City Administration 'Doing Its Best With Funds Available, Mayor Says in Reply to Chamber Directors' Resolution.

W. E. Bobler, Twin Falls mayor, in reply to Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce directors' demand for reorganization of the police force, has declared that he will do his best to provide for policemen now than he had when the budget for the year was adopted.

The chamber of commerce merchants committee has endorsed the directors' resolution and designated a committee of three members to attempt to work out with the city council and police department a plan for more adequate policing of the business section.

These were outstanding developments of the day Monday following the discovery Sunday morning of evidence of a series of burglaries during the night in which approximately \$500 was taken out of the safe at the W. H. Wright and Sons company store.

The chamber of commerce directors adopted their resolutions at a meeting at noon at which time the text of the resolutions was made public, a copy being delivered to the city council and in regular session Monday evening.

The chamber of commerce merchants' committee called Ralph E. Leighton, Twin Falls chief of police, in conference at its special meeting Monday evening at which the committee's endorsement of the resolutions and its further action in the matter were recorded.

Twin Falls police force is composed of three patrolmen besides the chief. Mr. Leighton told the merchants. Each man on the force is on duty 12 hours each day and is subject to call for extra duty without extra compensation. Salary of patrolmen is \$120 a month.

Merchants' police-officers who are paid by the merchants are not under the authority of the police. Mr. Leighton stated, A. M. Peters, one of the merchants' police officers, who is also chief stated, is deputized by the police and cooperates with the police but is not called upon to advise as to what officers outside the business district. W. C. Griffin, merchants' police officer, holds an appointment as deputy sheriff, one police chief stated.

The merchants' committee on motion of George E. Balch, manager of Wright's store, adopted a motion endorsing the directors' resolutions calling for reorganization of the police force and authorized appointment of a committee to confer with the city council and police officials with view to working out a plan for more adequate policing of the business district.

Appointment of L. E. Salladay, George E. Balch and Mr. Gans to be members of this committee was announced by D. D. Alford, chairman of the merchants' committee.

Expressing the opinion that officers should be given encouragement in the performance of their duty, the merchants' committee adopted a resolution offered by T. J. Lloyd commending "effective and determined effort on the part of Officer Peters in making an arrest recently at the rear of the Diamond Hardware company store" in the case of an apparent attempt at burglary. Officer Peters stopped with a bullet one of the two men who ran from the scene when he called on them to halt. The bullet shattered the suspected man's leg and as a patient now at the county general hospital.

The resolutions were signed by Asher Wilson, president—and—Newell S. Wright, secretary of the chamber of commerce.

Endorsement of the resolutions for the credit association was made by a committee composed of Arthur S. Bookwitz, L. E. Salladay, Robert Logan and J. J. Hughes, secretary.

The mayor's statement when the resolutions were presented at the council meeting was seconded by J. E. White, police commissioner, who stated that "what Leighton expresses my sentiments." On motion of Commissioner Ralph E. Smith, the resolutions were referred to the police department.

SPUDS AND ONIONS PROMISED RATE CUT Oregon Short Line Announces Reduction Next Month; New Size Shipment Is Inaugurated.

A new freight-rate to San Francisco on onions from Twin Falls and other Oregon Short Line points will go into effect November 12. It was announced Monday by P. E. Haasch, Oregon Short Line agent here.

Freight on onions here is 30.00 or 40.00 pound car. The new rates apply to 36,000 pound shipment. The new rates will affect shipment to intermediate points and San Joaquin and central California points.

Under present rates the charge is 57½ cents per hundred for 20,000 or 31 cents per hundred for 40,000 shipment, by way of Ogden or Salt Lake. The new rate for the 36,000 shipment is 55 cents over the same route. By way of Wells the present rate is 62 cents for the 30,000 pound shipment or 65½ for the 40,000 shipment. Under the new rate the 36,000 pound shipment will go over the Wells route for 52 cents over the same route.

A twin route on the rate by way of Ogden or Salt Lake is nine and one-half cents under the old small car rate or three cents under the big car rate. On the Wells branch the reduction below the present big car schedule is nine cents and below the small car schedule is one-half cent.

Mr. Haasch said that there is considerable activity in shipments of potatoes to points involved and predicted increased transportation over the Wells branch under the new rate. From Bulli the new rate over the Wells branch will be 54 cents, with two or eight and a half cents under the present rates. From Repton the cut will be approximately the same as from Twin Falls.

CRACKSMEN DESIEND UPON SEVEN STORES DURING ONE NIGHT

Batter Way into Safe to Take \$500 and Drop Task Almost Within Reach of \$3200 in Another Strongbox.

Burglars here early Sunday morning ransacked a dozen stores to hammer their way into two safes and filled cash drawers in five other places. The burglars' first attempt to enter two other places of business. They took approximately \$500 in cash out of the store at W. H. Wright and Sons company store on Shoshone street. They left the Brunswick cigar store, Main avenue, and the Brunswick cigar store, Second avenue east, with one safe that contained \$3200 in cash and checks. Cash drawers in each case of the store at W. H. Wright and Sons company store yielded nothing to the burglars. Loss of 150 meters from the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce office of business on Second avenue east was attributed to the cracksmen.

The burglars abandoned their tools at the Brunswick cigar store. These tools, which included a heavy sledge, wrench, saw, four chisels and punch, were believed to have been taken from places entered by the burglars during the night. A heavy crowbar was found in the name of the Brizee Metal works, Second avenue east.

Police stated that the burglars in each case entered through windows or inadequately barred doors, and covered their tracks so that nothing was left to indicate their presence. The burglars were at work in the buildings while they were at work in the buildings and fingerprints were left in some places. The officers stated last evening that several suspected persons are under surveillance and a widespread search is being made for others.

A list of the places which the burglars entered during the night includes, besides the Wright store and the Brunswick cigar store, the Brizee Metal works, and the Brunswick cigar store, Main avenue, south. CANAL COMPANY CAN BE FORCED BY CITY TO REGULATE WATER

Captain Sweeley Gives Opinion on Eighth Avenue Lateral Sunday Rink Taboo; Clerk Makes Report.

That the Twin Falls Canal company cannot be compelled to cover the eighth avenue lateral but can be compelled to keep the water within the limits necessary for the conveyance and to abate a nuisance where the same has been created by too high a spread either from cutting away the street or undermining trees, was the opinion given last evening by Captain E. M. Sweeley, city attorney.

Marion Case Prevails The city attorney stated that he had investigated the condition of covering the canal company to either shore the ditch or cover it, and that in view of the ruling of the supreme court in the Haizan case, he was convinced that neither could be done. The right to use water was granted to M. M. Murtaugh on September 7, 1908.

Could Bell Water Captain Sweeley said that the city owned water rights over and above water in use, valued at approximately \$100 a year, and that these were sold by the city the money could be used to cover the ditch. At present the canal company gets the benefit of unused water which the city owns, he stated.

W. O. Hubert appeared to ask the council if he could run his skating rink by the city the money could be used to cover the ditch. The city attorney informed him that there being no ordinance covering the matter the council has no authority to grant it. However, Captain Sweeley said, since this was not the things specifically permitted by statute he did not feel forbidden. Hubert said he did not wish to violate any law, either city or state.

LOU GEHRIG IS MOST VALUABLE PLAYER IN BIG AMERICAN LEAGUE

Selection of "Larruping Lou" Made by Committee of Baseball Writers From Various Cities of Circuit.

(By The Associated Press) CHICAGO, Oct. 11.—"Larruping Lou" Gehrig, first baseman with the world's champion Yankees tonight was proclaimed the most valuable player in the American league for the 1927 season.

Selection of Gehrig, who gave "base" Ruth a sibling battle for home run honors, and finished with a total of 47, more than any other player in baseball history with the exception of the Bambino himself, was made by a committee of baseball writers comprising the cities of the league.

All but one of the first choice votes were given to Gehrig who won the coveted honor with 56 points out of a possible 64.

Helmuth Banks High Gehrig's nearest competitor for the honors were Harry Hellman, Detroit outfielder and 1927 batting champion of the American league, and Tommy White Sox, Helman had 35 points while 34 went to Lyons.

The only dissenting vote was cast for Tony Lazzeri, as the most valuable player to the Yankees. Twenty-five players were named in this year's competition.

President Ben Johnson of the American league is announcing the results of the balloting, praised Gehrig as a great example for the youth of today.

Gehrig's season umpires no trouble, President Johnson said, tends strictly to business, and has always given his job his best effort.

Third in batting list Gehrig finishing third in the batting list of leading American league hitters, closed the season with the honor of driving in more runs than any other player in the league.

Steadily built and somewhat shorter than Ruth, Gehrig follows through in batting with the same powerful swing that enabled the Babe to set a baseball record of 47 home runs.

Cheerful in the American league's hall of fame adds to the list which began with Ty Cobb in 1911.

Ruth was the choice in 1923, Walter Johnson in 1924, Roger Federer in 1925 and George Burns in 1926.

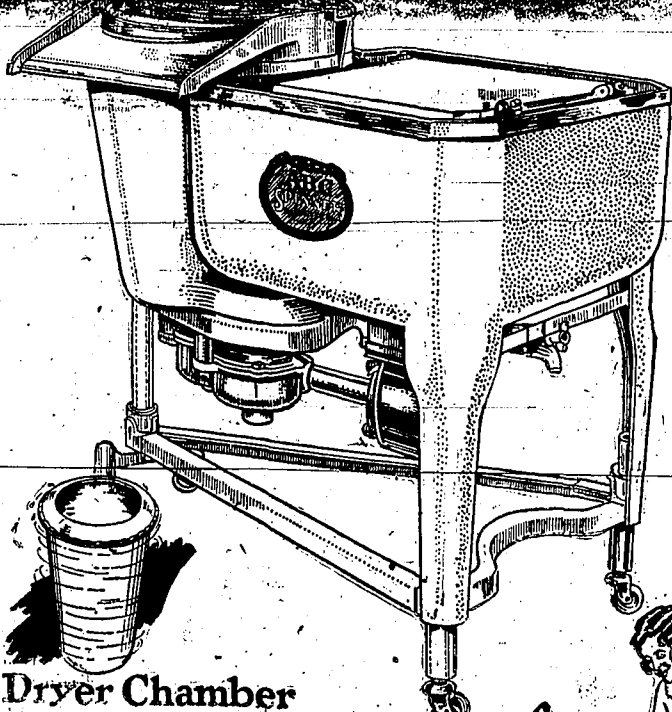

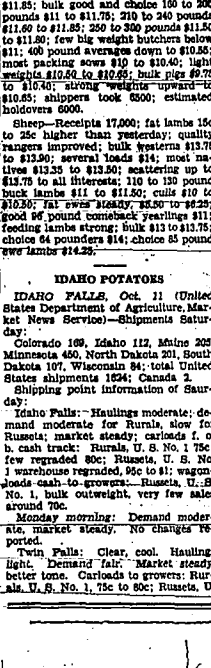

Rallies failed to hold well in the wheat market and the grain was within 1¢ of the day's previous price, little notice is taken of the fact that the Canadian government crop report appeared bullish.

Outweighing everything else was the knowledge that the new Washington figures on domestic spring wheat yield this season were materially in excess of last month's forecast, whereas production had been expected.

Export buying announced. On the break to wheat prices, export buying of 500,000 bushels was announced, largely domestic, both hard winter and soft.

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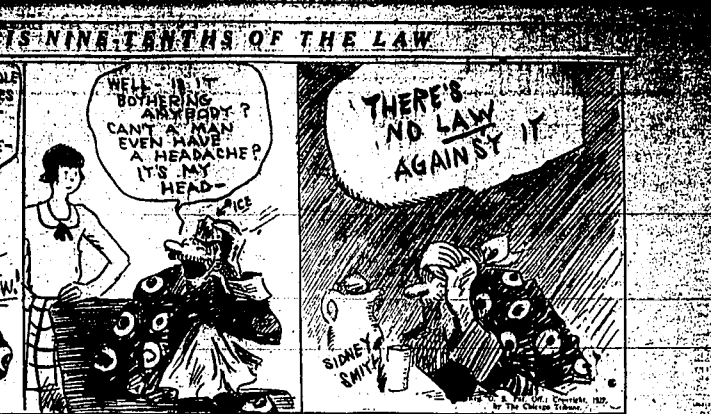

SYSTEM COST OF OPERATION FALLS AND SURPLUS GROWS

Audit of H. C. Edmunds for Twin Falls Company Shows Satisfactory Condition of Finances.

Cost of operation of the Twin Falls Canal system for 1927, without depreciation, was \$1,262,815 less than for 1926, or, after deducting \$12,516 for depreciation, showing a net reduction of cost of \$1,275,331, say one of the high lights of the annual audit of the Twin Falls Company filed by H. C. Edmunds, public accountant, and accepted Tuesday by board of directors of the company.

The report shows an increase of cash receipts over disbursements of \$10,544,408. The cash on hand September 15, 1926, amounted to \$12,009,944. The total cash receipts from all sources amounted to \$54,242,623. The disbursements amounted to \$43,698,215, leaving a balance of \$35,601,622. An excess of revenue of \$11,926,060 over the amount of expenditures estimated in the budget and in the statements on the budget analysis.

In his comments on the comparative balance sheet Mr. Edmunds says: "This exhibit affords a comparative study, in detail, of the movement of your assets and liabilities accounts for the fiscal year of 1926 and 1927. The liabilities were decreased \$102,000, and the assets were decreased \$42,198,874, or a net increase of surplus of \$39,200,116. This total, it is suggested, will be reduced when the notes and accounts receivable have been adjusted."

The cash receipts making up the total of \$54,242,623, noted above were as follows: Maintenance, \$409,122,181; notes and accounts receivable, \$26,036,772; sale of material and supplies, \$3,276,537; refunds of expenses, \$4,821,474; miscellaneous receipts, \$10,847,171; borrowed money, \$75,000. The cash disbursements totalling \$43,698,215 comprised a total reduction of debt of \$17,000 of which \$10,000 in the form of redemption of notes, \$43,000 in redemption of bonds and \$2,000 in redemption of mortgages.

Capital outlay amounted to \$20,980,671 including \$10,778 for buildings and improvements, \$18,568.01 for machinery, tools and equipment, \$121,451 for autos, trucks, etc.; \$408 for horses and mules and \$32,225 for furniture and fixtures. The total cost of \$14,450 of which \$20,850 was for settlement with the Twin Falls Land and Water company, is for depreciation, penalty, and \$78 surplus and deficit. Operating expenses amounted to \$335,519.36.

Suggestions in Report: New inventory system by means of cards is suggested and mapped out at some length. In the collection it is urged that there should be activity in getting in amounts owed on collectible notes receivable. If petty accounts receivable similar activity is suggested. Oil drainage accounts aggregating \$8196.67, it is suggested, are of long standing and should be collected and should be cleared off. Of the domestic well account amounting to \$30,054.00 it is suggested that "these accounts should be adjusted on your books as soon as their collectibility is determined. Opening of a reserve for depreciation account is recommended and noting of the depreciation in the budget is suggested. It was stated that Alexander Burton Smith has approved of some of the suggestions made which have to do with his work.

It was stated also that "all cash receipts and disbursements were checked and verified; the cash in the secretary's office was counted and bank balances reconciled."
