CHIEF EXECUTIVE IS POSITIVELY OUT OF PRESIDENTIAL RACE

President Coolidge Describes Himself to Republican National Committeemen as 'Eliminated' From Campaign.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—President Coolidge described himself to the republican national committee today as "eliminated" from next year's presidential contest and advised it to continue the "serious task of selecting another candidate."

In keeping with the dramatic manner in which he first declared, on August 2, in the Black Hills, that he did not "choose to run for president in 1928," the president informed the committee, in the east room of the White House that his "decision will be respected" and that no one should be supposed that he had modified it.

Nation's Chief Executive, in Annual Message to Congress, Calls Upon People to Continue a "Stern Self-Denial" in Government Expenditures; Still Opposes McNary-Haugen Measure.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—Calling upon the people to continue a "stern self-denial" in national expenditures, President Coolidge laid before congress today a moderate program of expansion for the nation's defenses and natural resources.

PRESIDENT DECLARES FOR EXPANSION OF NATIONAL DEFENSES AND RESOURCES

For nitrate production and for fertilizer manufacturing. Containing a message that he had attained a properly never exceeded and therefore was in a position to enjoy some of the benefits which result from economy. Mr. Coolidge presented the specter, nevertheless, of a large national debt and warned that until the revenues now directed toward its reduction could be diverted to internal improvements and national development, the country would continue to sacrifice and the government must continue to economize.

WANTS LAWS ENFORCED

Although but one paragraph of his message was devoted to foreign lands, the president emphasized the need for both the people and public officials to observe the conditions of this constitutional provision and its respective laws. Recalling that congress and the states have passed adequate laws, exceptions have been made for enforcement of the eighteenth amendment. Mr. Coolidge declared that the federal executive is obligated to enforce to the full extent of their ability laws now in effect.

RAILROAD CONSOLIDATION IS NECESSARY

Although the message was devoted almost exclusively to domestic affairs, the president did inform congress that the American intervention in foreign lands was merely for the purpose of protecting the lives and property of this country. He defended the administration's policy in China and Nicaragua and expressed the belief that the controversy with Mexico over oil was being solved without impairment of friendly feeling.

RETURNS \$6,000,000

Being a nation which relies upon its ability to maintain a high standard of living and good will rather than by force, the president advocated the maintenance of a national standard of living. He added, however, the need for considerable naval expansion had been demonstrated some time ago and that in rounding up the United States would not be moved by the nature of the Geneva armament conference.

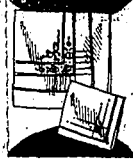

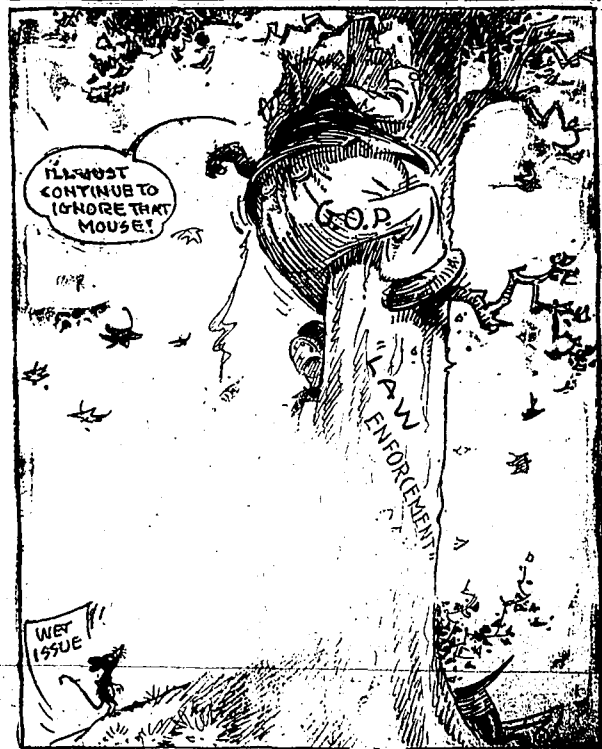

Coach Rich Fox's basketball team, which is now developing promises to be the smallest team in the conference.

With the exception of Darwin Burgher, forward and center and Herbert Chanis, guard, who are close to the six-foot mark, indications are that the Vandal squad will be in the runt class, so far as physical size is concerned. George Greene, letterman guard, who stands around five feet ten, and weighs in the neighborhood of 150 pounds, will be one of the larger boys on the squad, said Fox. Glenn Jacoby, letter man guard, is five feet eight inches tall, David, forward, has about the same height. This takes in all the lettermen of last year who have reported. Then Stowell, who looks as if he were set for a first man position, also is a youngster so far as size is concerned. The same with Barrett, guard and MacMillan forward, two others who are looked to be a couple of reasons why letter men of last year are facing a struggle to get their monogram again this year. Harold Thornhill, sophomore, is whom Fox is looking for a tip-off man, pairs height with Greene, or about five feet ten inches. A survey of all the candidates reporting regularly for varsity drill shows one of the greatest deaths of big men in the history of Idaho basketball.

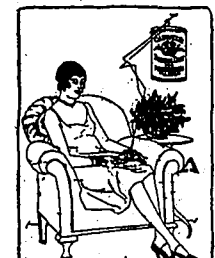

The absence of wires, obviates much of the necessity for frequent overhauls, an important factor in private owners. Advocates of the biplane claim for its stability and strength.

Before the war the monoplane was discredited because of a series of disasters. The speedily repaired British biplanes, over the German Fokker and Taube monoplanes further injured the monoplane's standing. In 1915 the British famous squadron of "parasols" or monoplanes was known as the "Suicide Club."

In the last year, however, antagonism to the monoplane has lessened. British designers are loath to change from biplane type, because their machines are set for this market. They have been applying themselves to the task of producing monoplanes to compete with continental and American machines.

Holland and Germany are considerable users of the monoplane. The K. L. M. company, which transports pas-

sengers from London to Amsterdam, and the Luthanas company in Germany, which carries more than 200 such planes, both employ this type.

In the early days of aviation the rivalry between the monoplane and the biplane was particularly strong. The Wright machine, the first heavier-than-air machine to make a successful flight of any distance, was a biplane. Hot on its heels, however, came the Blériot, a monoplane, which was the first to cross the English Channel. Most of the sliders which were prototypes of the airplane were monoplanes.

DANVILLE, Ky., Dec. 6.—Football fandom is quick to forget the stellar accomplishments of the past for those of the present.

Little Centre College probably offers as fitting an example of fleeting fame as any in the realm of football. A few years ago Centre sprang into the spotlight with a winning eleven that swept aside all before it. The Praying Colonel, as the team became known because it always knelt in prayer just before starting a game, soon got to be the talk of the gridiron world.

Conceded by Charlie Moran, veteran National League umpire, Centre turned out such twinklers as Bo McMillin, Red Weaver, Roberts, Armstrong, Covington and others. Some gained All-American recognition.

It wasn't long ere little Centre College situated down among the Kentucky hills was the most sought after school in the game. Offers for games came from far and wide. Centre was the biggest attraction.

Even Harvard asked Centre to come to the Cambridge stadium; Centre accepted; in fact, met the Crimson in the Soldier's Field enclosure several times. In 1921 Centre chalked up one of its greatest, defeating Harvard, 6 to 0.

Centre's reign around the top was short-lived, however. The sparkling McMillin, the great Weaver, Arm-

strong, Roberts' and the rest of the team graduated, leaving the football world school nothing much saw members of other campaigns.

During the past few years Centre has done but little in football circles. Its teams have met defeat with all too much regularity and mostly at the hands of schools the Praying Colonel would have considered hardly more than setups in the winning days. Only recently Vanderbilt thumped Centre, 53 to 6.

In a word, Centre College has slipped out of the limelight about as fast as it had reached the purple heights seven or eight years ago.

No longer does the little hamlet here close up shop and turn out en masse to welcome home the conquering heroes. No longer does the band play triumphant airs to lead Centre's mere handful of students in a snake dance through the main section of town.

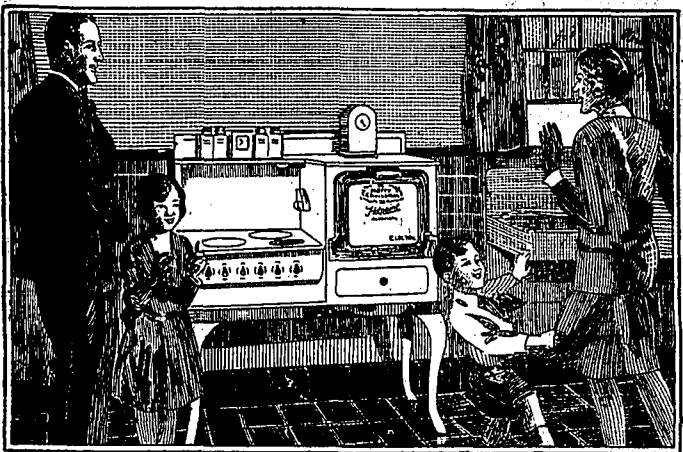

WEATHER SENDS CORN QUOTATIONS UP

Market on Principal Cereals Closes Firm With Wheat on Upward Trend; Oats Higher.

CHICAGO, Dec. 16 (AP)—Rough weather looked for throughout the corn belt gave a lively upturn to corn values today and lifted other grains as well. Good export inquiry for corn was also a stimulating factor and it was pointed out that the 1927 European crop is approximately 250,000,000 bushels short of the 1926 total.

Despite setbacks at the start, the corn market closed 1/4c to 1/2c up, oats at 1/4c to 1/2c advance, and provisions varying from a decline to a rise of 7c.

Besides a forecast of snow and rain for the entire corn belt, talk was current that corn was being bought for export at the Gulf of Mexico 4 1/2c a bushel over the price of Chicago December delivery. Further in the case of the soft corn market was expected to delay the completion of corn-hauling and to hinder the rural movement of corn to market inasmuch as initial weakness of corn values today was based largely on good weather, the forecast of widely different conditions, the reports of a blizzard in the northwest and west led to an abrupt change of the market position by a majority of traders.

Europe Requires Corn Attention later focused more and more on increasing notice of corn export business. Large prospective European requirements and of heavy consumer buying abroad. In addition, New York and Chicago managers and traders for cash corn was developing both with Great Britain and Continental Europe.
