mr. Spangler will confine his activities to the Pacific slope markets. Idaho farmers will be able to keep weekly tabs on the activities of the market man for he will make a weekly report. Through the cooperation of the state chamber of commerce and the state department of agriculture this report will be broadcast to all commercial organizations and newspapers of the state.

Watches Produce Arrivals
Just before he left for Los Angeles, Mr. Spangler said he expected to get right into the big wholesale markets where he could see the produce arriving, being unloaded from the cars. "This will enable me to determine whether or not Idaho produce is catching the market in good condition," he said, "and will also enable me to check the quality being shipped. From the various agencies which handle the produce I expect to determine whether or not the different packs are popular and get them to criticize Idaho produce. If they have any recommendations for improve-

ments I will pass these straight back to the origin of the crop."
Mr. Spangler is not unknown to Idaho produce growers. He graduated from the University of Idaho and after spending a year in Payette county as county agent he was called to the post of assistant seed commissioner in the extension division. He came to the state department of agriculture in the state party of 1922 and has remained there until the present time as head of the farm markets bureau.

PACIFIC FLEET MARRIES BEAUTIFUL DIXIE WOMAN

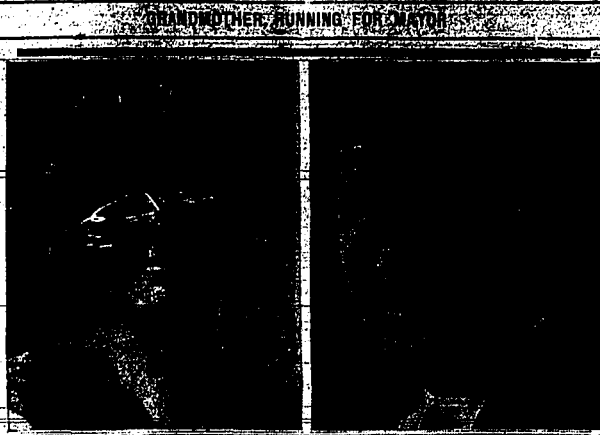

OLD ELEVATED LINE, A MARVEL IN 90'S, JUNKED

STOUC CITY, Iowa, Oct. 5 (AP)—The last section of the famous Sioux City elevated railroad, considered an engineering marvel in the 90's, is being junked.
The railroad has a noted feature of the boom period of Sioux City. It was said to have been the first electrified elevated railroad in the world.
It extended from Morningside, a suburb, to the heart of the city and cost \$200,000. Work was started in 1897, but the rapid development of the surface lines put it out of business.

SIMPLER LANGUAGE IS URGED IN RUSSIA

New Style of Writing Becomes too Complicated in Spite of Cancellations in Alphabet.

MOSCOW, Oct. 5 (AP)—Despite simplification of the Russian alphabet in 1917 by the cancellation of numerous consonants, Slav letters, the new Russian style of writing has become so complicated and so incomprehensible that there is much agitation for further reform.
Particularly in the press and in government publications has the language become unintelligible to the average Russian; because of an abundance of elaborate sentences and the frequent use of words of foreign derivation, mostly in economic and technical articles.

Few average Soviet readers can understand such writing, to say nothing of the bulk of peasants and workmen who have hardly been aroused as yet from centuries of illiteracy.
The invasion of foreign words is attributed in large part to the gathering of communists, who spent years in exile, or who were strangers to the Russia of the czar and who, coming to the Soviet states, brought with them many foreign terms. The influence of America is largely felt in such words as standards, link, bridge, foundation, conveyer and stabilization.

The complicated language of government decrees is given worse. In the code of labor, starting point of communism there are 192 paragraphs, which cover four large volumes. Even judges and lawyers are puzzled by some of the passages.
Many more books and publications are available than before the war, and they are cheap. A book of 150 to 160 pages sells for 50 or 60 cents, and the price is about the same for books translated from foreign tongues. But books of foreign publication are scarce and expensive, and those available are chiefly of economic, technical and medical matters. Foreign papers except of a revolutionary character, are barred to the masses though a careful selection of them, some months or years old, is available at a few government-owned book stores.

OIL REFINED IN OKLAHOMA TO OKLAHOMA UNIVERSITY

NORMAN, Okla., Oct. 5.—Since the receipt of the refinery, there is enough to handle 100,000 to 200,000 barrels of crude oil a day, the gift of a group of prominent manufacturers centers the University of Oklahoma has become the only school in the world where both theory and practice in oil refining is taught.
Fred Padgett, professor of petroleum engineering at Oklahoma university, announced the gift recently, and said the refinery would be installed in the fall. Installation of the plant will be the latest step in the development of the petroleum engineering branch of the school, which was said by the university last year to be the largest of its kind in the world.
The plant is to be operated for commercial purposes nor in competition with other refineries, but returns are expected to benefit from research that will be conducted. Several producers in Oklahoma have volunteered to supply oil for refining free.

BRITISH BOY IS ORATOR

BRISTOL, England, Oct. 5 (AP)—Lord Oxford is the world's best orator, and next to him ranks Stanley Baldwin, prime minister, in the opinion of 18-year-old James Keith Watson, who expected to benefit from research held at Washington in October.
Young Watson, a native of this small town, was selected from 800 "orator" candidates from secondary and grammar colleges in England.

Even since he has been seen on public speaking and has studied the world's great orators and analyzed the records of Abraham Lincoln, is greatest of the speakers of the past. Lord Gladstone he considers "too wordy."
The fact that President Coolidge and 8,000 people will hear him take part in the contest makes his success a bit narrow. He says he's going in for politics when he "grows up."
