



# COMMITTEE APPROVES PROGRAM CALLING FOR CUT OF \$235,820,000

## Body Refuses to Adhere to Any of Major Recommendations of Treasury; Bill Will Be Put Into Shape at Early Date.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—Disposing in rapid order of all major issues entering into the question of tax reduction, the house ways and means committee today approved a program calling for a total cut in revenue rates of \$235,820,000.

The program is expected to be whittled down to form into legislation that reading of the measure may be started before the week-end for possible changes in its provision.

While the committee, according to its own computations, kept well within the \$250,000,000 maximum reduction set by law, it exceeded it slightly more than \$10,000,000, the figure proposed by the treasury. It also failed to adhere to any of the major recommendations submitted by the department.

Chairman Green explained that the committee in placing the total prospective cut at nearly \$236,000,000 used its own figures and that if certain estimates submitted by Under Secretary Mills of the treasury, had been taken for a basis, the total reduction would approximate \$249,000,000.

### Cut Corporation Income

At the outset of its session today, the committee, by a vote of 22 to 11, approved reduction of the tax rate on corporation income from 15 to 11 1/2 per cent against the 12 per cent suggested by Secretary Mellon. This action came after rejection, 16 to 11, of a proposal to cut the rate to 11 per cent.



## CLERKS WIN TOURNAMENT IN SPITE OF DEPLETED RANKS; THOMPSON TAKES HIGH HONORS

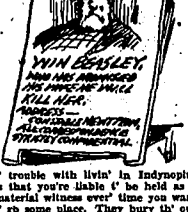
