FAMOUS RING FIGURE GOES TO LAST REST

Young Griffith, 30 Years Ago Hailed as Title Contender Victim of Own Indulgences.

NEW YORK, Dec. 7 (AP)—The fastest and most perplexing boxer who ever contended with the Queensberry rules is dead, an apparent victim of his own and Broadway's indulgence. Thirty years ago "Jack the Hunter" fought the pick of the nation's featherweights at 126 pounds to be hailed as "the greatest" and one of the best boxers in the ring. Today he dragged his 300-pound body from a rent-free waste apartment room to the hallway before medical aid could reach him.

Born 56 years ago as Alfred Griffith in Sydney, Australia, Young Griffith came to this country in 1893 after reaching the peak in the Australian boxing world. He fought as a featherweight and light middleweight, with most of his best battles ending in draws against such men as Joe Gans, Young Slocum, George Dixon, Jack Johnson and George Meemie. He was rich insofar as purses of that day went, but his worldly goods today consisted of the clothes he wore. More than once his trainer discovered him in a bar with barely time to reach the ring on foot in a race that was both a sobering-up and training stunt. Most of the purse money later went to the bar. Griffith's ability to stand on a minute's notice and keep his head clear from blows held him to the ring until 1907 and he never served to him a drop of drink when increasing weight pushed him off the canvas.

REMEMBERED IN FRISCO SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 7 (AP)—With the death of Young Griffith in New York today another famous character of San Francisco's boxing history passed on to join the list that now includes Ben Williams, George Egan, Jackson, "Spider" Kelly and many others.

Griffith came to San Francisco in 1904 and lived there until he was 30. He walked off the recall that brought him from Sydney, New South Wales, Australia, because of his character and determination to start, eager to fight but unwilling to train.

Tim McGrath, famous second, describes Griffith as "one of the real phantoms of the rings," so elusive that "I've seen him go through more ropes of fire than I could count, as much as being hit above the shoulder."

Further elaborate instructions relative to auto license law have been received from the Idaho state department of law enforcement by S. Claude Stewart, county assessor, who is promulgating copies of the state law within a few days. The bulletin which has been received and which is signed by Fred S. Lukens, commissioner of law enforcement, is believed to give complete instructions relative to what should be done by the applicant for license and by the assessor. It reads as follows: I wish to call your attention to a few important things in connection with the license law under which we shall be working during 1928. About December 10 I shall be able to send you complete copies of the motor vehicle laws. However before that time you will find the laws in Chapter 214, 24 and 253 of the 1927 session laws. The following points should receive special consideration: It is agreeable with this office that you accept applications for 1928 licenses of old cars at any time after December 1, 1928 licenses will not be acceptable on new cars until the end of the year.

There are many cars which have changed hands during the year which have not been transferred. It is really impossible to pass title to such cars unless regular transfer has been made. Therefore it is in line with sound policy to require that all applicants for license and title, who have not had their cars transferred, shall do so before you accept their application. Any transfer fee which you may collect after January 1 should be reported in your next year's reports so that 1927 reports will not be delayed. Example License

The certificate of title law makes it absolutely impossible to have duplicate licenses issued for privately owned cars. Therefore an owner would not be able to sell his car if he had a duplicate title had been issued. Any private owner, in order to get an exempt license, would have to declare that he has been fully satisfied the car in question. He is not likely to want to do this, especially if such a declaration makes it impossible for him to transfer title of the car on sale.

New Motor Numbers There will be no change in which motor number will be missing from cars. In such cases application may be made to this office for the supplying of a new motor number. We gladly supply this number with the understanding that it is to be stamped on the motor block and that you are to fill out the required forms for the use of those wishing to apply for such numbers. Section 13, chapter 214 of the 1927 laws states the requirements of a law matter and provides that some police officer must certify that the number has been stamped on the motor block or license or title may be issued.

When licenses are issued to those who have already received their license from this office, it is important that the title number issued for such car be placed on the license application in the space provided at the lower left hand corner. Cars From Other Counties It will be necessary for any assessor to issue licenses for cars belonging to other counties than his own. The provisions of section 7, chapter 214, laws of 1927, make provision for the moving of cars purchased elsewhere than in the resident county of the purchaser. In each case where application for license is made for an old car, owned in any other county than your own, you are hereby authorized to grant permission in writing for the removal of those cars to the residence of the owner. The form of suggested permit is to be attached to that which I am enclosing herewith.

Certificate of Title Law This office is going to depend very largely on your recommendations in the matter of questionable titles. During the first year of the operation of the anti-titled law there will be much more confusion than later and since you know persons of a very large percentage of the car owners in your county, we shall follow the definite rule that in cases where licenses have been issued for three consecutive years to the same owner, all titles should be approved. In other cases where you are doubtful as to that title should be issued, your recommendation will hold and you may proceed to accept license applications for those license plates on such cars. In those cases we may endorse your approval on the back of the application for title.

The above policy should reduce to a minimum the number of cases in which you will find it necessary to have the owner of the car use the duplicate of license application in place of plates. The section in chapter 250, 1927 session laws, which provides for this use of duplicate applications, was not repealed by the legislature. In order that there will be the least possible delay in the issuing of plates to those whose titles are questionable, we shall endeavor in this office to check, all such applications immediately on their receipt here, and we shall send daily notices to you of the titles which we have approved, also sending a postcard notice to the owner immediately upon the approval of such application.

Must Swear in Person All applications for title must be signed and sworn to by the owner of a motor vehicle and are not acceptable signed by any other person. Dealers are not allowed to make application for titles for individuals. We appreciate fully that these new laws are going to require a great deal of effort on your part and we

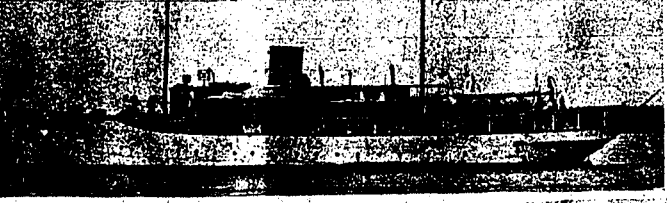

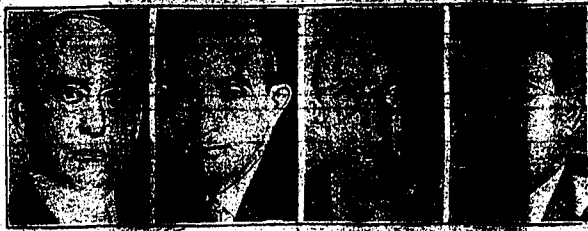

ROCKNE PUPILS TUTOR MANY WINNING TEAMS

Football Taught by Notre Dame Players of the Past Makes for Victory of Long List.

NEW YORK, Dec. 7 (AP)—The "Rockne school" of football, now 23 years old in scope, had its star pupils in all sections of the country in the season just past.

From little St. Mary's college in California under Ed Madigan to Villanova in Pennsylvania under Harry Stuhldreher, the Rockne type of light-footed attack swept the country around opposing lines with particularly telling effect. The work of Madigan and Stuhldreher on opposite sides of the continent was typical.

At St. Mary's, seven years of hammering home the principles of Rockne brought spectacular triumph to Herb Coach Madigan, former player at Notre Dame, in a 16 to 0 shutout of Leland-Stanford.

Another of the fresh performances of the football year was turned in by a Rockne pupil. Under J. A. Meyer, St. Xavier's college of Cincinnati, tallied 411 points in ten games, making 132 against one team.

Death of the success of the University of Georgia Bulldogs, conquerors of Yale, was ascribed to the Rockne type of play transplanted to southern "sluggo" football. One of the "Horsemen," and Harry Mehre, Notre Dame lineman, now assistant to Head Coach Knickerbocker, said the game has the hallmarks of the Rockne system—sweeping end runs with good interference, frequent use of the forward pass, smooth-running, blifly backs behind fast, rangy linemen; and a deceptive attack which strikes like a lightning flash. BALANCED DIET AIDED CONTROL OF PELLAGRA IN WAKE OF FLOOD

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 (AP)—The value of those finishing touches which the scientist persists in long after a specific task seems to have been completed, has been strikingly demonstrated in the pellagra situation this year in the Mississippi valley.

While the number of cases has increased since the flood, the situation has not become alarming and United States public health officials are gratified that the disease has been kept so firmly under control at a surprisingly low cost in money and human suffering.

A few years ago such an upheaval in the living habits of half a million persons would have been followed by rapid spread of this extremely disabling malady. Even more recently, before Dr. Joseph Goldberger of the public health service had completed his experiments the cost of preventing a pellagra epidemic would have cost about \$1 a day for each person affected. Instead, the cost was three cents—three cents worth of yeast added to a diet.

Dr. Goldberger is the man who found out how it could be cured. He began his work about 10 years ago, when Dr. Eugene D. Bondurant, then attached to the Alabama hospital for the insane, recognized a case which came under his care. In the next few years, hundreds of cases were reported from all parts of the country, many having been diagnosed as insanity, and the public health service promptly assigned several men to investigate the situation.

The disease baffled them for several years, and then Dr. Goldberger was put in charge of the work. He went into the southern states, where pellagra was particularly prevalent, studying the victims in their home environments and at work. He soon found evidence that their unbalanced diet had something to do with causing their condition and demonstrated

It is not supposed that these two men committed the other robberies as other local law officers are sure that the work has been done by outsiders.

Jeffries has quite a reputation as a boxer in this locally having won a number of bouts staged throughout this part of the state. Both men will be given a preliminary hearing within the next few days.

Jeffries was released Monday afternoon after having furnished a bond. Walling was able to furnish bond Wednesday morning. The whole affair is said to be more or less the result of a drinking brawl and may not

have anything to do with the robbery. Walling was press-ganged "back" board" winning "hammer" along with several cartons of cigarettes. The young man did not disturb the cash register which contained quite an amount of small change. Ancient Needlework Record of Royalty

PARIS, Dec. 7 (AP)—This vanity and magnificence of king and emperor, their rise and fall, are recorded in old account books of an ancient Paris embroidery house.

Napoleon and Louis XVIII and their families were the best customers of this firm of R. Brocard and Son, which in 1800 was the "Maison Picot." The first entry on their books is a charge against Napoleon, first consul; for a 230 franc red morocco leather carriage case for Roussin, his body-guard.

Entry after entry, shows Napoleon's rise to power, his accumulation of rich garments and tapestries, embroidered and painted flags for his armies and splendid imperial robes when Napoleon was crowned in Notre Dame cathedral.

Then Napoleon fell and was sent to St. Helena and King Louis was restored to the throne of France. His court, returning from exile, was poor, but soon their orders were for costly things.

The rise and fall of rulers, says old Monsieur Brocard, made the fortune of embroiderers. In those days the house was busy ripping off the "fr" of Napoleon to put on the "r" of King Louis and vice versa.

Ragged Edge of Movie Film Pictures Voice of Edison

NEW YORK, Dec. 7 (AP)—The ragged, broken on the margin of the accompanying picture are not imperfections. They are a talking movie record of Thomas A. Edison's voice.

The inventor is answering a question during his recent radio interview in the library of his home. His high pitched tones are indicated by the slenderness and irregularity of the lines.

Records of his voice were recorded 300 miles apart by the General Electric company. While an ordinary movie camera was taking shots of Mr. Edison another apparatus was sending his words, as electric impulses over a telephone wire to Schenectady, N. Y., where they were impressed on a film as lines of varying length. This record was later transferred to the celluloid strip bearing the picture.

Perfect synchronization was obtained by having the motors that controlled the two sets of apparatus operate at exactly the same speed. To translate this electrical stenographic record into words, and send across a beam of light is passed across the record of the voice. As the ray is broken by the lines it strikes a photo-electric cell which changes the minute fragments into sound by a radio receiver and loud speaker.
