

LOCAL HIGH SCHOOL HAS ENGLISH TESTS

University's Entrance Examination to Be Given All Students; Special Classes.

Students of Twin Falls high school will try their wits at a "cock" test this morning on an English examination which has been arranged in the faculty to show the weaknesses in the use of the "mother tongue" on the part of local students.

All students who fall to pass this test at the state university are placed in what is known as the "bonehead" English class. Heretofore Twin Falls has had an unusually large representation in this class.

This test will be given to every student in the senior high school. Following the checking of the papers remedial steps will be taken.

A similar examination will be given at the end of the semester to determine what improvement has been made on the part of the students.

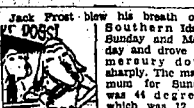

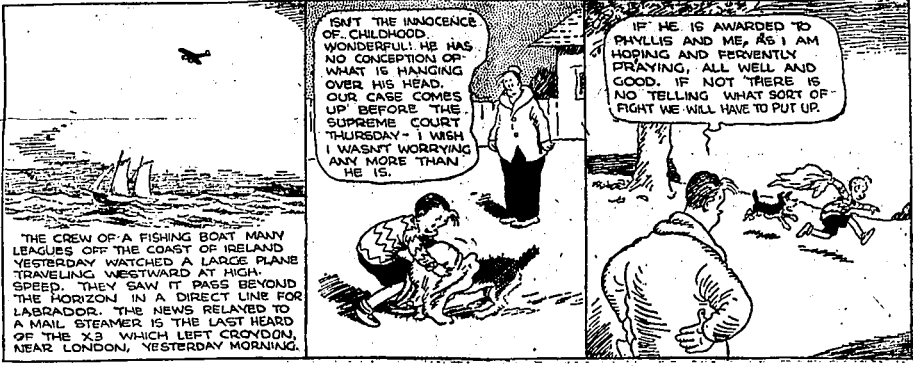

HEAVY MARKETING OF WHEAT ABSORBED

No Marked Trends in Trading in Principal Grains During Week.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Oct. 31.—There were no marked trends in the markets for the principal grains during the week ending October 29 and prices held fairly steady at about the same level as a week ago states the Weekly Grain Market Review of the United States Bureau of Agricultural Economics.

Stocks increase. The movement of United States wheat to the market continued large and stocks have been increased to around 90,000,000 bushels which is 11,000,000 larger than the amount in store at the corresponding time last year.

Wheat prices advanced 3 to 5 cents per bushel in the central western markets, principally because of the increased offerings rather than any increase in demand.

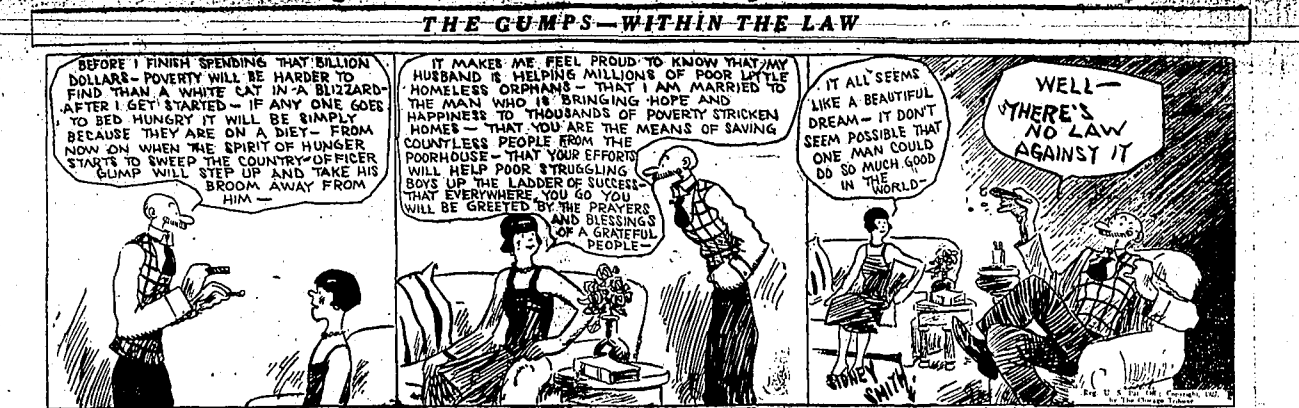

RESERVOIR DISTRICT ELECTION IS CALLED

Voters Will Cast Ballots for Two Members of American Falls Board; Tablet Approved.

Election of two directors of the American Falls reservoir district will be held December 13 to fill vacancies created by the expiration of the terms of J. H. Barker of Buhl and H. K. Wiley of Springfield. The call for this election was issued at a regular meeting of the board at the district headquarters here Monday afternoon. Both members whose terms expire have served on the board since the district was organized.

Endorse Dam Tablet
The board endorsed the proposal of the federal department for the design of the tablet to be erected on the dam at American Falls and suggested that the names of F. A. Banks, construction engineer, and J. A. Paddock, superintendent of construction, be added. The following is the text of the inscription as submitted and endorsed: "The American Falls dam, constructed by the department of the interior bureau of reclamation in cooperation with the American Falls reservoir district and other irrigation organizations of the Snake River valley, 1925-1927."

The board annexed a 40-acre tract owned by Stanley A. Weiler near Buhl to the district, and also added 50 small tracts at Springfield. All members of the board were present at the meeting Monday including President R. E. Shepherd, H. K. Wiley, W. H. Spence, J. H. Barker and F. E. Barry.
