"The Drop Kick" is a story of college life from a story by Katherine Tegen, author of "Glitter" which ran in College Humor and was published as a sensational novel.

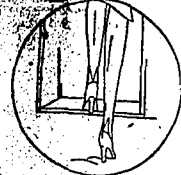

LIFE'S SEAMY SIDE IN TWIN FALLS KNOWN TO RELIEF WORKERS

Salvation Army Officer Outlines Program for Meeting Needs of Human Derelicts and Those in Hard Circumstances.

The seamy side of life in Twin Falls is more extensive than most people suspect, is known to no one any better than it is to Ensign Lottie B. Schell, who since last September has been in charge of the work of the Salvation Army in the district extending from Miles on the west to Burley on the east.

Working with "soup, soap and salvation," the traditional weapons of the Salvation Army, Ensign Schell comes in contact not only with life in Twin Falls "atoms" where ignorance, ill-health and disease subject poverty cause concern to county aid city officials, but she has acquired familiarity with an increasing number of families in which the financial problem has become acute only recently and perhaps only temporarily.

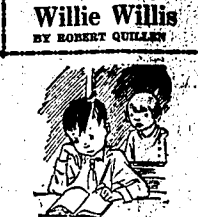
It is an essential, Ensign Schell believes, that there should be preservation of self respect as well as there should be relief of the needy, and a woman of a practical turn of mind with many years of experience in the work of the Salvation Army, it is her invariable custom to make a sweeping investigation in the case of each applicant for assistance.

Wood File Plays Part
In line with this policy, Ensign Schell has arranged to provide woodpile at the Army's headquarters, here so that able bodied men applicants for food or shelter will be given opportunity to give something of productive labor in return for the benefits sought.

Center of Activities
Headquarters for the Salvation Army in Twin Falls and the district are maintained in a residence building of nine-rooms at the corner of Fourth and Third streets west. Here are assembled the stores of provisions and clothing for relief work, and here are provided the narrow quarters in which religious services are being held and where scores of boys and girls assemble at Sunday school.

On the basis of facts as disclosed by investigation in the case of each applicant, some people can't buy it, and others get it for nothing. One woman respondent wanted to buy a number of sweaters. She wanted them for the year that was in them. Her offers were refused. Another would-be customer wanted clothing to send out of the state, and she also was disappointed. An unencumbered and able bodied young man bought an overcoat out of the Army's store, and he paid for it. And the next customer, a mother, paid a dime for a good woolen dress for her little daughter.

"Whenever the circumstances warrant it," Ensign Schell explained, "a charge is made for the clothing we distribute. Our purpose on this primarily is to preserve the self respect of our patrons, while all of the proceeds from the sale of clothing is being turned into the charity fund to provide other necessities for those who can pay nothing."

Expense of maintaining the Salvation Army work, including rental of headquarters and compensation of workers, is met entirely through contributions received when the tambores sound on the streets and in business houses.

Until recently Ensign Schell has been without assistance in her work throughout the winter. In the past few days she has been joined by Cadet Irene Doty, and sometimes during the winter she has to recruit for active service.

CONFESSED FORGER TELLS STRANGE TALE IN DISTRICT COURT

Robert Longworth Says He Passed Bad Check While Drunk; Wrecked Plane of Air Mail When Intoxicated.

Pleading guilty to the charge of having forged and passed a check for \$125 at the Sanger Service station here Robert Longworth declared that he was drunk when he did it. He said that he had no recollection of the act, that he did not need the money, and that this was simply an attempt to cover up a bad check which he had passed on a previous occasion. The story of his escapades while under the influence of liquor reads like a tall tale. Judge Ensign determined to take the case under advisement until Friday morning to verify some of the statements.

Denier "Char" Longworth was asked many questions by Judge H. P. Ensign in order to determine the extent of his citizenship. The queries were based largely on information obtained by Sheriff M. E. Finch from the United States department of justice, regarding the names of several battles that he was in. He said, however, that he did not spend 90 days in jail in San Diego in 1925 for disorderly conduct resulting from a drunken spree.

The defendant said that he was wanted in Jersey City, New Jersey, in June 1926, under the name of J. L. Sears as a fugitive from justice but that the record showed nothing further. Longworth said that he bought a car in Jersey City at that time and drove it home the state line before it was fully paid for. He said that this was against the state law but he did not know it and he later came back and paid for the car so nothing was done. He said he never willfully gave a wrong name but might have done so while drunk.

Had Big Fall
He said that he served in the United States air mail service for three years beginning in 1922, but was discharged when he got drunk. Next week they are going to convert flour sacks into as many articles of apparel for home use as possible.

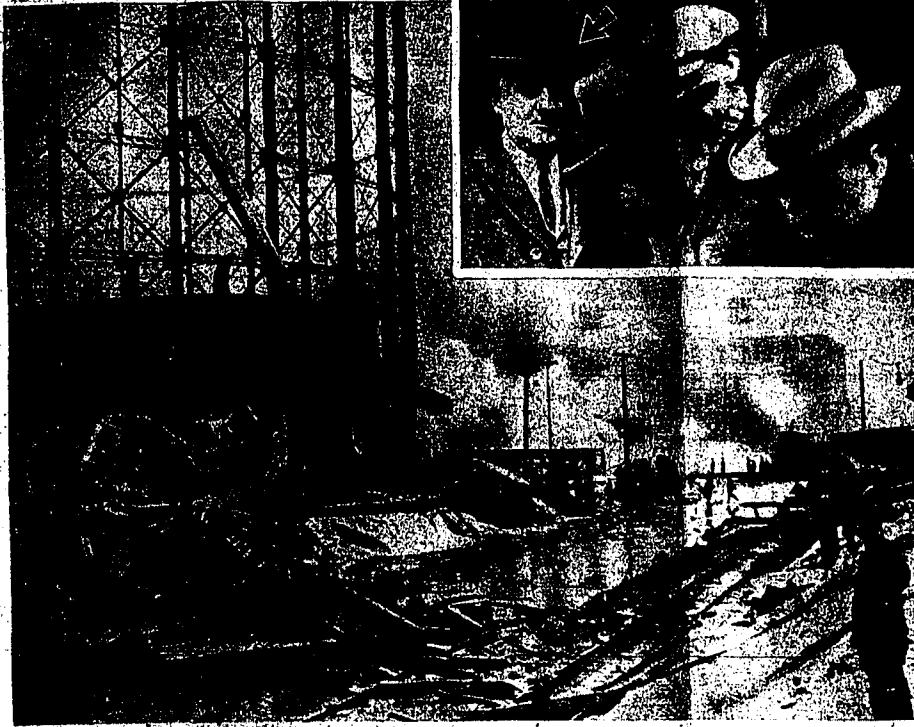

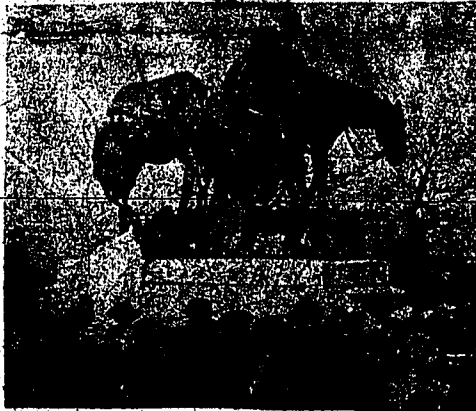

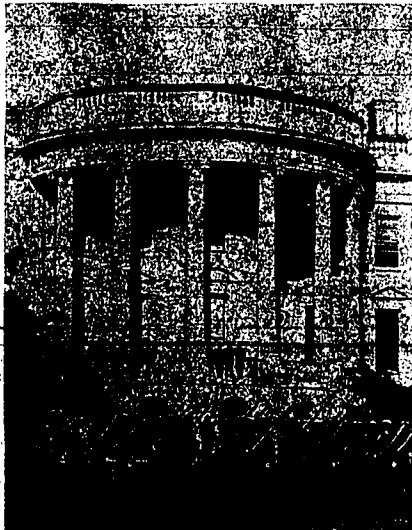
