REPUBLICAN PARTY'S PROGRESSIVES MEET TO PICK CANDIDATE

Senator Norris, Nebraska, Leader of Insurgent Group in Senate is Foremost Among Men Under Consideration.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—Republican progressives from some of the great western states have initiated a series of conferences looking to an agreement upon a candidate for presidential nomination in those states next year. Senator Norris of Nebraska, who has succeeded the late Senator Robert La Follette as leader of the insurgent group in the senate, is foremost among those now under consideration.

OFFICIALS CONSIDER FRENCH REFUND PLAN

Debtor Would Wipe Out \$100,000,000 Private Loan Due Financiers in United States.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—Coincident with the completion of the American reply to the last French loan offer, the Washington administration is giving renewed consideration to France's desire to refund as an early date the \$100,000,000 private loan which is outstanding in this country. While the tariff issue and the higher customs and duty question there is a feeling among some high government officers that a definite assurance to France of a favorable attitude toward the financial transaction could not help but improve materially existing Franco-American relations.

BULGARIANS REGRET KILLING OF OFFICER

Government Desires to Maintain and Improve Relations With Jugo-Slavian Nation.

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Deep regret and stern disapproval are felt by the Bulgarian government for the assassination of General Kovachevich and recent frontier incidents which have caused trouble for Bulgaria and which was learned today in official circles here. The Bulgarian government is desirous to maintain and improve its relations with Jugo-Slavia and to dispel any distrust of the outside world concerning Bulgaria's war and peace efforts toward peace, it was stated.

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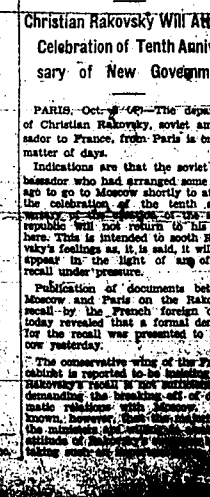
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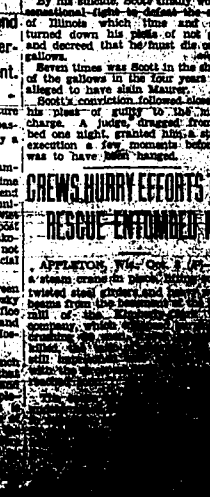

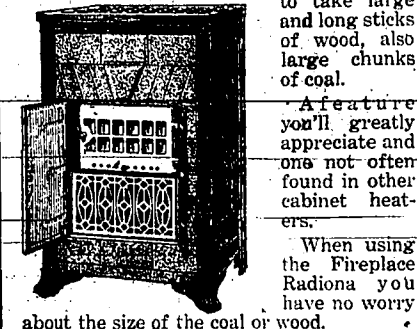

It was tragic for a bit of poetic, it also tragic, for the Yankees to lose the world's series after, to win a baseball's premier title by the same method they first used in 1914.

... Gushing through four straight victories to climax the greatest and most spectacular season of their history, the Yankees equalled the record of the Boston Braves, who scored the only other series clean sweep in four games when they trounced the Athletics in 1914.

... Wilcox Moore, the big Oklahoma catcher, received credit for the deciding Yankee victory but the master of the "dinker ball" twirling his first world's series game, was lucky to win the duel, but with the combined curves of Hill and Millis.

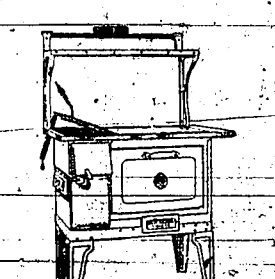

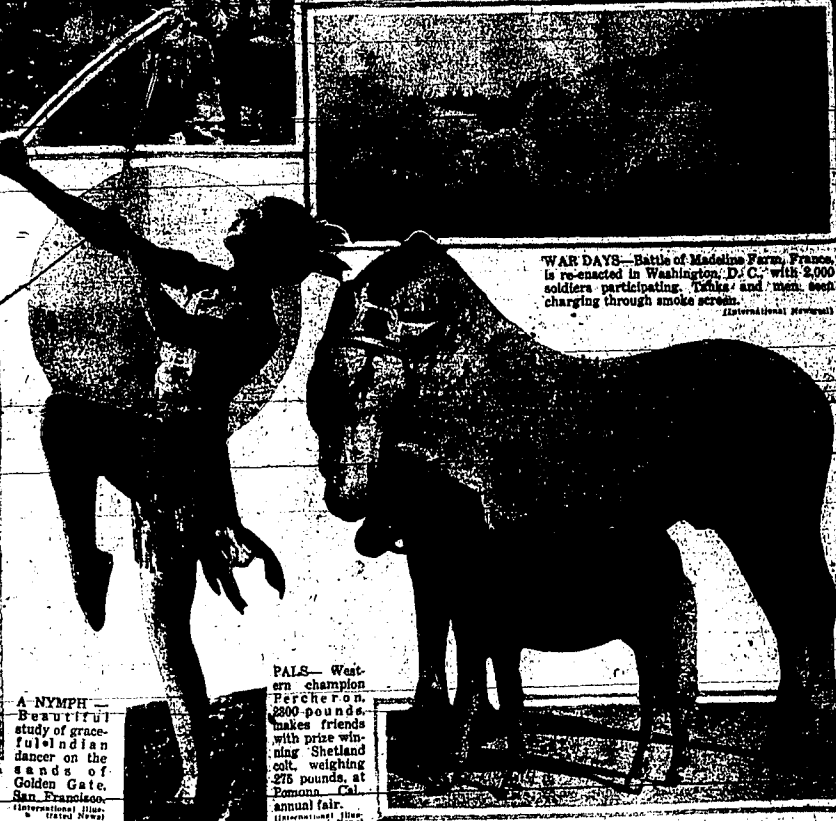

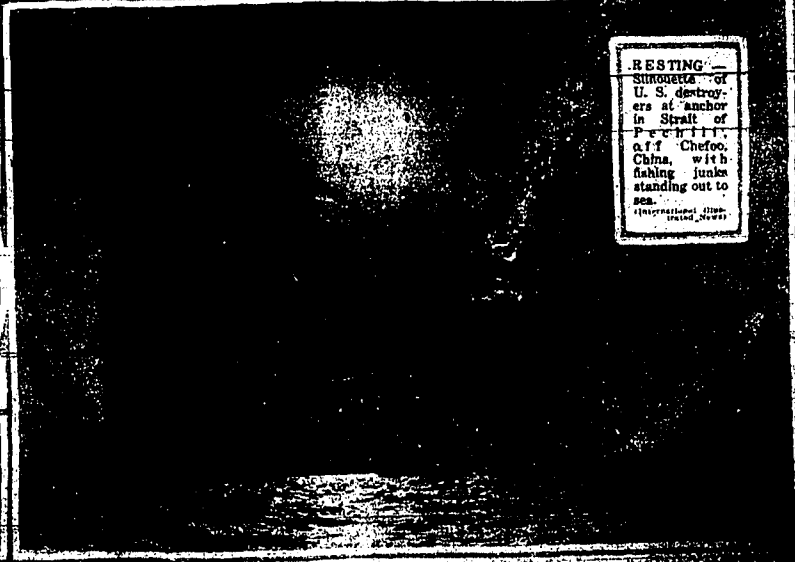

WELL-OVER HEALTH OF CITIZENS OF PARIS LEADS TO APPOINTMENT OF OFFICERS SIX MEN WILL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR PRODUCTS.

(By The Associated Press)
PARIS, Oct. 8.—Appointment of health inspectors in Paris takes more in the field over the health of citizens. So many cases of poisoning from the wrong variety of mushrooms have been reported in France during the summer that the Parisian authorities have named six men, who will be responsible for eliminating all poisonous fungi from the city's mushroom crop. They must inspect every mushroom sold for consumption in Paris, and in addition, will visit each and every house brought in partially and for their own consumption by thorough housewives.

Mushrooms continue to be among the most popular of dishes and only among the wealthy strata but not among the poorer classes as well. There was some falling off in the trade early in the fall because of the mushroom crop disappointing, but since the falling of inspectors it has reached its full swing.

The American's Idea
PARIS, Oct. 8.—The cylinder cars, whose price reductions and a number of American improvements will be the theme of the French Automobile show this fall, France always has had heretofore to be the model in automobile construction and practice; but she has had to follow America in many things since the war, such as the closed motor, self-starting, better lighting, spring design and accessories such as the windshield wiper, battery ignition, window-operated doors, and the general adoption of the electric light.

The cylinder cars have long been general in larger, expensive cars but this year the low priced, quality production makes are falling into line. A year from now a majority of the cars are expected by engineers to follow suit. Reliability, however, the American consider small, light, high-compression motors.

Air, oil and gasoline purifiers are among the American ideas that will appear on many cars.

Prices that went up with a bump during the money panic of 1921 have been going down slowly but the bubble is expected to bring a general revulsion of desire and probably the elimination of many models. The automobile industry has always contributed to the high cost of manufacture here.

French Use Benzene
PARIS, Oct. 8.—A reinforced concrete church, the first in France, has opened here this morning in a building above all in economy to towns seeking to afford the great expensive stone structures that beautify the country.

For \$12,000, the tower of Montmartre is not far from Paris, has built a church 130 by 43 feet, with high lead-covered and steeply pitched roof. The upper two-thirds of the four walls are half-colored glass, set in a plain cross



UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT DEPLORES USE OF STUDENTS IN PROPAGANDA

URBANA, Ill., Oct. 8.—In recent years there has been a notable increase in the attempts by religious, educational, political and other organizations to use the college and university students for purposes of propaganda.

A tendency to mold what is called "student opinion" in a manner to influence political action, national and international, on the part of the university students has been a matter of public policy in especially apparent. Conferees have been called by individuals, representative of students and institutions have attended and resolutions have been drawn up to be presented to congress or the president or to some other public authority.

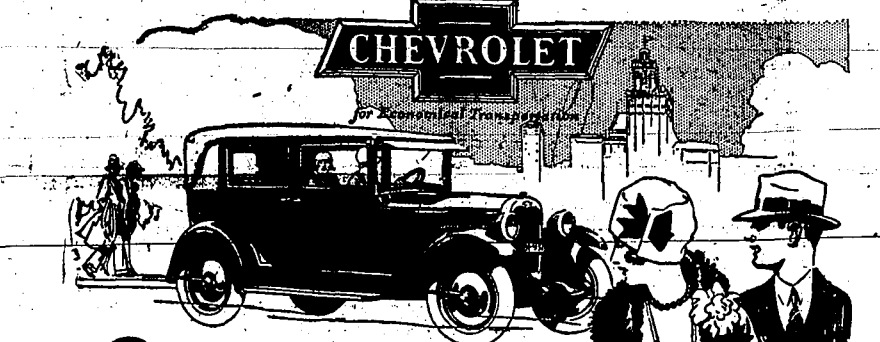

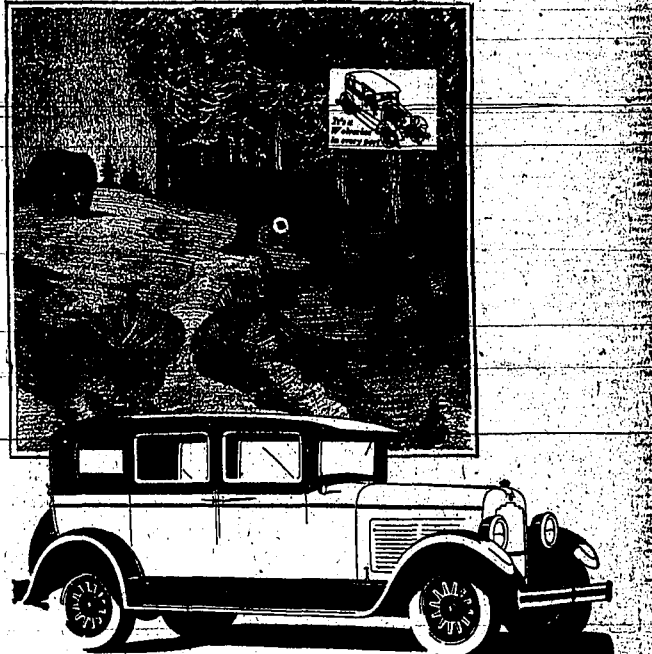
