General Kovachevitch, who lived at the end of a narrow lane, had just arrived at the door of his home accompanied by a priest and a friend named Jevremovitch when three shots were fired. One missed its mark, the second struck the general's head and the third imbedded itself in his heart killing the general on the spot.

General Kovachevitch was one of Serbia's most noted soldiers. He founded a troop of legionnaires during the Balkan wars.

A few seconds before the volley was fired Quijano turned his head and glanced around the courtyard. He was flanked by three foreign correspondents of the Associated Press, the New York Times and the New York Herald Tribune.

That was the end, and for a short time the body was permitted to lie on the ground of the old courtyard, whose bullet walls attest to many such deaths meted out there through the years since the revolution had failed in Mexico.

NEGRO EDUCATION IS BIG AID TO SOUTH

Making Good Farmers of Negroes Overcomes Many Problems in America.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6 (AP)—Making good farmers of the negroes overcomes many of the problems of racial adjustment in the south, believe E. H. Shinn, the government's chief specialist in agricultural education.

In evidence of an already better understanding between the white population of the south states and the negro, is the former's favorable attitude on their educational opportunities for the black race. The expenditure for negro education last year totalled \$7,700,000.

Federal farm extension work the Smith-Hughes vocational schools, and negro agricultural colleges, in each of the southern states, are interested in teaching better farm practice and helping negroes to increase their earnings by better methods and living conditions. The number of federally aided all-day negro agricultural schools increased from 39 in 1917-18 to more than 254, and the enrollment has risen from 1025 to 3374.

"This figure represents approximately 4 per cent of the 146,000,000 farm boys between the ages of 14 and 30 now attending school, last year 22,000 negro boys were enrolled in club work."

"There is no doubt," Dr. Shinn says, "that the extension work conducted by efficient Negro agents has had considerable influence in checking the movement of negro farmers to the cities." Government statistics show that more than 217,000 negroes in the South own their own farms, and that 700,000 negro farm tenants.

The first Negro farm extension agent in the south was appointed in 1904. The number of their government-trained cooperative extension agents, parents of their own race now exceed 800. Early cooperative demonstration work was aided materially by their Negro education, Booker T. Washington, and his Tuskegee Institute in Alabama.

HERD LAW ORDER IN ROSEWORTH DISTRICT ALLEGED TO BE VOID

Chester E. Brackett, in Suit Against P. C. Meredith for Price of Horses, Declares Action of Commissioners Invalid.

Legal action was started in district court here Thursday evening by attorneys for Chester E. Brackett, against P. C. Meredith and M. E. Finch, sheriff, to recover \$350, alleged value of 14 horses said to have been illegally seized by Meredith and Finch on October 3, 1926, near Roseworth by Sheriff Finch, and to recover the sum of \$22,000, alleged to be the value of the illegally charged cows, a portion of releasing seven cows.

The court is further asked to restrain Meredith and Finch from interfering with the horses, cattle and other animals, on the ground that the herd district, which defendants assume exists was never legally created.

It is asserted that Meredith took up the horses on the theory that they were running at large and threatening to trespass his property which is a herd district. Further, it is asserted that Meredith took up seven cows and refused to give them up unless paid \$22,000. It is asserted that the sheriff's act was under no legal obligation to pay it.

Brackett asserts that on November 13, 1926, Twin Falls county commissioners passed a resolution, in compliance with a petition which was filed before on which, it was claimed, there were the signatures of a majority of the people of a certain horse-district, to create a herd district in that district. That the petition was duly signed and filed is not challenged, but it is asserted that the commissioners proceeded without giving due notice to those who might want to protest, without defining the sort of animals that it was desired to prevent from running at large and without stating when the order would go into effect, or how long a period each year it would be in effect. It is therefore alleged that the action of the commissioners in issuing the order purporting to create a herd district was wholly illegal and void, and that the steps taken by Meredith and the sheriff under its provisions were invalid.

The horses are still in custody, and are advertised for sale October 7, the complaint states, though the exact hour or place is not named.

Recently Settled Suit The Brackett family and the Merediths a few weeks ago settled a lawsuit which had been pending for some time in the Roseworth reservoir site which was tried three times in the district court and was twice reversed in the supreme court. It was set for trial a third time here when settled.

DAUGHTER OF GOVERNOR UNIVERSITY HOUSE HEAD

Miss Lena L. Shoup, Member of One of Idaho's First Families, in Charge of Dormitory.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Oct. 6.—Miss Lena Shoup, daughter of the late George L. Shoup, last territorial and first state governor of Idaho, has been named house-mother of the newly completed "Gladys W. Hays" hall, women's dormitory. It has been announced here that Miss Shoup, who is truly one of the "first women" of Idaho, is a member of one of the most prominent pioneer families in the state.

Governor Shoup, who was identified closely with the pioneer official and political life of territorial and early state life of Idaho, was elected to the national Hall of Fame 20 years ago. The national congress adjourned during the program at the acceptance of the statue.

Miss Shoup was born in Salmon City, who also spent many the years of her life. The Shoup family lived in Washington, D. C., during the period Miss Shoup was a student at Idaho from 1883 to 1885. The family again resided in Salmon after their return from Washington. Last June Miss Shoup moved to Boise, where she since resided. She will take immediate charge of the dormitory.

Consisting upon her appointment, Farness J. French, dean of women, and herself a pioneer of Idaho, said: "Miss Shoup belongs to a family of the finest people, the experience of travel and many qualifications that will endear her to the young people of Idaho. To many friends of Senator Shoup in Idaho, as well as friends and acquaintances throughout the country, it will be a source of joy to know that Miss Shoup is to be at the University of Idaho."

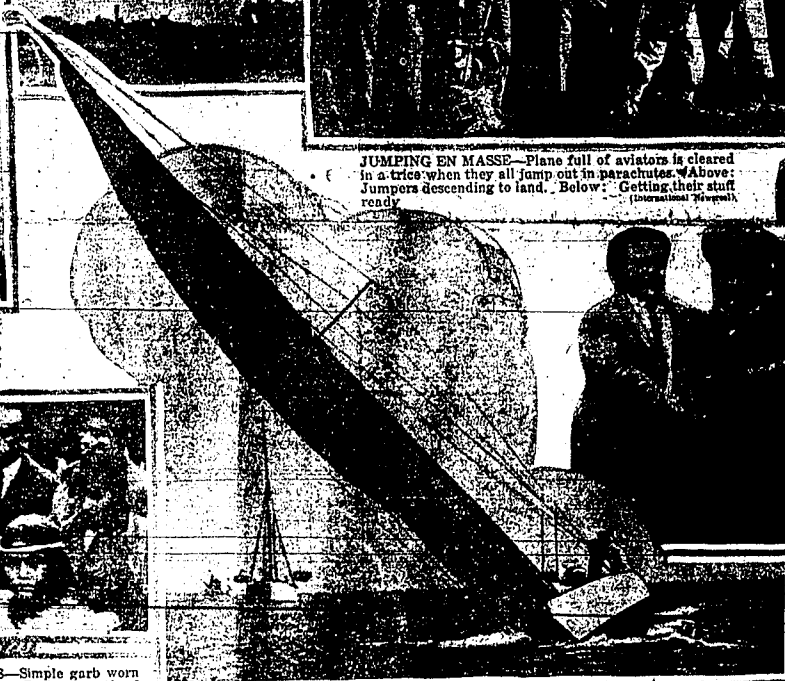

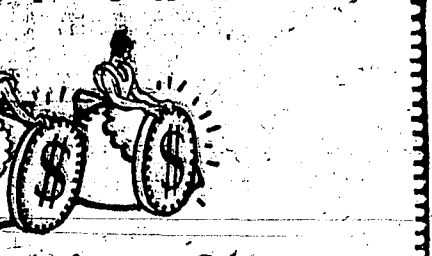

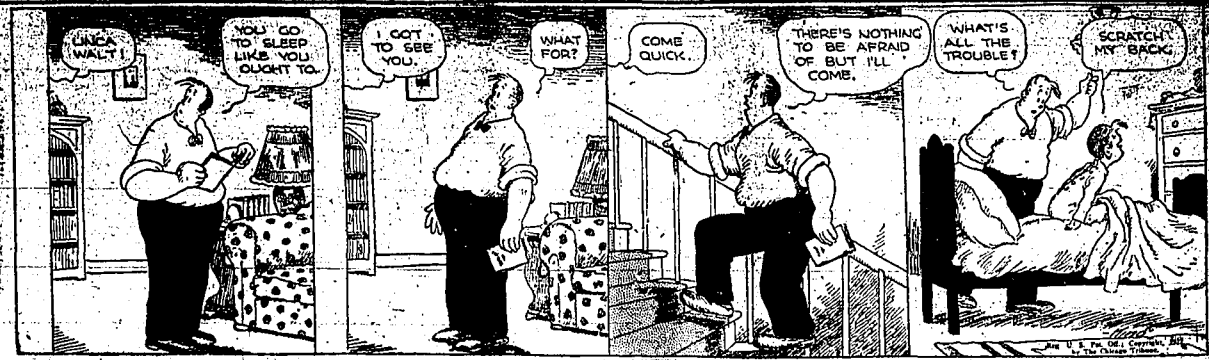

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NOISE OF BIG CITIES SLOWS OFFICE WORK, PSYCHOLOGIST PROVES

Stenographer Tapping Typewriter Keys in Roaring Business Section of Modern Metropolis Uses Much Energy.

(By The Associated Press) HAMILTON, N. Y., Oct. 6.—A stenographer tapping typewriter keys in the roaring business section of a modern city uses more energy and does less work than her sister in a quiet, small town, a Colgate University psychologist has proved.

Like her employer is definitely slowed up in his thinking when forced to concentrate amid the rattle of a busy city.

These conclusions are reached by Dr. Donald A. Laird, professor of psychology at Colgate, who has reduced to figures the effect of city noise on efficiency.

"At a place where the noise intensity is 40 units above quiet," the psychologist reports, "the typist uses 20 per cent more energy and does 5 per cent less work. The executive is slowed up 5 per cent in his thinking by a noise intensity of 30 units."

Professor Laird measures sound volume with a soundometer. Energy used by apparatus that analyzes the carbon dioxide in the expired breath.

The heart of Chicago beats with a more deafening roar than that of New York. Dr. Laird determined when he set up his paraphernalia in a quiet suburb of that city. The investigator found that Windy City business men toll under a noise intensity of about 65 units which, he estimates, tends to slow them up more than 10 per cent.

At Thirty-third street and Sixth avenue in New York a noise intensity of 55 units. The down town worker in Boston is never feeling a noise handicap of only 30 units.

Professor Laird criticizes the modern office building for its noisiness and its consequent effect on health.

"These buildings are made as fireproof as possible," he says, "the direct result of such construction is that the building is nearly as great a hazard on health as any other type would be on life through fire. It reflects noise better than a mirror reflects light."

The constant roar of the modern city, he finds, has the deafening effect of the machine-shop's clatter on the human ear.

"The worker who spends much of his time in such a place," he says, "eventually becomes more or less hard of hearing, sometimes actually losing his hearing entirely. Our tests proved that a worker who is always surrounded by noise is affected similarly through fatigue of the ears.

Automobile sirens and elevated railroads are the most flagrant noise producers of large cities.

Residential districts are only one-third as noisy as business blocks, but even in bed the city dweller is rarely able to enjoy complete rest. Experiments conducted by Dr. Laird in his laboratory show that the sleeper's pulse pressure immediately rises when an automobile honks outside or a flat-wheeled trolley bumps past.

BURLEY DISTRICT TURNS ATTENTION TO SEEPAGE

BURLEY, Oct. 6.—Seepage on the south side of the Minidoka tract was given consideration at the meeting Monday of the board of directors of the Burley Irrigation district.

No more damage has been done so far by the rise of the water table on the south side of the river, but the steady encroaching of underground water gives notice that steps must ultimately be taken to protect some of the farms.

Various methods of reducing the height of the water table were discussed at this meeting, and it was decided to call a public meeting in the near future to unite on a plan. One method favorably considered by the irrigation board seems to be the installation of pumps, with rotating ditches, the water ejected to be discharged into the main canals, thereby paying for the cost of the pumps by increasing the available amount of water for irrigating purposes.

The ground water, at the end of the irrigating season, makes itself felt in Burley, many basements being turned into pools that are made use of by the youth of the city for navigation experiments.

Lithuanian Girl Comes to Canada to Get Ahead of Quota Law; Finds Self Looked Out

Love may laugh at locksmiths, but the fair and fickle goddess cannot move the heart of Uncle Sam, should her whims run counter to the regulations of that execrable individual governing entrance to the country from foreign parts.

LONDON HORSE GUARD ADDS COLOR TO LIFE

Bit of Old Pageantry Holds Interest of English and Draws Attention of Many Americans

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—The Horse Guards is a bit of old London, whose pageantry adds color to lives of citizens and to thousands of American visitors. Turning at Chancery Cross the stranger looks down that picturesque avenue leading to Westminster Abbey and the houses of parliament whose middle course bears the name of Whitehall.

On the right side of the street just beyond the stately pile of the foreign office stands a gray stone Georgian structure back from the street and surmounted by a great clock tower. The predominant feature of the building. This is the Horse Guards.

More walls of sooty-stone, however, representative of eighteenth century architecture. At first escape notice as together. Attention is riveted on the two mounted sentries at the sides of the entrance gate. Only later does one become conscious of their black ground. For there are what the National Geographic society calls the "soldiers of one's boyhood dreams," corporeous and romantic and mainly heavily equipped.

Great six-foot men they are, mounted on alien steeds, and resplendent in steel and scarlet and gold. Motionless as statues stand like and rider, except when a smart salute greets some passing army officer. Such a salutation is accompanied by so much clatter of metal armor that drummy officials not exceeding this demonstration of respect have been brought back to earth with a most undignified jump.

Never a smile crosses the guard's face, and his horse seldom moves. It is an open question between London children and their surmises as to whether the statues are real or wax. Like the figures at Madame Taud's museum. They are the leaders of the royal household, and come to life. There they stand day in and day out, summer and winter.

Every thought the individual sentries have, is much alike as they stand. The yearly visitor to London has the feeling that the same friendly "houseman" greets his eyes that saluted his soul last year and the year before.

The old Georgian building known as the Horse Guards is used for military purposes, containing at present the office of the home forces. It occupies the site of the life yard of Whitehall Palace which Henry VIII took from Cardinal Wolsey upon the latter's downfall. In this palace, Elizabeth held her court, in front of it Charles I was beheaded; and at Whitehall Charles II led his merry life under the motto of "eat-to-keep his own throne."

Shortly after the "great reign" of James II the palace was burned leaving only the banqueting hall, which stands to the present day, and which was perhaps the most beautiful part of the royal residence, having been planned by the famous architect, Inigo Jones.

The Horse Guards held dates from the middle of the eighteenth century and is an excellent example of Georgian architecture. It served originally as barracks for royal guardsmen. An entryway under the clock tower leads to a gravelled open space facing St. James park. Through this arched way the king and a few highly privileged persons may drive, and the
