

SHOOTING FOLLOWS MONTH-OLD QUARREL BETWEEN TWO MEN

W. H. Jenkins, Severely Wounded by "Buck" Van Eaton, Once Before Attacked by Assault, Investigation Shows.

William H. Jenkins, who was severely wounded Thursday evening by "Buck" Van Eaton, once time Brock Creek resident, had a long history of quarrels with a knife in a quarrel about a month ago, officers investigating the shooting today.

Jenkins is a produce dealer, and he would not be heard of in hearing. He is credited with having scored a knockout against Jack Dempsey, former heavyweight boxing champion, in a bare-knuckle fight at Salt Lake about 16 years ago. He was candidate for sheriff of the progressive party's ticket at the election last year.

The shooting occurred at the Teben residence after Thanksgiving dinner at the Jenkins home which was the person involved in the shooting had assembled.

Jealousy as Motive After shooting Jenkins and Mrs. Teben, Van Eaton turned the gun on himself and inflicted a scalp wound. He is held a prisoner in the county jail. The gun used by Van Eaton was empty when it was picked up by officers after the shooting.

Jealousy as a possible motive for the shooting was indicated by disclosures of the investigation yesterday. Van Eaton, a bachelor, 42 years old, is known to have been a recent visitor at the Teben residence. The quarrel in which Van Eaton is said to have attacked Jenkins with a knife was reported by Mrs. W. H. Teben.

Mrs. Teben, 38 years old, is the mother of the Teben children. Van Eaton was not an invited guest at Thanksgiving dinner at the Jenkins home. Mrs. W. H. Teben, mother of the wounded man, said last evening, Van Eaton, she said, came, she supposed, from the Teben home, and the party was sitting down to dinner, and was given an invitation to join them, which he accepted.

WHITE FLAG HOISTED AT FOLSOM PRISON

Convicts Surrender After Riot and Siege Costing 11 Lives and Wounding of 31 Persons.

FOLSOM PRISON, Cal., Nov. 25 (AP)—More than 1000 inmates of Folsom prison here today hoisted the white flag in a sign of submission to the law.

The rioting started at 11 a. m. yesterday and lasted until 11 p. m. when the convicts, numbering 11 men, two of them prison guards, were killed and 31 wounded.

The surrender, convicts held Folsom Court Smith after they had been in their cells, was brought by the fear that rifles would be fired into the cell blocks. The convicts were told that an ultimatum was to be delivered to the warden under the threat of gas.

Flag at Half Mast The prison at half mast flew over the prison at half mast in memory of the two guards who died as a result of the riot. One was killed and the other nine dead were convicts. Their bodies were held here for autopsy by the warden's guards. Three of the 27 wounded convicts were seriously hurt and are not expected to die.

GRANGE REAFFIRMS ADHERENCE TO PLAN FOR FARM RELIEF

National Organization Centers on Export Debiture to Give Benefits of Tariff to Agriculture; Closes Convention.

(By The Associated Press) CLEVELAND, Nov. 25.—The national Grange closed its annual convention here today after passing resolutions directed to speed up the export debiture plan, the only sound and workable way to achieve farm relief, favoring the export of wool.

The farm relief report, woven about the export debiture designed to give agriculture the same tariff benefits as industry was drawn up by a special committee headed by W. W. Benson, member of the Indiana Grange.

"Farm relief through export debitures depends neither upon appropriation nor special laws," the adopted report says. "By debiture method farm relief can be attained with administrative simplicity, directness and economy of operation."

In favoring an export debiture as opposed by the McNary-Haugen farm relief bill, passed by congress but vetoed by President Coolidge, the Grange approved in substance the plan proposed by Professor Charles Stewart, of the University of Illinois.

ARBORE VALLEY, Nov. 25 (AP)—Elk planted several years ago in the Arbores valley near Arbores in Fewell county have increased to 800, with 200 calves born this year.

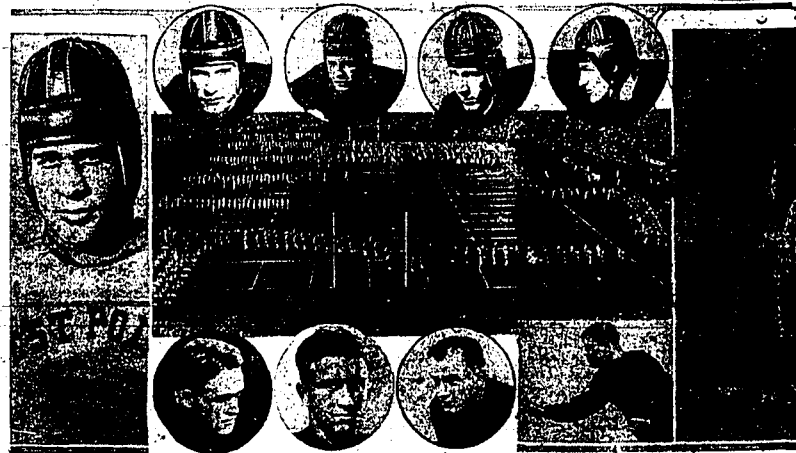

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CREDITS RED CROSS WITH GREAT WORK IN NEW ENGLAND FLOOD

Contributions Augment Relief Organization's Appropriation for Food, Clothing and Shelter in Stricken Area.

According to authentic information received by George Balch, chairman of the Twin Falls chapter, American Red Cross, a magnificent piece of relief and rehabilitation work is being carried on by the organization in the flooded regions of New England where more than 200 people lost their lives early this month.

Up to November 14, 8033 persons had received emergency assistance from the Red Cross, which is being used to extend this necessary aid. No general appeal will be made to the public for funds necessary.

The latest reports show that 10,445 people are homeless, that 284 buildings have been destroyed and 1881 damaged. Twenty-one cities and towns are included in the stricken area. Large numbers of live stock have been lost.

Designated by Governors The governors of Vermont and Massachusetts, the States most affected, have designated the Red Cross to coordinate all relief and reconstruction program to be carried on through the local chapters with the assistance and cooperation of the National Red Cross personnel, of which 25 are now in the area, including Vice Chairman James L. Fisher.
