

FEDERAL ATTORNEYS MOVING SWIFTLY IN FALL-SINGULAR CASE

Testimony Given at Trial Intended to Show Former Interior Secretary Took Personal Charge of Lease Drafting.

(By The Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Oct. 24—Moving swiftly to one of the more important elements of their case against government and oil companies, before a jury in the District of Columbia supreme court, that Albert B. Fall as interior secretary, personally charged over the drafting of the lease which Harry F. Sinclair obtained for the exploitation of Teapot Dome, the navy's oil reserve at Wyoming.

Three present or former employees of the interior department were called in the oil conspiracy trial and from them court clerks obtained a story of events preceding the signing of the lease; a story which had these as its essential details:

That during the Christmas holidays of 1921, when Sinclair was visiting Fall at Three Rivers, N. M., Charles V. Coffey, administrative assistant of the secretary, called for a report as to claims to property in Teapot Dome.

That Fall was then writing of consideration and that from a geological and operating point of view, it seems unimportant not to open up the Teapot Dome in any manner whatsoever.

AIRPLANE FACTORIES RUSHED IN AMERICA

Big Companies in United States Are Too Busy to Try for \$150,000 Guggenheim Prize.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (AP)—Aeronautical activities of various kinds have brought such a rush of orders to American airplane manufacturers that prices are being bid for the Guggenheim prize for the best airplane to go abroad, because the big companies in this country are too busy to try for it.

The safe aircraft competition sponsored by the Daniel Guggenheim fund for the promotion of aeronautics, has been active for several months and only two American companies, and those relatively small, have filed entry blanks against the five entries from England and four of the world famous companies.

The trouble is, Harry Guggenheim, president of the fund, said today that manufacturers are so booked up with orders that they can't think of coming but getting out plans. We hope, however, that many of them will come in later.

Hard on Buffaloes Stampede 5 Autos Nearly Demolished

(By The Associated Press.) WASH., Oct. 24 (AP)—A buffalo stampede in which one bull nearly severely injured five automobiles and five automobiles were virtually demolished, though none of the occupants was injured, was reported today two miles from Teapot, Idaho.

Twenty-five animals of the Old-World variety were being driven by a herdsman across a summer grazing ground to winter quarters when they became so excited at the automobile and the lights that they were stampeded. One bull charged an automobile with a woman driver and the bull in the rear necessitated killing. Several drivers deliberately put their machines in the path of the stampede and the buffaloes were being hunted today.

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HALF OF FORFEITED BAIL IS DUE SCHOOL SAYS LEGAL OPINION

Attorneys for Independent District Number One Hold That City is Holding Out Money Unlawfully.

An opinion given by Bothwell and Chapman attorneys to the Twin Falls school district to the effect that one-half of all bonds forfeited in the district should go to the treasury of the school fund, was read at the meeting of Twin Falls city council last evening and referred to Captain M. Sweeley, city attorney for an opinion to be given at the next meeting. Captain Sweeley declined to give any positive opinion until he had checked up on the case. The opinion was asked by E. B. Johnson, shortly after he retired from the position of school board treasurer, and transmitted to his successor C. H. Stinson. Statement of the Case

The attorneys for the school board declare that from time to time persons taken into custody in the police court deposit cash bonds for their appearance and then fail to appear. It is stated that in such cases the city has retained the full amount of the bail thus forfeited.

The statute provides that all fines, penalties and forfeitures must go into the general school fund. A special statute governing police courts provides that one-half of all moneys derived from liquor licenses, fines and penalties shall be paid to the school district embracing the town or city in which such police courts is held. It also provides that in the event of the failure of the accused to appear in police court after giving or depositing bail, such fact shall be certified for proper action of the district court. This has not been done in any case by the police court of the city of Twin Falls. The money derived from this source has been taken by the city in the nature of a penalty. It is our opinion that the city of Twin Falls is liable to your district for one-half of the moneys retained by it in this manner and from this source.

Amount Not Ascertained
"G. M. Hall," present city clerk and former city treasurer, said last night that he had no idea of how much money would be involved in the controversy, but off hand he believed the amount of the moneys retained in such cases was deposited and later forfeited were involved.

Bills appropriated \$1005.03 were allowed. Of these \$41.43 were against the general fund, while \$1023.60 were against the school fund. GRIVER-McGOVERN RETURNS TO CIVILIZATION AFTER LYING FOR THREE WEEKS ALONE IN FOREST

MINNEAPOLIS, Oct. 24 (AP)—The Minneapolis Journal today says that Griver-McGovern, former St. Thomas college football star, has returned to civilization after lying for three weeks alone in the forest, 40 miles from the nearest settlement, paralyzed from fall.
Suffering from his injury and exposure, he lay helplessly for days until his condition gradually improved and he was first able to crawl and finally to walk.
Slowly and painfully he made his way to civilization, taking six days for the journey and today he was in Chicago bay, between Grand Marais and the International border, where he told the tale of his fight against the wilderness and death.

McGovern set out from Chicago bay nearly a month ago to look at Lake Shore property. He had traveled 40 miles when he plunged over a 25-foot cliff and injured his back so severely that he was unable to move.
For two days he lay at the foot of the cliff in a steady downpour of rain, without protection. In his knapsack was a sleeping bag and sufficient food for several days.

Work Is Progressing On Sawtooth Highway

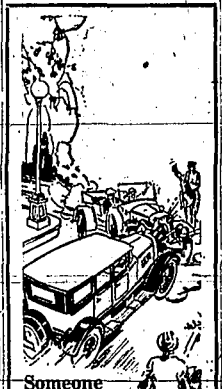
