Inquest Brings No New Facts
An investigation into circumstances surrounding the death of Mr. Miller, that was launched yesterday by a board of inquiry convened by officials of the Oregon Short Line railway company, inspected the scene of the tragic occurrence and interrogated a number of witnesses, but brought forth no new facts. Witnesses included members of the crew of the eastbound freight train that struck Mr. Miller's car. The train was proceeding on its normal schedule along the highway toward the crossing at a moderate rate of speed and that it was neither increased nor diminished as it pushed out across the rails directly in front of the freight train.

To Prepare Report
The report of the board of inquiry probably will be made public within a few days, it was stated. In the meantime investigation will be continued, although the board probably will not be convened again. It was stated. Members of the board were T. E. C. HIS TRAIL ENDS IN DEATH AT HOME AT BUHL

Pioneer Citizen and Former County Commissioner Suddenly Summoned Without Indication of Previous Illness.

BUHL, Nov. 30.—Special to The News—C. H. Taylor, 88 one of the pioneers of the Buhl section and former Twin Falls city commissioner, died suddenly at his home near this city at 8 o'clock last night of heart failure while sitting in a rocking chair after dinner. There was no indication of previous illness. Mr. Taylor had eaten a light dinner, though he seemed to feel well and was in his usual manner. After dinner he sat down in the rocking chair and shortly thereafter he died, saying at the same time, "I guess I'll go to bed pretty soon." A moment or two later he gasped and collapsed in his chair. When Mrs. Taylor ran to his side and then telephoned to his brother, B. B. Taylor, who lives only about 100 yards away in Buhl, Idaho, brother, accompanied by his wife, ran over, but to the surprise of the neighbors, after a few minutes later from Buhl, said that death was caused by heart failure and was instantaneous.

Born in Iowa
C. H. Taylor was born in Jasper county, Iowa, February 4, 1859. He came to the Buhl section with his family 21 years ago last March, at about the usual time. The town of Buhl was established. He was station agent for the Oregon Short Line railroad there for some time, and later moved to the farm, about half miles east and a quarter mile south where he resided until death called him.

Survived by Family
He is survived by his widow, and three children—Lola Taylor, of Enterprise, Oregon, and Leola Taylor, of Latah county, who is agriculturalist. He is also survived by two brothers, B. B. Taylor, of Buhl and P. D. Taylor, of Elton, Kansas; one sister, Mrs. E. J. French, of Bundy, Mrs. Percy Bishop, and Dr. Flora Kindig of Los Angeles, and Mrs. Lillie Law, of North Oregon. Mr. Taylor always took an active interest in public affairs. In 1910 he was elected member of the board of county commissioners, and served two terms. In recent years he had been prominently mentioned as a candidate for office, but declined the nomination or legislator on the democratic ticket but declined to again be a candidate in the coming year. The body is at the Johnson undertaking parlor in Buhl awaiting word from relatives before completion of funeral arrangements.

Buyer Seeks Holder of Money in Escrow
A man named George Gray claimed to be the holder of a certain amount of money which he had been unable to find a lady named Carrie in whose hands he had turned over the same amount pending the closing of a deal for half interest in a chili parlor on Shoshone street.

A few days ago the women were reported to have had disagreement over the conduct of the business, according to the story Gray told the police, while Carrie wanted to stay in the business and the other woman wanted to get out. Gray claims that he agreed to buy the other woman's half interest for \$50,000, an odd sum, and in good faith, placed the purchase price in escrow in the hands of Carrie, while the other woman was preparing a bill of sale. Yesterday Gray declared the other woman was on hand while he was unable to find Carrie. At 10 o'clock last evening he requested the matter to the officers who had not reported on it at midnight.

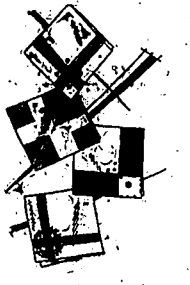

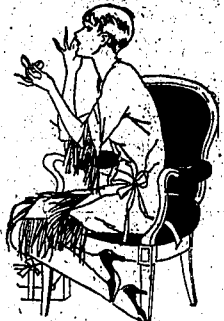

PARIS, Nov. 30 (AP)—Several score of Paris sewing girls breathed sighs of relief when Ruth Elder called for home.

The expensive substitutes for the pocket handkerchiefs and lipstick, which were Ruth's sole baggage when she took off for Paris, cost the sewing girls many weary hours of overtime. There was just a week's allowance between the girl aviator's appearance in the Rue de la Paix and her departure for her native land on Wednesday.

The Queen of Spades, Paris dress-makers' most distinguished patroness, could not have received faster service than did the little American aviator. Her Majesty, who happened to be shopping in Paris at the same time with her, ever ordered so many costumes; one, time as the American girl did.

"Necessities," Ruth called them. But her orders at a single house read like a shopping list. There were 12 coats and dresses in all, making seven complete costumes, plus five hats and "things to fly." There were 100 dresses, two evening dresses, two afternoon dresses, sport things and the necessary accessories.

Her Paris dress clothes cost her, that is a secret between Ruth, the dressmakers and the United States customs men. But she paid "like any client" at Jean Patou, and "did not ask for any reduction," according to an official of the house.

One of her sport costumes was a beige crepe, four-piece ensemble. It is composed of pleated skirt, knitted pull-over sweater, a knitted orange cardigan and wide wool scarf.

GIVES SPECIFICATIONS ON THE NEW FORD CAR

Henry Ford today announces the specifications on his new car after silence of a good many months. George R. Jones of the Union Motor company, Ford dealers here, states that the new touring car is a picture of an automobile that in performance, appearance, and mechanical features which has heretofore been associated only with cars in a considerably higher price class.

The new car is said to make from 65 to 70 miles per hour and to do this smoothly and easily. In addition it is said to hold the road and to drive with comfort to the driver and passenger. In its general design the car has been held to the original Ford idea of instilling all types of road conditions and its performance on bad roads is said to be unusually satisfactory.

The car is said to have unusual acceleration and to go from 5 to 25 miles per hour in eight and one-half seconds. It has mechanical four-wheel brakes of a simple and reliable type and which are easy of adjustment. The engine develops 40 horse power at 2,200 revolutions per minute. A considerable point has been made of the low revolution speed as a factor in the life of the car. The crank shaft is large and well balanced. The cylinder bore is 3 1/2 inches, a stroke of 4 1/2 inches. The pistons are of aluminum alloy. The car, Mr. Jones says, is unusually quiet and free from vibration. The timing gears are of bakelite fabric and the camshaft has been so designed as to eliminate valve clinking.

The oiling system is a combination of pump splash, and gravity feed. The car has a standard gear split, which is said to be almost free and very easy to handle. The mechanism is so designed as to prevent transmission of road jolts to the steering wheel.

The car is made in six models, namely: Phaeton, roadster, sport coupe, coupe, Tudor sedan and Fordor sedan.

The new car is to be shown at the Union Motor company salesrooms on Friday morning. The car which comes to Twin Falls is the only car which will be on exhibition between

Pocatello and Boise. In Utah the car will be shown only in Salt Lake City and Ogden. Pictures of all the models with charts and descriptions illustrating the mechanism in detail will be on hand for the benefit of visitors at the Union Motor company Friday.

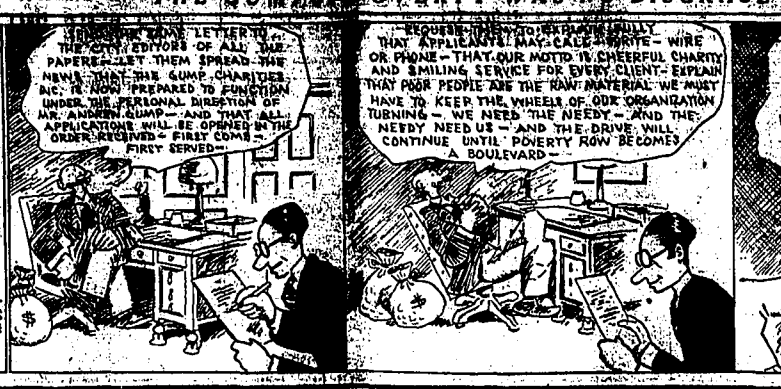

CASTLEFORD MEN ARE GUILTY OF GAMBLING SAYS JURY IN CASE

Ernest McDowell and Conrad Kelley Are Convicted After Two Days Trial; Attorneys Make Eloquent Pleas.

Verdict of guilty to the charge of violating the gambling law of Idaho was returned by a jury in district court here last evening shortly after 8 o'clock. Ernest McDowell and Conrad Kelley, charged with gambling at the McDowell barber shop in Castleford, November 6. The jury was out about an hour. The accused men had previously been found guilty by Judge H. C. Gray on November 6 and had appealed to the district court. They will be sentenced Saturday.

The address to the jury at the close of the trial was marked by oratory on both sides, each attorney graciously yielding the palm to the other. The prosecution was presented by O. W. Witham for the prosecution; while the right of the defense to a fair trial and to be considered innocent until proven guilty was urged by E. V. Larson for the defense.

Corroboration Is Issue
Much of the discussion centered about the question whether in addition to the testimony of E. Ulrich, who said he bought \$23 worth of chips, there was evidence which in their minds warranted a conviction. The defense asserted that Ulrich taken part in the game was an accomplice, and his testimony must have corroboration, while it was asserted, the testimony of others present was in contradiction to his. The state contended that the circumstances under which Ulrich testified indicated that he was sincere, since it went to his interest to deny that they were gambling; and further that the circumstances corroborated his testimony.

The case went to the jury at 4:30 p. m. Trial of the case occupied two days.

The case of the state against Snowden for alleged burglary is called for today at 9:30 a. m. The same law, lawers confront one another in that case that were on opposite sides in the gambling case.

FARMERS WILL POISON RABBITS FOR PROFIT

HURLEY, Nov. 30—Heterolore considered as of use except as food for wild Indians, the lowly jack rabbit has finally come into his own. He takes his place as a fur bearing animal with warket value. County Agent Palmer has just announced that he has secured a few bales of caught, and the pelts shipped to a pelt dealer who agrees to pay 75 cents for black tail skins and 70 cents a pound for white tails.

Last year rabbits were thick and did much damage, completely killing out fields of wheat and alfalfa in outlying districts. Several rabbit drives were held and thousands of the pest killed off. Some few bales of pelts were shipped, fairly satisfactory prices being obtained. This season the bunnies are rather scarce and going very little damage. Poisoning campaigns, however, will be carried out when winter comes, and demonstrations of poisoning methods will be given by the county agent.

Until last year, prices for rabbit skins ranged from the cost of trapping and skinning. A very limited market, though, prevailed at that time and pelts for live rabbits where the legs, furred animals, were used in coating moccasins. And now and then a broken car of skins was shipped to eastern centers, where they were sold for food in the markets as western fare.

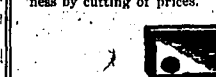
VON HINDENBURGH HAS 6 LITTLE GRANDCHILDREN
