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ILL-FATED JAPANESE FISHING VESSEL IS ON WAY TO SEATTLE

Ryo Yei Maru, With Two Dead Sailors and Whittened Bones of Eight Others as Only Cargo, Makes Its Last Voyage.

(By The Associated Press) SEATTLE, Nov. 2.—The Ryo Yei Maru Japanese fishing craft which was rescued off the Washington coast Monday, with two dead sailors and the whitened bones of eight others as its only cargo, was taken in tow by the tug Hornet today and was en route to Seattle.

Message Translated The message translated in full today by the Japanese consulate here, reads: "Wakaburama, Nishimuro, Wakayama prefecture. "Ryo Yei Maru. "Ship engine, Otomatsu Hoshi. "Members of crew: Captain Tokizo Kiki; chief engineer, Denro Hoshi; chief mate, Tokichi Kuwata; Haruo Terata; Tadamuro Hozono; Ryoosuke Yokota; Suteji Iwata; Genroosuke Matsumoto; Ryoji Taniuchi; Torakichi—Yukichi—Tsunemitsu, Yoshitaku Kikita.

IDAHO GRIDIRON TEAM WILL HAVE HOT TIME LAST HALF OF SEASON

Contest With Southern Irishmen Will Be One of Hardest Games of Year; Gonzagans Out to Win.

(Special to The News)
UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Nov. 2.—Developments on western gridiron in the last week indicate conclusively that Idaho's fighting Vandal football crew is in for a hot time during the last half of the season, which opens Saturday against St. Mary's at San Francisco. This Oakland college, always a thorn in the side of California and Stanford, defeated Gonzaga 12 to 0 and reports are that breaks figured prominently in the victory. At the same time the Oregon Aggies invited Washington State to Corvallis and surprised with a 13 to 8 trouncing of the Cougars.

All season Idaho has been figuring St. Mary's would be one of its hardest games, particularly with the southern Irishmen walking on Stanford early in the season. Also, Idaho has been assuming that the Washington State game could be written down in advance as a victory. Now the views of critics are such as to expect that Idaho finds two more strong opponents appearing on her schedule. Gonzaga's abject nod St. Mary's, a 21 to 0 before Mr. St. Charles, a small non-conference school at Helena, Montana, and the Oregon Aggies spurt that upset Washington State makes it apparent that all of Idaho's remaining games will be hard.

Team Faculty

Fortunately Idaho enters the last half of her season with a fairly well developed football team. Except for the Oregon game, which did not see Idaho at top strength, the Vandals have met teams that enabled the coaches to use reserve material generously and thereby give needed experience to the eleven sophomores who constitute a big factor in Idaho on this year's Idaho team. At the opening of the last half of the season Idaho will have that reserve material fully tested, a good attack perfected, and following a two weeks layoff will have a heretofore untapped resource functioning.

Charlie Erb, Idaho's head coach, is making any prediction as to winning the games ahead but he does say that "it will take a mighty strong ball club to defeat Idaho."

Idaho's last two conference games are against Washington at Pullman, November 11, and against Oregon State at Portland, November 18. St. Mary's game is at San Francisco November 5, the same day Idaho's freshmen play the Idaho State team at Pullman, and the Gonzaga game at Spokane, November 23, closes the Vandal season.

VANDALS AND COUGARS PREPARE FOR BATTLE

Idaho and Washington State Teams Marshalling Strongest Forces for Thirteenth Meet.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Nov. 2.—Vandal and Cougar football camps are marshalling their strongest forces for the thirteenth meeting of the two colleges on the gridiron at Pullman, Armistice Day, November 11.

The game marks the thirty-third year of football rivalry between Idaho and Washington State. The game is one of the most important events for the graduates and former students expected at the big game.

Washington State defeated the Vandals last year 6 to 0 but the three classes before that were Idaho victories, the first in a good many years.

Since Vandal and Cougar first met on the gridiron in 1884 eighteen victories have been written in Washington State history, ten for the Cougars and eight for Idaho.

In present forecasts on the big game, the Vandals are the weaker of the two enthusiastic Vandal followers to make the Silver and Gold a favorite.

Washington's victory over Washington State was expected but the Cougar fall before the Oregon Aggies was not so much expected.

Erb Doing Best

Charlie Erb, head coach at Idaho, is doing his best to discourage any tendency to make Idaho a favorite. Idaho has played four games and all but one against comparatively weak teams. In the only game against a formidable opponent, Idaho was held Oregon, when that stopped Idaho, was beaten by California and Southern California in turn beat California.

Another factor in favor of Washington State will be that the Cougars rest the week end Idaho is playing St. Mary's at San Francisco. This will give the W. S. coaches two weeks in which to concentrate for Idaho. Idaho must hurry northward from St. Mary's with the realization there will be no time for practice before the Pullman game. The Vandals will get back in Moscow Monday evening of next week, according to present plans, too late for a practice, and the Cougar game is Friday.

With but two or three days of practice Erb is faced with the problem of doing most of his Cougar preparation this week before going south.

JONES' CUBS READY TO MEET KIMBERLY

Streifus fell on the school stairs and sprained his ankle and will probably be on the side lines for the balance of the season.

George Ratzliff has been pressed into service in his place and while the big boy is a little rusty on the signals, he will fill the bill for the game today.

Otherwise, the fighting Cubs are in good condition. St. Vance has fully recovered from his leg injury and is back in the lineup. Much improvement in the Cub backfield can be noted this week and several of the backs are beginning to show real stuff. Frascelli, who has borne the bulk of the work in the backfield is developing into a real triple threat back and is making a strong bid for a place on the Bruins. Knight has shown steady improvement and with plenty of speed and strength is a real threat to the Bruins. CLOSING QUOTATION ON WHEAT IS LOWER

CHICAGO, Nov. 2 (AP)—Commission house demand tightened the wheat market at the last today after prices had given way gradually in the earlier trading. Spreading operations between Chicago and northwestern centers appeared to be largely responsible for the advance in prices.

Closing quotations on wheat were steady at a shade lower 12c advance, with corn 3/4c to 1/2c to 3/4c down, oats unchanged to 1/2c up, and provisions varying from 1/2c decline to a rise of 2c.

There was plenty of bearish news today as to wheat, especially from Canada and Argentina. In the whole the trade appeared to be inclined to disregard such items as increased estimates of the Canadian crop as well as optimistic reports of the grain futures administration of the department of agriculture ordering a resumption of daily reports of individual operations on account of 500,000 bushels or more in wheat, corn and oats and of 200,000 bushels or more in rye attracted considerable attention although little if any immediate influence on values.

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Notable steadiness of the Winnipeg market, however, helped to rally the here as the day drew to an end. Need of rain in western portions of Kansas was also a subject of comment.

Although firm early trading to somewhat unsettled weather, corn showed a heavy undertone, one reason being that the movement of new corn is expected to increase steadily. Oats prices held firm despite the weakness of corn. Primary receipts of oats today were a good deal less than half the amount a year ago.

For the most part, provisions were responsive to an upturn in hog values.

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ANTI-THEFT MOTOR STATUTE HAS TEETH

Many Stringent Provisions in New Registration Law Which Becomes Effective Soon.

If there is any loophole through which a car thief may get away with stolen property under the provisions of the uniform motor vehicle anti-theft act going into effect after January 1, a casual reading of that statute fails to reveal it. T. H. Shrontz, assistant secretary of state, was here Wednesday consulting E. Claude Stewart, county assessor, regarding the law. He said \$35,000,000 of cars were stolen in America last year make strict laws and rigid enforcement, necessary. Copies of the law with the necessary blanks for registration and proof of ownership is sent out to each registered car owner, and after January 1, 1928, it shall be unlawful for him to drive his car or permit it to be operated unless such proof of title is submitted and endorsed. The department will issue no registration for any motor vehicle unless proof of ownership shall be made.

When a new motor vehicle is purchased application of the owner shall give the name of the dealer and the amount of lien, if any. The owner who transfers title shall certify to the statement and give a statement of all liens and encumbrances. A certificate once issued is good for the lifetime of the owner, unless he sells the machine.

Should the department refuse to issue a certificate, the applicant shall not make further application for registration on the same statement unless the department after reference to its own ruling or it is set aside by the court. It is made a felony to deface any serial or motor number. There are various provisions governing dealers.
