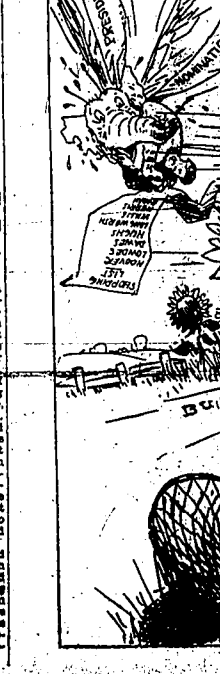

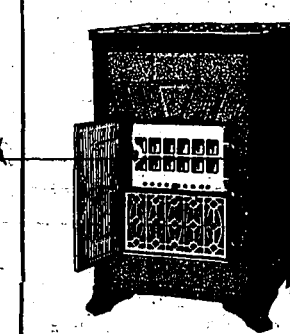

MOTION TO SEGREGATE UNHALDE PROPERTY IS RECORDED IN COURT

Lawyers for Mother of Deceased Shepherder Ask That \$18,000 Be Set Aside Pending Decision of Litigation.

On behalf of Marie Unhalde Gastambide, a resident of France, who claimed to be the mother of the late Ernest Unhalde, attorneys for H. R. Grant, administrator, instituted moves in two courts here Saturday to restrain Mrs. Ruth Sweet, administratrix of the estate of the late D. F. Sweet, from disposing of the Unhalde property. Unhalde's estate, which was valued at approximately \$15,000, was awarded by court decree here last spring to D. F. Sweet, sheepsman, by whom Unhalde had been employed for many years. In the probate court Saturday orders were issued by Judge C. A. Bailey to Mrs. Sweet to show cause on November 14 why \$21,000 had been paid, which is alleged by plaintiffs was in violation of law; to show cause why complete account of all moneys of the Sweet estate should not be made; to set aside \$18,000 pending the determination of litigation over the ownership of the Unhalde estate now pending in a Paris trial; and, lastly, directing Mrs. Sweet to furnish bond in the sum of \$200,000 in lieu of the \$25,000 bond now on file.

Claim illegality. The motion relative to the alleged illegal expenditure of \$21,000 is based on the construction of the motion granting the time when bills against the estate may be paid. It is contended by the administrator that no bills shall be paid within six months after the period of advertising for presentation of bills; that this period has not yet expired and that the administrator fears that other bills will be paid prior to the expiration of the time named.

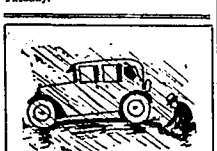
Went Safe Margin. While the Ernest Unhalde estate was estimated at \$15,000 at the time it was decreed to the late D. F. Sweet, the plaintiff father-in-law, \$18,000, as a safe margin, to be put aside as a trust fund, pending determination of litigation.

The estate was given to Sweet by a decision of Judge W. A. Babcock on showing of oral will by Unhalde in favor of Sweet. Later it was discovered that Unhalde was survived by a mother, Marie Unhalde Gastambide, residing in France. On motion of Winters and Farry, in behalf of the mother, H. R. Grant was appointed administrator of the Unhalde estate in place of T. C. Zuerch, who resigned. The new administrator then sought to set aside the judgment and reopen the case. Motion to reinstate the action and place it on the calendar for trial was granted, October 14.

In District Court. Bothwell and Chapman attorneys for Mrs. Sweet, administratrix of the Sweet estate, then filed a motion to set aside the order vacating the original judgment. Saturday the attorneys for H. R. Grant, administrator, named above, filed a motion to strike from the record the motion filed by Mrs. Sweet's attorneys on the ground that the defendant had no right to file such motion, and asserting that there was neither mistake nor inadvertence connected with the vacation of the original judgment.

HAILEY JUDGE ASSIGNED FOR COURT TERM HERE

District Judge H. P. Ensign of Hailey has been designated by Idaho's supreme court to preside at a term of district court here opening next November 14, according to advice received here Saturday. Judge Ensign will serve in the absence of Judge William A. Babcock of Twin Falls, who is sitting as a commissioner for the state supreme court. District Judge Hugh A. Baker of Rupert, who presided at the September term of district court here, Saturday completed his assignment after ruling on some motions and discharging other routine business. He will open a district court term at Rupert next Tuesday.

HUGE SUM AT STAKE IN VALIDATION FIGHT

R. W. Katerndahl, Leader of Move in Idaho, Tells of Effect of Highway District Decision.

Litigation involving the validity of Idaho highway districts, affected also the validity of one and a quarter billion dollars' worth of bonds issued by highway districts of nine states. Secretary of the Treasury Andrew Mellon was quoted to this effect by R. W. Katerndahl of Dubois who was in Twin Falls Saturday on his way to Boise to file in federal district court a decree issued last week by a circuit court that held measures adopted by the last session of the state legislature to validate Idaho highway districts had accomplished that purpose. Mr. Katerndahl, representative from Clark county, served during the session as chairman of the house judiciary committee and initiated the validation measures. In the litigation subsequently involving these measures he represented the Clark county highway district, which, he said, had spent \$21,000 in defense of the validation act in connection with this litigation.

DRIVEWAY POST AT GAS STATION HIT BY TRUCK

One of Bigman Brothers Transfer and Storage company's one-ton trucks ran wild Saturday morning and crashed into a brick driveway post at Spigt's service station, 152 Second avenue east. Spigt's employees stated that as the truck was making the turn, the driver being unable to stop the truck in time to prevent the crash.

Mr. Katerndahl twice attended conferences in Chicago of bond attorneys and stated attorneys general who were widely commented in the validation of the highway districts.

Nine states, including Texas, Tennessee, North Carolina, Ohio and Missouri, have highway districts organized under laws identical with the Idaho law, Mr. Katerndahl stated. The statement of the secretary of the treasury in regard to the far-reaching effect of the litigation, Mr. Katerndahl said, was reported at one of these conferences by John W. Davis, one-time democratic nominee for the presidency, who attended as a legal representative of bond concerns.

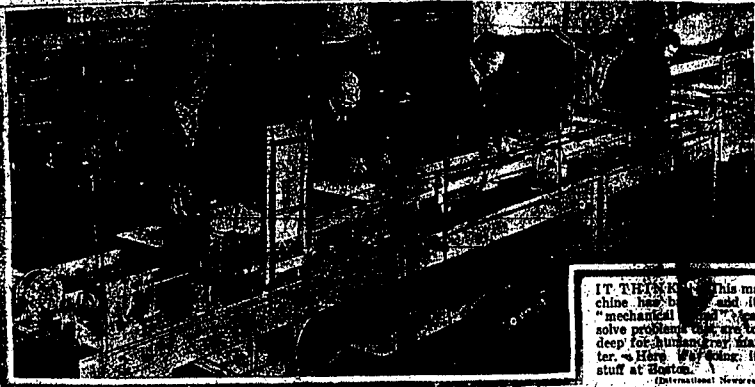

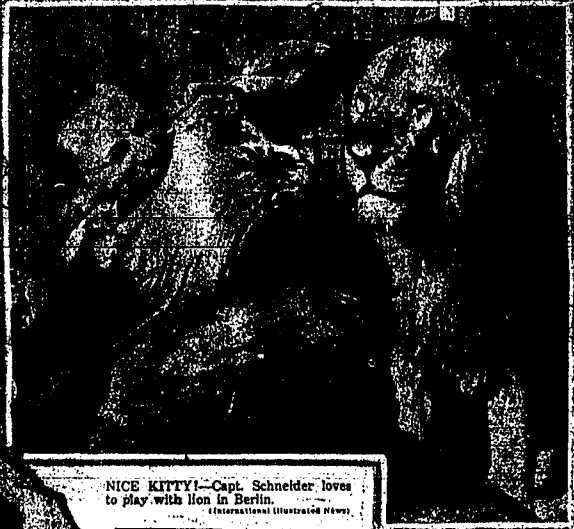

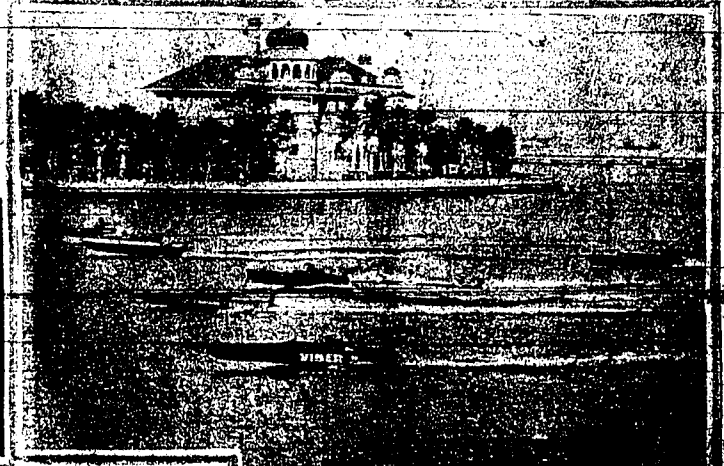

THYRS AND YAK BREEDED TO PRODUCE BEEF COW FOR ALASKA

Scotland's Cool Altitude and Ranges of Tibet Pool Staunchest Elements of Bovine Hardhood to Provide Enterprise.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—Scotland's cool altitudes and the vast mountain ranges of Tibet have pooled their staunchest elements of bovine hardhood to provide a beef enterprise for Alaska.

The key to the novel project is the "cattleyak," a hybrid animal in whose veins flows vigorous blood of the Asiatic yoked yak and the Galloway Scotch cow. It is a cross-breed that defines all the rigors of Alaskan temperatures and at the same time gives promise of excellent meat quality.

Bred to the Himalayas, the yak is rugged and self-reliant. In a state of elemental domesticity he is used as a pack animal by the farmers of western China. Of the same genus as cattle, the yak is the basis of the most important packing industries. The Galloways, native to the hills of heather and blue-bells, resembles the yak in hardiness; but is decidedly better by the animal.

Increasing demand for market supplies has created a remarkable opportunity for Alaskan beef growers. Almost every ship from Seattle and Pacific ports carry frozen meats from the United States to Cordova, Sitka, Anchorage, and other points along the northwest coast to Nome and St. Michael, for distribution to both sea-board and interior settlements.

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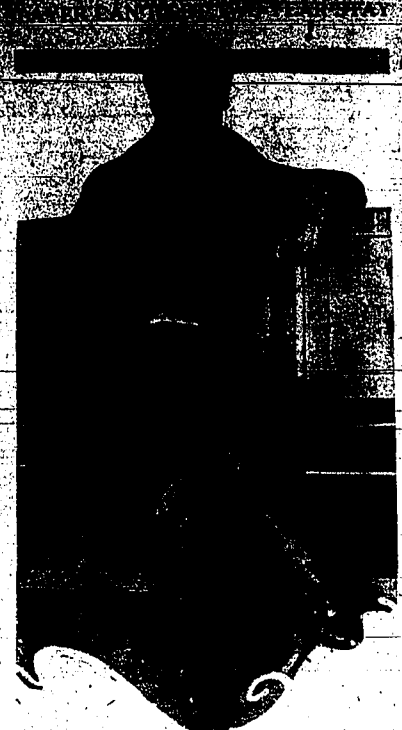

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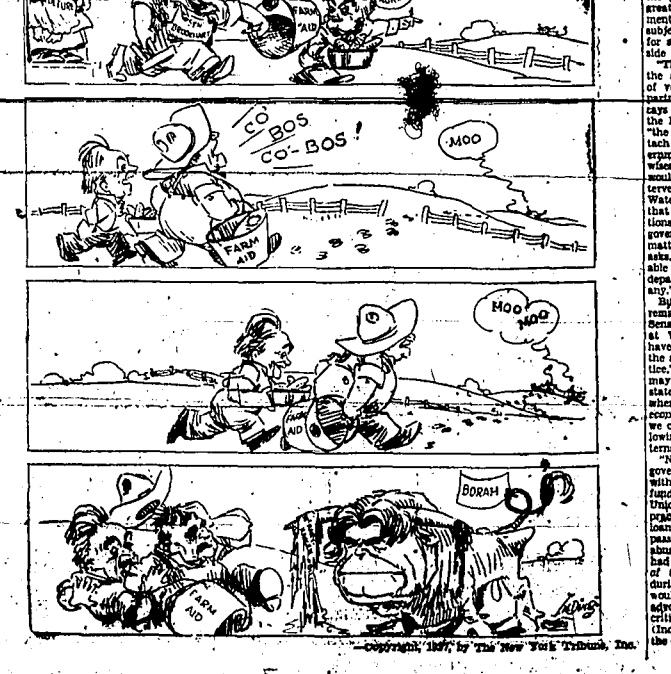

LONGER LIVES BY INVESTIGATING AVERAGE INDIVIDUAL TODAY LIVES 30 YEARS LONGER THAN FATHERS OF 1789, WITH MUCH LESS ILLNESS.

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—Which is the magic about life or a long one? While a short life and a merry one is still a tradition, belief in the power of life is being proved by medical science, sanitation, disease prevention and the general progress of modern life.

Writing on "A Long Life and a Merry One" the North American Review, Dr. Donald B. Armstrong not only tells why life expectancy has been increased but also why the modern tradition that a short life is apt to be the merrier, and started the anti-theist. And he is well qualified to discuss this subject for practically his entire professional career has been spent with prolonging life in the aggregate.

Slipping back into history, Dr. Armstrong explains that in 1789 the life expectancy of a child born in Massachusetts or New Hampshire was only 28 years. In the registration area of the United States for the present time it is 58, a gain of 30 years.

"The modern man's life is longer and merrier," Dr. Armstrong declares. "Life is longer partly because it is merrier and because we have learned how to utilize opportunities for happiness. It is happier because it is longer, allowing more time for the enjoyment of resources productive of happiness."

"But the significant thing for the average man is that he lives 30 years longer than his forefathers of 1789, with much less illness and much more comfort. He lives 10 to 20 additional years to his life span. He does not have to wait for new discoveries that will bring him still further increase in his life possibilities. He has only to apply established knowledge to obtain the best of life."
