GAMES ARE SCHEDULED FOR DOUGHNUT SERIES AT CITY HIGH SCHOOL

Twenty-Eight Contests to Be Played; Every Team Meets Each of Rivals Once; Final Tilt Thanksgiving Week.

Captains of the eight teams in the doughnut basketball league at the local high school met yesterday afternoon after school yesterday and drew up a schedule of games for the league. Twenty-eight games will be played which will enable each team in the league to meet each of its seven rivals once.

Two games will be played each night for the first four nights of each week. No games will be played on Fridays in order that there may be a double tilt with football contests. The first games of the series will be played next Monday evening. The two final tilts will occur on Tuesday evening of Thanksgiving week.

It is hoped by school officials that the league will be the means of bringing some good virally material to light. By following the new doughnut plan of play, it is believed that there will be no need for a scarcity of experienced basketballers with which to start another season.

League Plans for Boys
Many more students will be able to avail themselves of the benefits of athletic and recreational activities possible under the former system. Under the old regime only a comparatively few students could make the first and second string squads. There had to be constant shuffling from the sidelines after the few preliminary try-outs for the team.
Fifty-two boys have availed themselves of the privileges offered by the doughnut league. Eight teams have entered the series. The only requirement besides the usual scholarship requirement is that three of the four classes of the school must be represented on each team. This is to prevent any one class from bumping and will aid in equalizing the chances of all teams.

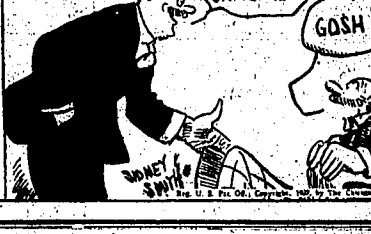

BOND ACT DECISION AFFECTS TWIN FALLS

Highway District Here Has \$1,250,000 Obligations Validated by Court Ruling.

Decision of a federal statutory court declaring that legislation to validate creation of the Clark county highway district accomplishes its purpose is in line with an opinion given by the Twin Falls highway district commissioners by Sweeney and Sweeney, attorneys, last summer when they were asked the annual interest on the district's \$1,250,000 bond issue was advised of the act validating such bonds was pending in court.

Another Case Pending. The decision affected \$10,000,000 worth of bonds in 110 districts of the state. The validity of the bonds was attacked by the Oregon Short Line which argued the bonds were unconstitutional because they were based on no legislative act. The legislature then passed a general validating act and also special validating legislation covering the districts, and presented this in evidence at a rehearing. While the federal case was still pending, action to test the validity of the acts was brought in the state supreme court where it is now pending. The implication is that the state court will follow the decision of the federal tribunal as to the constitutionality of the acts and their application to the bond issues by the district.

Paid Regular Interest. While the cases were pending the Twin Falls highway board was in some doubt as to whether it would be wise to pay interest pending determination of the case, but on the advice of its attorneys, made the payment when due.

Power Plant Work Nearing Completion

W. R. Putnam, general manager of the Idaho Power company arriving Tuesday to attend the monthly meeting of power company employes last evening. He said that the work on the Shoshone Falls plant is practically completed, although it will take about three weeks to clean it up. The total cost of improvements at the big falls this year will approximate \$350,000.
