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MASONIC MINSTRELS SCORE NOTABLE HIT IN COMEDY AND SONG

Appreciative Audience Filling Showhouse Greets Clever Off-putting in Opening Night Performance.

An audience which filled practically every seat in the Orpheum theatre witnessed the first performance last night by the Masonic Minstrels, and manifested throughout its warm appreciation of the efforts of Joe Koecher, president of the local Shrine club and stage manager and director as well as introducer of the show.

The first part carried out faithfully the minstrel show of tradition with a few added effects by way of novelty. The jokes, some of which were at the expense of local people with a reputation for good nature, were well rendered and many scored notable hits. Songs and choruses showed the effect of painstaking rehearsal and were for the most part unusually well put on, the orchestral effects adding much to the success of the musical end of the performance.

Art Bockwitz, always a favorite with Twin Falls audiences and an amateur actor of rare beyond average ability, divided with Cy Burdorf the principal comedy lines of the show. The latter, who was in vaudeville for some time, made use of his professional experience and the combined result was a performance which was both smooth and well done. Merlin Eddy, another Twin Falls man with a reputation as a comedian, proved as entertaining as ever. While Harry Atwood really succeeded in making a permanent place for himself in the ranks of amateur minstrelsy, Colonel Munyon and Ray Hagar, were just as funny as their lines would permit and took full advantage of their opportunities, while O. W. Bice, O. C. Young, Bill Long and O. C. Patnot who completed the complement of end-men, helped materially to round out a performance

which was well received and apparently throughout a joyous affair. The audience roared with laughter during the entire act and did its best to register a second rendition.

J. T. Balabridge led in the rendition of a series of numbers by a saxophone quartet composed of himself, Tom Roberts, Bob Nixon, Walter Walle, Ray Personius and Ray McLean which were well received.

Replete With Music The entire performance was replete with musical numbers, both solo and ensemble, well selected and well executed while the novelty features of the program struck a distinctly new note in the annals of amateur minstrelsy in Twin Falls. Joe Koecher, under whose direction the performance was given, not only rehearsed the entire program and served as interlocutor in the circle, but appeared in various specialties, including the rendition of a solo and a lengthy dialect monologue in the second section. Since Bill evidently took care not to point his gun at an angle to hurt anybody, only a misadventure had been committed, the officers believe. This would not justify arrest without warrant unless they were on hand at the time, and as Bill had gone, the officers came back. No complaint had been filed up to last night.
