Bruins Lose Chance in Race For District Championship

TWIN FALLS ELEVEN LOSES TO GOODING BY SCORE OF 13 TO 2

Magie City Team's Chances for Title Glimmering; Senators' Line Holds in Crucial Moments; Contest Hard Fought.



GAME IS PLAYED UNDER PROTEST; TOONE INELIGIBLE

The high school football game at Gooding yesterday was played under protest, according to local high school officials. The state athletic board notified the game was played under protest because of the ineligibility of Toone before the starting of the game yesterday, noting that Toone was his fifth year of competition. It seems to be a parallel case with that of Vance, Toone having played in the eighth in the eighth year.

Just what the outcome of the protest will be remains for the decision of the state board of control. Some action is expected this coming week. The decision may result in awarding the game to Twin Falls 1 to 0, which would still leave the Bruins in the district title race.

The Twin Falls Bruins' championship hopes went glimmering yesterday when the Gooding Senators took a 13 to 2 victory in a game of lost opportunities. Twice in the first half and once in the third quarter the Bruins drove the ball through the Gooding line to within the five yard mark only to have the Gooding line stiffen and hold upon two occasions when the Bruins on the other. If there was ever any doubt about the fighting quality of the Bruins it is a disputing smooth working machine that met the Senators. In fact, it was one of the best football games seen in this district for many a moon. Both teams displayed plenty of fight and drive and the first three quarters of the game was exceptionally fast. The pace began to tell in the last quarter and considerable time out was necessary for injuries.

Bruins Kick Off. The game opened with the Bruins kicking off to Toone on the 15 yard line. He returned it 20 yards. Two tries at the Bruins' line netted little yardage and Toone kicked to Perrine on his own 30 yard mark. He struck it 10 yards. The Bruins started down the field on line backs which netted them 20 yards before the Senator line held and Perrine booted out of bounds on the 3 yard mark. Toone returned the punt to the 45 yard mark and Perrine raced for yards before he was downed. Six line plunges netted 18 yards and a pass put the ball on the five yard line. A temporary setback halted the Bruins but they succeeded in gaining the three yard mark where the Gooding line held. Toone elected to run the ball from behind his own goal and was downed on his three yard mark. Toone punted to the 35 yard mark and the Bruins again booted the ball to the 15 yard mark and again lost it on downs. Toone got away on the first try for 30 yards, left 20 of it on a fumble that the Bruins recovered. Again the Bruins started for the goal with line smashes. The second quarter opened with the Bruins on the Gooding 25 yard mark and they bucked it to the two yard line only to lose it on a fumble. Toone fumbled the pass from center and Finch downed him behind his own goal for a safety. Toone booted the ball from the 20 yard mark on the free punt after the safety and it rolled out of bounds on the Bruins five yard line. Perrine's kick was short and Gooding started for the goal, using a long pass and line smashes. The Bruin forward wall finally stopped them on the five yard line and Perrine kicked. The Gooding backs could not gain and Toone booted over the goal. The Bruins started from their own backfield and averaged 15 yards through the line were forced to punt. 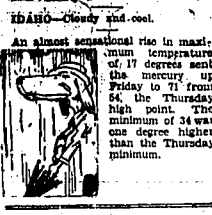

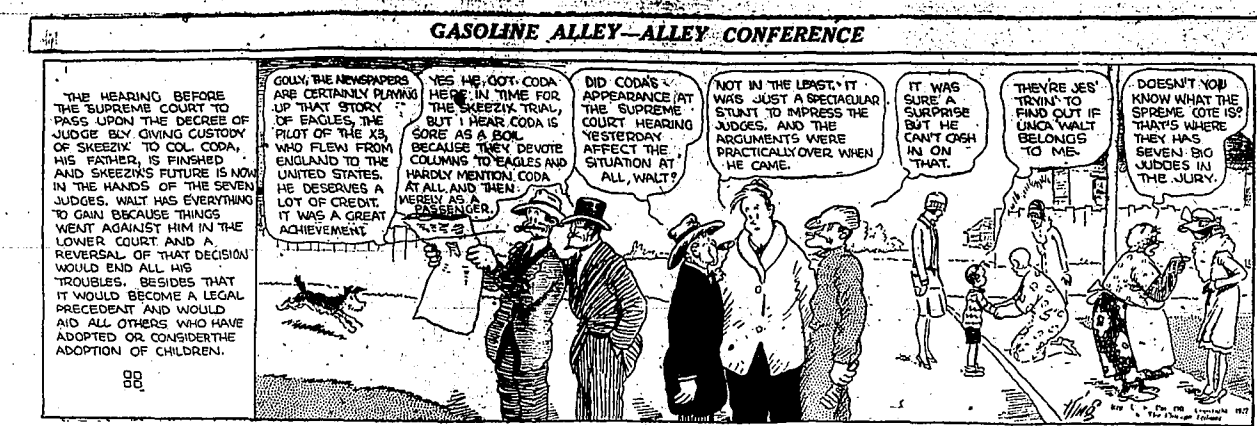

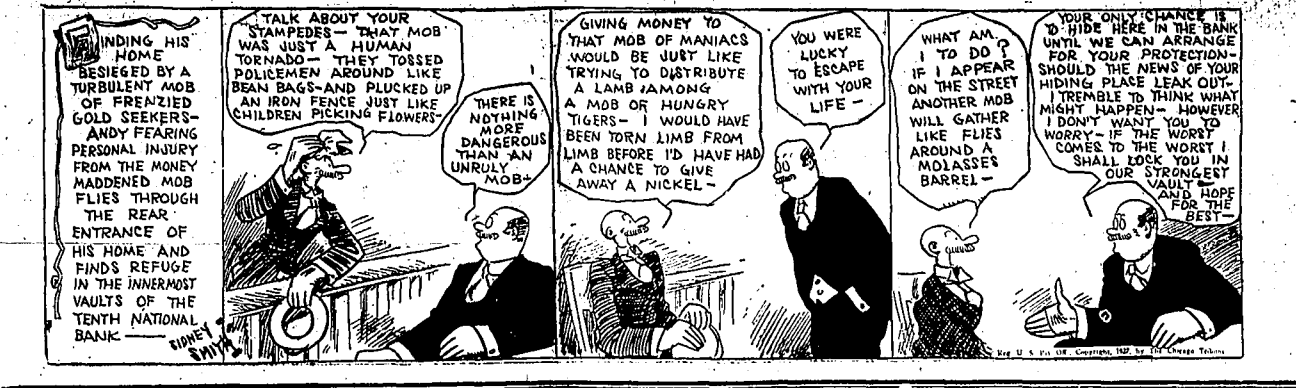

BASQUE WITH GASH ACROSS THROAT IS SAVED BY OBESITY

Surgeons Stitch Dangerous Knife Wound Received by Rooming House Keeper in Altercation in City.

Michael Astola, Basque proprietor of a lodging house and lunch counter at 138 Second avenue south, owes his life to the fact that he is a fat man. A razor blade in the hand of an unidentified Mexican, who is reported to have attacked Astola in the course of an altercation at Astola's place of business Friday afternoon, would have produced fatal effects, physicians stated last evening, if veins and arteries in Astola's neck had been protected by only a normal layer of adipose tissue. The physicians slit a wound six inches long across Astola's throat. His condition later was stated to be favorable.

Assaults Escapes

The assailant, made good his escape while police officers were endeavoring to locate the scene of the trouble that had been reported in a telephone call to the police station by a Mexican laboring evidently under stress of considerable excitement.

The knife wielder, Mexicans who had witnessed the altercation told officers only a few moments before the police arrived on the scene. He wore a white shirt but no coat and was bareheaded, they said.

In search of trace of the fugitive, the police chief unaccompanied scoured Rock creek canyon from the sugar factored down to the Shoshone street bridge, and then went through all of the cars standing in the freight yards. Other officers made a thorough search of the Mexican quarter.

Cause Not Disclosed

Cause of the altercation between Astola and his assailant was not disclosed by the police investigation. Astola himself was too weak last evening to speak more than a few words. One of the bystanders was reported to have received a gash across a finger when he ventured too near the belligerents.

The police informant seemed unable to tell where the disturbance took place, but repeated several times the words, "We have trouble down here."

WIFE CHARGES HUSBAND WITH PHYSICAL ATTACK

Olavus E. Snook swore to a complaint before H. D. Read, police judge, last night, charging her husband, Ralph Snook with assault. About 6:30 last evening, some one telephoned the police station that a man and women were fighting near Shoshone street in the neighborhood of Second avenue south. When the officers reached the scene the quarrel was over. Mrs. Snook, who had a sword, lawfully carried that her husband assaulted her. Officers say Snook had a bloody nose and torn necktie. He was released under \$100 bond to appear today in police court.

TEACHER MUST HAVE LEGAL CERTIFICATE

Supreme Court Holds That Mrs. Hayes Cannot Collect Salary From Castleford District.

Idaho's supreme court in a decision the text of which arrived in Twin Falls today, sustained Judge W. H. Babcock's decision in the case of Mrs. H. C. Hayes against Independent School District No. 9, at Castleford, which held that Mrs. Hayes was not entitled to compensation for wages as teacher which she claimed.

Facts in Case

Mrs. Hayes held a diploma for a two year normal course at Kirksville, Missouri, state normal school, and on August 10, 1922, made application for an Idaho state elementary certificate. On September 30, the same year, she took examination in two subjects required under the Idaho statutes and was notified October 20 that she had passed, and informed that on payment of \$5 fee, she would get the certificate which she did receive December 6, dated September 11. On May 25, 1923, Mrs. Hayes was employed to teach nine months in the Castleford school. She began to teach September 8 and taught until September 28, when she was released on the ground that she did not have an Idaho state certificate. She taught a day or two longer, quit under protest, and then sued for salary for the time which elapsed between the starting of the school until her release and for damages for time thereafter until employed by others.

Held Under Law

The court held that the earliest she could have received a certificate under the facts as shown would have been September 30; that she had no valid certificate either at the time that she began teaching or at the time she was notified of her release on September 28, and that, therefore, the contract to teach was void under the laws of Idaho and she could recover neither salary nor damages.

CLEAN SACK RULE WILL BE ENFORCED

Otto Steinberg, Buyer, Is Prosecuted for Alleged Failure to Comply With Regulations.

Complaint sworn to by E. V. Olipson, deputy inspector, and filed in the probate court here Friday by O. W. Witham, county attorney, charged Otto Steinberg with shipping potatoes in violation of the Idaho standardization law relative to the condition of containers. It is alleged that he used old sacks under conditions that are violative of the terms of the statute. The county attorney said last evening that he had reviewed several inquiries regarding the regulations.

After Giving Various Standards for grading and branding at length for potatoes other than white, the regulations of the state agricultural department continue:

Brands and Containers

While potatoes may be shipped in plain, unbranded containers or in branded containers at the option of the grower or shipper, when white potatoes are packed in branded containers such potatoes must conform to the foregoing grades and such brands must be in accordance with the foregoing branding regulations. Private brands or other terms may be used with the official grade when such brands or terms are registered, approved and recorded by the state department of agriculture.

All branded containers in which potatoes are packed for sale, offered for sale or sold must be new containers, cloth or fiber bags which are new or which are number one, cleaned, unbleached, bright, undamaged, number one mills. "Undamaged" is defined to mean that sacks have unbroken hems and may have not more than two holes not more than one inch in diameter. Containers must not be faced with potatoes of superior quality and size to
