LIFE-SAVING CREW BRAVES STORMY SEA TO RESCUE BOATMAN

Captain H. D. Winbeck and Seven Men of Oregon Coast Station, Missing for Nearly Two Days, Make Safe Landing

(By The Associated Press) ASTORIA, Ore., Nov. 12—The Missing Astorian was informed over long distance telephone by Captain William D. Winbeck of the Pacific Coast guard station at Hermana harbor that his boat and crew of seven men made safe landing at Tokeland, Wash., at 5 o'clock this afternoon after rescuing the lone occupant of a fishing boat.

ASTORIA, Ore., Nov. 12 (AP)—In a terrific gale off the coast of northern Oregon, the life saving crew, nine or ten men, of the Willapa harbor coast guard station, was believed to be lost at sea today. Crews from Point Adams and Cape Disappointment braved the storm to search for the missing men. The cutter Washinawid set out from Neah Bay, Wash., to aid in the search.

The lifeboat was disabled when a line caught in the propeller and after a hard fight, was able to make the Columbia river lightship at 10 o'clock last night. The storm-tossed waters made it impossible for the men to board the lightship and a line was thrown aboard.

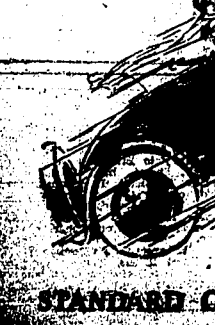

STEWARDSHIP IS URGED IN SERMON

Pastor of Ascension Church Points to Fate of Rich Fool; Real Cause of Thanksgiving.

The idea that wealth implies stewardship and not merely possession of goods for purely personal gratification, and that we should thank God for our opportunities to do good, underlay the Thanksgiving sermon delivered by Rev. W. Edward Ward, pastor of Ascension Episcopal church Thursday morning.

Thanking for his text St. Luke, XIII, 12, "A man's life consisteth not in the abundance of goods, which he possesseth," Rev. Mr. Ward said:

The Lord's Warning

Our Lord is warning His hearers against one of the most insidious and dangerous mistakes into which an individual can fall, the mistake that having in possession. He exposes most forcefully, even tragically, the folly of the human being who lives in such a delusion; as also the insidious danger which is hidden in the following. The rich fool was the victim of such an absurdity. He is presented, as we are today, among the abundance of a luxurious harvest. His idea of the use of abundance is to hoard it. So when he finds his barns inadequate to store the season's produce, he determines promptly to build larger. A very right and proper resolution, to preserve the abundant return until he can use it; but an absurd conclusion if hoarding only is his motive. He believes that his new barns will minister greatly to his happiness in the most effective manner. Accordingly, he is gratified, as he anticipates the day when his new building, completed and filled to overflowing, he shall sit down among the plenty and say "Soul thou hast much goods laid up for many years, take thine ease." "Soul take thine ease," as if human life was an ignoble, aimless existence lower than that of the beasts of the fields, or the worms that wriggle in the slime. There were two false principles at work in bringing him to his miserable conclusion.

He contemplated the meaning of the terms, "Having" and "Possessing." He thought they meant the same thing. But he was in error. His idea of "having" is not "using," but hoarding. "This is mine," he says practically, and I propose to do with it just what I please. I owe responsibility in connection with it, to neither God or man." He would enlarge his storage accommodation, and shut up his possessions safely under lock and key.

"These are mine and I mean to keep them for myself alone." This was how he conceived of property in God's harvest, produced by God's earth, and cherished and watered by God's sun and rain.

Christian Duty

Is it not the same with many of those who call themselves Christians? They take all that God gives them out of a loving heart for His children, and then refuse to give even a small per cent of their wealth to the advancement of God's Kingdom, but spend it rather on movies, parties, selfish amusement, and then when trouble comes about them, they wonder why. In other words, they say "This is mine. I intend to do with it as I please. I will be independent of God and man." Note the result of such false ideas in that of the Rich Fool.

God has endowed us with certain faculties and gifts, which are to be exercised and developed by certain things, which this world of His produces. Our bodies are to be sustained and developed, by lawful food; and for them mother earth has provided the harvest of the good things of the earth. Our minds are to be cultivated and matured by observation and study, and for these God's book of nature and the work of genius, the broad fields of history and human experience are the pasture grounds in which the human soul is to feed.

We have, moreover, a spiritual character to develop; and for that, Jesus is the very "bread of life." But neither body, soul or spirit of man or woman possesses anything, which it does not take up into itself, and utilize by making part of its being. The demands of the body are, satisfied when it has used certain elements of food; but all food besides, for the time being, practically nothing to the body, because it can use no more. One really owns only what he can use, and one can get out of his possession only as much as his nature can absorb, and nothing more.

"God means His creatures to eat, drink and be merry." All animals by true nature is a standing testimony to this fact. But eating, drinking, and merrymaking are all to be done with one motive—the perfection of life. Beasts, birds, and fish eat, drink and are merry to make themselves better than beasts, birds and fishes. Man ought to eat, drink and be merry to make himself a better man. The rich fool meant to eat, drink and be merry for quite another reason. His ambition was not to be a better man; his practice certainly tended to make him a worse man. Happiness he was seeking in dead things he had not learned that its seat and center are in the living soul.

Food is blessed indeed. Ere the rich fool had his plans executed, and had time to sit down and congratulate himself on his success, the dread fiat went forth which neither rich nor poor can disobey. "This night thy soul shall be required of thee." His happiness was required of "thee." His happiness was the bid, as by a chilling frost; from his goods, which were his reward, he was cruelly torn, and launched out into the world of spirits, poorer than the meanest peasant who toiled upon his lands, and infinitely more miserable. So passeth the glory of the world.

Graduate for Benefits

How can a man offer thanksgiving at the feet of God, for the bounty of the harvest, if his whole aim in life is to attain independence of God, so that come good seasons or bad he can never want? There can be no gratitude where no sense of present benefit exists. The Lord's prayer runs, "Give us this day our daily bread"; and it may be rendered, "Our bread for the coming day." No farther than that can the enlightened wish to go; for he knows that whorlship go, and no farther would daily thanksgiving be bound up with daily bread, and true dependence on the power divine with the daily offering of the tribute of thanks.

Nationally, as well as individually, this great truth runs. We are to-day rendering thanksgiving for a bountiful harvest, and it is most proper that we should do so with lusty joy. For, after all is said and done, the grand fact stands eternal by true nature, "In God we live and move and have our being." On the regular occurrence of His seed time and harvest we depend as surely as when plenty crowns the plain, there

can be no better acknowledgment of our individual and national stewardship, than when as a people we offer at our Father's feet the tribute of grateful praise. Our national thanksgiving is that, or it is nothing. But national life consists not in the wealth which a nation possesses.

Mingled with our national thanksgiving there should be ever a prayer for a wider spirit of stewardship, without which we shall never be made to understand that "a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the goods which he possesseth."

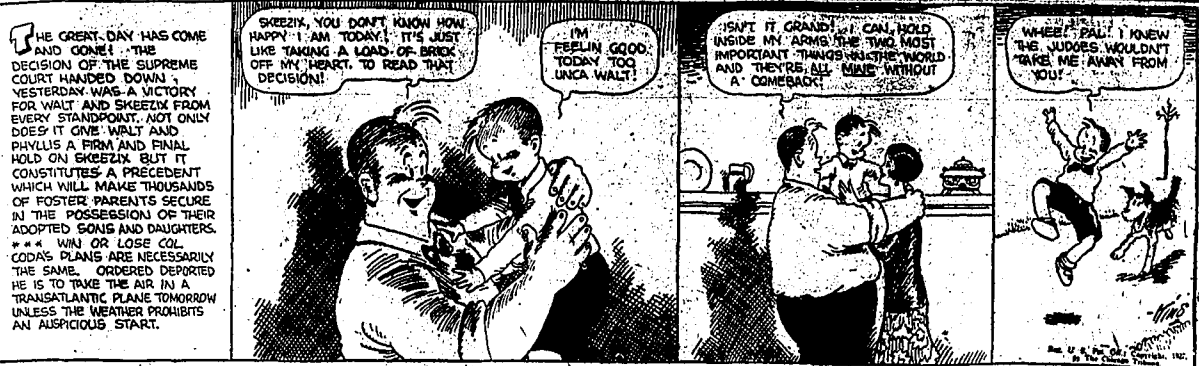

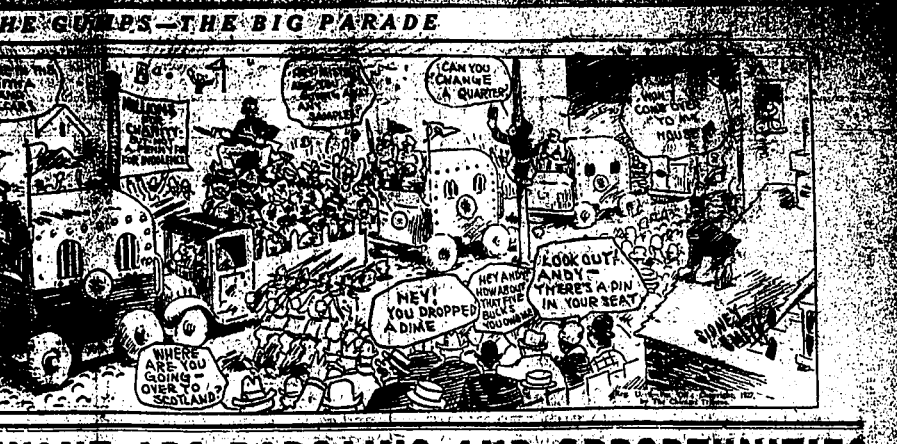
