University of Southern California and Cardinals Battle to Stunning Ending.

STANFORD STADIUM, Cal., Oct. 15 (AP)—In a thrilling spectacle for game climaxed by a stunning ending—the Trojans of University of Southern California and the Cardinals battled to a great 13-13 tie here today.

Led by a brave substitute fullback—Herb Pflaumer—the weary Cardinals hung their greatest challenge of the game to crash over a touchdown and to their rivalized rival.

Some 60,000 persons gripped their seats at the intensive play as Pflaumer, packing the ball seven times successively ripped off a total of 21 yards to bring the ball three yards from Trojans scoring turf.

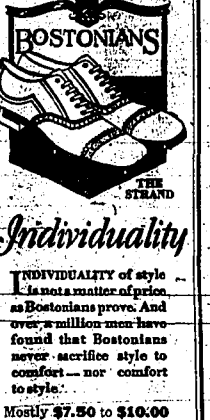

METHODISTS CHOOSE CONFERENCE MEMBER
Annual Meetings of Church All Over World Electing Delegates to Kansas City Congress

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 15.—Annual conferences of the Methodist Episcopal church all over the world are electing delegates to the General Conference to convene here May 1, 1928.

PAYMENT
FOR SAWTOOTH ROAD
State Commissioner of Public Works and Twin Falls Board Members Iron Out Misunderstanding Jeopardizing Project.

Twin Falls highway district commissioners in session here Saturday afternoon authorized payment to the state department of public works \$2000, representing the district's share in the cost of construction of the Sawtooth highway south from Rogerson to the Nevada state line.

The district's appropriation was made available to the state Saturday with the understanding entered on the minutes of the meeting, that the district, within this year, had contributed to the limit of its financial ability for a number of years toward the cost of building the road from Rogerson to the state line, and with the assurance given by the state commissioner that the remaining six-mile gap would be built by the state without further assistance from the district as soon as funds for the purpose were available.

The whole project which has been developed to the present stage as a result of nearly two years work, seemed at one time during the deliberations Saturday to be doomed, and there was talk of attempting to reduce the mileage to be built under the present contract. It was necessary for the state commissioner to convince the district board members that they had been in error in their assumption that the state and district would share equally in the cost of the project, and that under the law the district should pay approximately one-fourth, the state approximately one-third and the federal government 36.75 per cent of the total cost.

The commissioner also declined to pledge the state to immediate completion of the road, but offered his personal assurance that the project would be completed as soon as funds were available for the purpose, following the designation of the six-mile gap as a federal aid road project.

On the vote on authorization of the \$20,000 payment to the state, Commissioner Robert Tami and W. E. Windle voted yes and Commissioner J. T. Windle voted no.

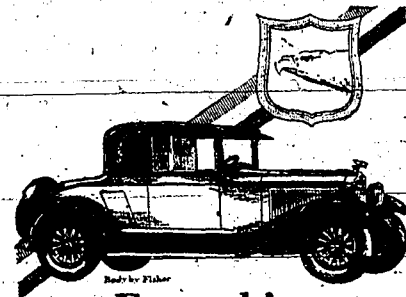

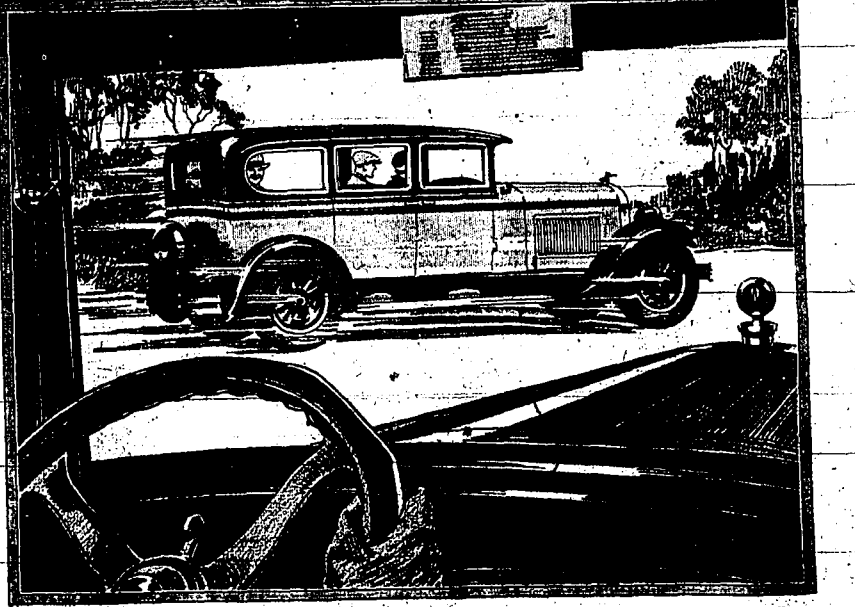

(By The Associated Press) LONDON, Oct. 10.—Long John Silver, the one-legged hero of Stevenson's "Treasure Island," and Arthur Bourchier were one to children throughout the British Empire.

BOURNEMOUTH, England, Oct. 10 (AP)—American pastors who complain of starvation wages might follow the example of the Rev. Walter Foxon, pastor of Wesley church, here, who became a peddler during his vacation.

He made a maximum of \$50 to \$75 and a minimum of \$25 to \$30 per week selling socks and silk stockings from door to door, as an experiment "to see if a living could be made at this sort of thing."

The clergyman was an old pair of worn flannel trousers and a soft collar while selling. At other times when he worked the story of getting the purchaser directly into touch with the manufacturer, he wore a good suit

and a stiff collar. He then made as much as \$5 an hour. He has drawn up a set of rules for peddlers: Don't try to sell anything to men, to the women newly married, or to a man with a bit of money who wants to keep a servant and a roadster.

Don't try to sell in the mornings when women's hands are wet from washing or covered with flour from the cooking.

The best people to try are women between the ages of 43 and 65. If they won't buy silk stockings, offer them a pair of woolen socks.

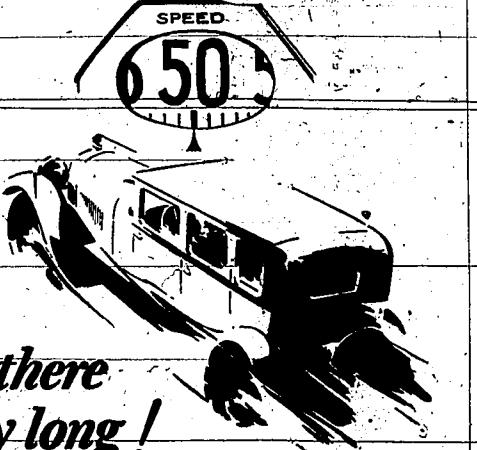
