4000 COLORADO COAL MINERS TO QUIT THEIR WORK

Northern Light Fields Hardest Hit; Few Men at Posts; Mines in Southern Parts Operating With Half of Force.

(By The Associated Press.) A strike call of the Industrial Workers of the World was answered by approximately 4000 Colorado coal miners today. The northern Colorado light coal fields were hardest hit, and only a few men were working. In the southern part of the state, mines were operating with about half of their force of miners. The strike would be of long duration.

No Disturbance

No disturbances were reported today in the strike zone. Reports also were prevalent that the Industrial Workers of the World had numerous secret quarters in Washington and that several bands were organized in the nearby hills.

PIONEER OF FILMDOM GOES TO LAST REST

William H. Clune, Theatre Magnate and Man of Wealthy Ancestry, Dies in Coast City.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 18 (AP)—William H. Clune, Bill Clune, pioneer of filmdom's multi-reel, classic, theatre magnate and man of great wealth, died here today in his single room at the Los Angeles Athletic club.

The passing of the quiet character, with a reputation among his friends as a man who had "to know," ended a picturesque life that included years of service as a real estate engineer, and which had laid the foundation for a fortune believed to be more than \$30,000,000.

SHIPPING RESTRICTION PASSES IN GEM STATE

Daily Delivery of Empty Refrigerator Cars to Oregon Short Line Increased by 15.

BOISE, Oct. 18 (AP)—Idaho's public utilities commission approved the lifting of restrictions on the movement of perishable commodities, recommended by the commission during a hearing on the subject since Wednesday last week. Peak movement of perishable commodities from western states had resulted in recommendations by the commission that 30 per cent of the available cars be allocated for the shipment of early varieties of apples and that 40 per cent be used for the movement of potatoes and onions, plus the shipment of dairy and poultry products, lettuce and celery continued undisturbed from normal.

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WHEAT MARKET FIRM... Percentage of Crop Going Abroad Passes Through Pacific Coast Ports: Spring Production Large.

SAVY LAKE, Oct. 18.—The wheat market continued firm during the week ending October 15. Influenced principally by the good demand for milling wheat and the advancing markets at Winnipeg and Liverpool which were actively reflecting the delayed movement and poor quality of wheat in Canada and Europe.

The barley market is independently strong, particularly for malting, principally as a result of a review of the larger offerings of flour which weakened the flour market.

The domestic spring wheat crop was estimated October 1 at 313,771,000 bushels, 500,000 bushels of durum produced in the Dakotas, Minnesota and Montana. With the exception of the 1932 crop, this is the largest production of durum ever in the United States.

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CARROLL RECOVERED HEALTH IN PENITENTIARY PLANS A COURT ORDER

Producer-Prisoner Earl Carroll Freed From Sickness and Sent Back to Broadway Determined to Reestablish Self.

(By The Associated Press) ATLANTA, Oct. 18.—(AP)—Earl Carroll is going back to Broadway a tanned and healthy man, determined to re-establish himself.

The producer-prisoner tells his friends he is in the best of physical condition and that the hopeful outlook he had on life four months ago has been replaced by a more realistic one.

When Carroll collapsed on the train on the way from New York, after being switched from one car to another for purity in connection with his Communist party, several physicians said he would die if removed to prison from there.

Today his cheeks are filled out from the sturdy roundness that comes from wholesome food, regular hours and fresh air.

Officials said his was more of a mental case than a physical one, and that once his dependance was removed the man would be able to get on his feet.

Untrained for the usual farm duties of milking, feeding the hogs and driving trucks and wagons, Carroll was made librarian by Warden John W. Snook.

BOXING ASSOCIATION ADOPTS NEW RULING

National Organization After Endorsing Illinois Commission Handles Opposite Law.

TOLEDO, Oct. 18 (AP)—The national boxing association, after endorsing the Illinois state athletic commission and its referee, Dave Barry, in the handling of the world's heavyweight championship battle between Gene Tunney and Jack Dempsey in St. Louis, September 23, Monday incorporated a new rule in its code quite opposite to that of the Illinois commission.

According to the new rule, approved by the association, the time keeper shall arise when a boxer is floored and immediately begin to toll off the seconds. In the Tunney-Dempsey battle the timekeeper started counting when Tunney hit the floor while the referee was shouting Jack to a neutral corner. When referee Barry returned to the fallen fighter, he took up the count at "one," although the timekeeper's toll had reached four.

Another rule incorporated into the national boxing association rules, stipulates that when a boxer falls or is knocked out of the ring, he must be given 20 seconds to return. If he does not, or is unable to do so, the referee shall count him out.

J., successfully defended his world's professional title and established a new record for speed in that class when he wrote 133 words a minute, exceeding last year's record by one word a minute.

TWIN FALLS EXPORT APPLES MEET WRECK

Carload of Jonathans on Way to London Smashed on Wash Lines in Missouri.

A carload of 766 boxes of Jonathan apples in transit from Twin Falls to London, was smashed in a wreck on the Washburn line in Missouri last Friday, according to word received Tuesday by J. H. Beaver, the shipper. Extent of the damage to the shipments has not been ascertained here. Payment has been made to the shipper for the apples which were consigned to the Australian-New Zealand-American Trading company, and the railroad will be held responsible for any damage to the ship.

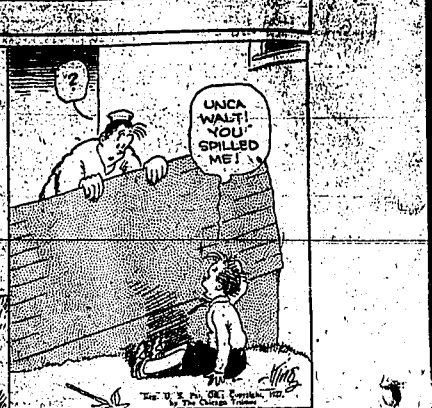
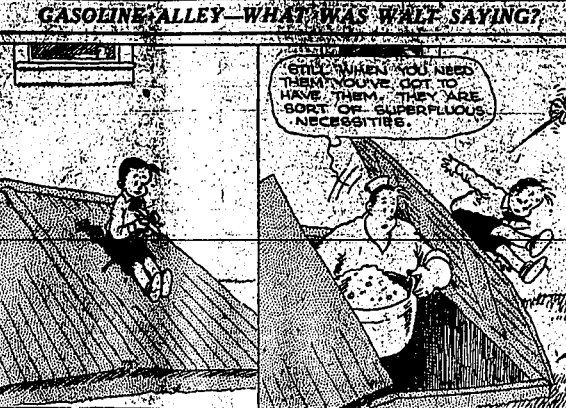

SEED COMMISSIONER HEARS GROWERS IN PROTEST AT RULING

Promises Early Decision on Claim for Certification of Crops on Which Inspection Fee is Delinquent.

L. W. Raeger of Boise, Idaho seed commissioner heard at first session here Tuesday a number of Grimm alfalfa seed growers and buyers voice their protest against his order requiring certification to growers who had failed to pay \$2 inspection fee prior to last June 1.

The commissioner announced that he would make known his decision on the protest the last of this week.

Growers asserted that enforcement of the ruling would entail a loss of 10 cents a pound premium for certified seed, that would amount to more than \$20,000 in Twin Falls county alone. They indicated willingness to pay a penalty for delinquency in payment of the inspection fee, and some of them gained the impression that the matter might be adjusted by the commissioner on a penalty basis.

The fact that some of the growers who had been refused certification this year had already sold their seed as a result of the premium for certified seed seemed to be a factor in the situation that caused the commissioner some concern. It was suggested that those growers might be regarded as having forfeited their claim to certification since they had permitted their seed to pass into other hands.

Tells Reason for Rule
One of the reasons for the rule requiring payment of the inspection fee early in the season, the commissioner explained, was to gain information in regard to the extent of the probable production of certified seed so that the number of inspectors required might be estimated.

The commissioner emphasized his assertion that the seed certification system had been established through the state university extension division in cooperation with the state primary for the benefit of growers.

The meeting at which the protest against the ruling was presented here had been arranged by the commissioner and was held during the afternoon in the Ferguson hotel.

ENGINEERS LAUNCH FINAL SURVEY FOR BUTTE RECLAMATION

Montana Man Representing Investors Arrives to Take Part in Check-Up of Murtaugh Irrigation District Project.
