

SUPPLY OF CARS FOR MOVING PRODUCTS OF IDAHO INSUFFICIENT

Heavy Movement of Perishable Freight From Western States Causes an Emergency; Twin Falls District Is Affected.

BOISE, Oct. 12 (AP)—The available supply for the movement of crops will be approximately 50 per cent of the expected demand, railroad officials here today said in a public utility commission a conference called by Will H. Gibson, president and chairman of the central western shippers' association to relieve the situation. The emergency is expected to last not more than two weeks.

Fifty per cent movement of perishable freight from the western states during the past 30 days caused the emergency and the situation has been further aggravated by the recent peak movement of Idaho perishables.

Recommendations adopted by the conference, attended by officials of the department of agriculture, utilities commission and railroad officials and urged upon shippers as imperative for the best interests of the public, are:

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SPECIALISTS UNABLE TO DECIDE STATUS OF ELEVEN

Explanation of Idaho-Oregon Scoreless Tie Lies in Fact That Oregon Drilled to Minimize Invaders' Drive.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Oct. 13.—Idaho's football specialists are unable to decide whether the scoreless tie with Oregon, Nov. 5, was a game for both schools this season or a "moral victory" for Idaho, for Oregon, or neither. The critics were divided on the explanation. One group said Idaho would win if the Vandals could stop the terrific Oregon passing attack, which they did. Another group contended Oregon would win its line could stem the Vandal power attack, which it did. Both elevens did what they were supposed to do defensively and did it so well that neither offense got underway.

The explanation of the Idaho-Oregon scoreless tie lies perhaps in the fact that the entire week before the game Oregon drilled in plays aimed to minimize the threatening Idaho drive. The outcome was the exact reverse of what was expected.

Idaho's Problem

Idaho's problem now is to get her former attack and defense to mesh under way in the same game. During the coming three weeks the Vandals will have an excellent opportunity to develop and give the new men experience. Next Saturday Idaho certifies a rather puzzling club. Frictions form in all groups and one man must dominate all factions and have real authority. A rubber stamp president will not do. My successor must rule with an iron hand without regard for friendship or factions."

President Johnson, peering into the "future" can see "no signs" of wanting to leave, but feels that the sources of baseball supply are drying up and that new schools for baseball development must spring up.
