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SEVENTH SESSION OF CONGRESS MOVES THROUGH SLOW DAY

Senate Grows Increasingly Talkative; House Sees Wood; Administration Policies in Nicaragua Get Into Debates.

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 (AP)—The new seventh congress showed incident, but unmistakable signs today of developing those attributes, which would mark it as the fulfillment of the dream of the congress that have gone immediately before it.

The senate grew increasingly talkative. The house saw Wood. The oil scandal and the administration's policy in Nicaragua and China got into the corridors, while the clockrooms overflowed with letters. Even a presidential reminder—this time a message outlining the president's view of flood control was lacking.

Senate Provides Show. If the house did the work, spending a trying monotonous day over the deficiency appropriation bill, it was the senate that provided the show. As the senatorial batteries thundered away without appreciable advance in the Vane election case, Pennsylvania crowded galleries looked on and long lines of those who could not get in stretched down the corridors.

Even the senators' private gallery was jammed, and there were many privileged visitors on the floor itself. A front balcony seat, Alice Longworth, the daughter of Roosevelt, watched the debate while her husband, the speaker of the house, occupied a floor seat next to Reed of Pennsylvania. Joseph Daniels, war secretary of the navy, exercised his prerogative as publisher of the Raleigh News and Observer, and sat in the press gallery. Just above the gallery rail on the democratic side was the Hon. William Danahy, Danahy's colleague for eight years in the cabinet and Vane's democratic opponent last year in the senatorial election in Pennsylvania.

Senate Argues All Day. With Senator-designate Vane himself in a floor seat over in a far corner, the senate argued all day long and a vote on the resolution to bar the Pennsylvania, as Smith of Illinois was barred yesterday, went over until tomorrow.

Both the senate and house interrupted their regular procedure momentarily to listen to the reading of the presidential flood message, recommending a relief program costing \$200,000,000 and the house also heard at 10:30 a. m. a message on subjects apart from the public building and other appropriations items which it had been immersed for hours.

Although it did not reach a final vote on the \$200,000,000 deficiency bill, the house did make progress that will be regarded in many quarters as appreciable. It approved the administration's public building program, great to the heart of many small and community, that will share in the proceeds.

Airplanes Search For Missing Men; No Trace Is Found

RIVERSIDE, Cal., Dec. 8 (AP)—Airliners today scoured the blackened and almost inaccessible Tahquitz valley area, 75 miles south of Reno, for the trace of eight or ten men who Tuesday became separated from a pack train and are believed to be without food.

The men left Palm Springs on the highway below the mountain section where a fire broke out in the hills for several days, with nearly 100 other men to fight the flames. They are believed to have reached the fire lines, but no trace of them has been seen since they became separated from the rest of the party. The fire was dimming today.

HOUSE APPROVES OF MAJOR PROVISIONS IN DEFICIENCY BILL

Battle Over Funds for Elevation of Guns of Battleships Is Postponed; Tax Questions May Be Next on Program.

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Dec. 8—Many of the major provisions of the deficiency bill were approved by the house tonight but the expected battle over funds for the elevation of guns on American battleships was postponed until tomorrow. This may put off until Saturday the start of debate on the tax bill which has right of way on the house program.

Among the items in the supply measure given house approval was that of \$7,000,000 to build the first year of the government's public building program. All recommendations of the appropriations committee for funds for new buildings in various cities were adopted without change.

New Terms Approved. In addition, all items for "navy yards and docks" were approved as was an appropriation of \$1,800,000 for new barracks for the marines at Quantico, Virginia, to be built in the summer of 1928. The appropriation for new army barracks at several posts, \$5,500,000 to carry out the purchase of Cape Cod canal, \$7,000,000 to reimburse government agencies for funds (Continued on Page Two)

ANTI-SALOON LEAGUERS TO RAISE \$10,000,000

S. S. Kresge, Detroit, Offers to Match First \$500,000 of Fund for Latest Campaign.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 (AP)—A \$10,000,000 fund will be sought by the Anti-Saloon League (ASL) during the next five years, the activities of the new department of publicity and education. Announcement that this would be attempted was made tonight by Dr. Ernest H. Cherrington, director of the ASL department, at the banquet concluding the league's convention. It immediately brought forth an offer from S. S. Kresge, Detroit, to match the bill, pocket the first half million dollars raised.

Declaring that he thought it "good business to put the booze business out of business," the head of the Kresge chain of 8 and 10 cent stores offered to aid in raising the fund. His announcement of a willingness to contribute \$500,000 brought those attending the banquet to their feet, cheering.

OFFICERS DISCOVER CLOTHES OF MISSING UTAMN NEAR BONES

Wearing Apparel Reveals Fact That War Ace Was Stabbed in Right Side Above Belt; End Terrible One on Desert.

(By The Associated Press) LAS VEGAS, Dec. 8—Several articles of clothing believed to have belonged to W. R. Howard, Salt Lake City, missing draftsman and world war aviator, were found today near where the bleached bones were discovered Tuesday, and disclosed the fact that Howard was stabbed in the right side just above the belt.

That his assailant tossed him over the rocks while still alive is the belief of District Attorney Harley Harmon, Clark county, Nevada, who also expressed the opinion that Howard lived for many hours after being abandoned to die in the desert.

The clothing consisted of a sweater coat and coat, both of which had a four-inch cut just above the belt, and a pair of trousers. It was expressed the belief that they were made with a long, sharp knife.

DIPLOMATIC RECEPTION IS HELD IN WASHINGTON

Most Colorful Event in White House Social Season Passes Into History for This Year.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 (AP)—The most colorful event of the White House social season—the annual diplomatic reception—was held tonight in the grand ballroom of the White House. The reception was presided over by the governor general of Canada and Viscountess Willingdon.

In addition to the whole diplomatic corps of Washington—the largest in the world—cabinet officers, ranking administration, army and navy officials and eminent social figures of the capital were invited. The reception provided the usual brilliant spectacle with all the foreign diplomats in their embroidered and gaudily decorated uniforms and the scarlet tunics of the United States marine band in the background.

Viscount and Viscountess Willingdon, who during their two days' visit in Washington have enjoyed sovereign status, had the opportunity during the reception of bidding good-bye to President and Mrs. Coolidge.

JUNGLE BEASTS LOSING THEIR FEROCITY RAPIDLY

CHICAGO, Dec. 8 (AP)—The beasts of the African jungle, terrified by the cruel and back-slaying guns, are losing their ferocity, believes Dr. Frank P. Thompson, just returned from a hunting expedition in Africa.

"There's no doubt about it," said Dr. Thompson, an oculist, "the ferocious killers are losing their nerve in fact. I saw wounded lions running from me, where a few years ago they would have charged. Herd of elephant cows turned tail and ran when they learned guns were near."

SOUTHWESTERN IDAHO SHEEPMEN SELL CLIP

Flock Masters Dispose of 175,000 Fleeces for \$500,000; Sale Is Largest in History.

BOISE, Dec. 8 (AP)—Prices said to be 10 per cent higher than the average at this time a year ago were paid today when southwest Idaho flock masters sold their 1928 clip of approximately 175,000 fleeces at a figure which will bring more than \$500,000. The growers said, was probably the largest clip sold in one year in Idaho and ranks among the largest single sales in the history of the western wool industry.

Charles J. Webb Sons company, Philadelphia, made the purchase, at a flat rate of 3 cents a pound, through J. Lloyd Jones, the company's Idaho representative.

The wool market, growers explained, has lived up 80 days before the usual time, due largely to the growing demand in the east. The wool market was reported to be showing a steady upward tendency.

The total pool sold today is expected to contain approximately 1,400,000 pounds. It offers made by Mr. Jones to other growers to complete the total sale for the 200,000 fleeces more for a total of better than 1,600,000 pounds.

DEATH STALKS ALONG PATH OF WINTER; 20 DEAD; MUCH MISERY

Temperature Ranging From Almost Zero to 53 Degrees Below Prevails in Many States of Northwest; Floods Threaten

(By The Associated Press) Riding out of Canada and the northwest, the cruel and back-slaying gale, winter yesterday overspread virtually the entire country, causing twenty deaths and ruining in heavy damage to shipping, disrupted transportation and communication facilities and much misery and suffering.

Temperatures ranging from near zero to 53 degrees below prevailed throughout the great states, and while this section attempted to fight out of huge snowdrifts brought by the blizzard and tumbling mercury, the cold wave peaked rapidly east of the Ohio river and south to the Gulf of Mexico, reaching cold fingers toward the New England states, and the west and California on the west.

Weather bureau forecasts indicated severe cold for another day or two. The coldest point in the United States yesterday was "Oubertson, in Northeastern Montana, which claimed 53 degrees below zero, while at Glasgow, in the same state it was 47 below and numerous points reported 15, 20 below zero.

Iowa, Wisconsin, Minnesota and South Dakota, and upper Michigan in addition to the states west of the snowstorm. In Minnesota and some places in other states schools were dismissed, while telegraph wires and poles were down and train service was hampered.

RED LIGHT BEACON
WINDS HIGH, FIER;
DENSE PENETRATE FOG

New Light is Developed in Laboratories of General Electric Company; is Big Aid to Aviation, Engineers Believe.

SCHNECKENBACH, N. Y., Dec. 8 (AP)—A new airplane beacon that points a moving finger of red light has been developed in the research laboratory of the General Electric company.

Operated by neon gas rendered incandescent in a quartz tube by a low voltage electric current, the 4,000-000 candle power lamp in some respects similar to the neon lights now used in advertising signs.

"Perhaps the chief value of the beacon will be its color," said G. O. Fulek, research engineer in charge of the laboratory in developing the new aid to aviation.

"The beam will offer a sharp contrast to the fog and will be a guide no fiercer than a star, thus to a red light, now the sign of danger to other transportation agencies, may become the symbol of safety to the aviator."

"Until we have finished our tests we can make no predictions as to the range of the lamp. We do know, however, that a beam of half its power can be seen 75 miles of a fair night."

Seeking to eliminate high voltage in a lamp of this type, Mr. Fulek and his associates discovered that the hot cathode in a vacuum tube supplied sufficient electron emission to illuminate the gas.

The quartz, fashioned into a thin spiral for the sake of greater concentration of light on the reflector, was heated to 24-inch revolving searchlight. When tilted at an angle of five degrees the powerful beam would sweep 100 feet per mile it penetrates beyond the lens.

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FIND SKULL OF MAN WHO MAY HAVE LIVED BEFORE SPEECH DEVELOPED

SANTA BARBARA, CALIF., Dec. 7 (AP)—Scientists here, working with an upper jaw sharply pointed, are expected to scientists the possibility that it may have belonged to a primitive man who lived before speech was developed.

Dr. A. H. Osadal, Santa Barbara anthropologist, who examined the relic, is expected to announce the results by several diggers, expressed the opinion that it antedated the Neanderthal man, and that the jawbone "it comes more near to connecting with the ape than anything ever before uncovered."

The skull was found "buried in hardpan where, says Dr. Osadal, it could have lain for aeons of time. There is a three-cornered wound in the skull made by a flint, it should say, either from a war club or arrow," explains the anthropologist.

"The skull is certainly of a man who lived further back in the period of history than anything we have recovered. Just how far back it goes, however, is not known. The man to whom I have submitted it will venture a prediction now they say they believe the owner of the skull could speak. I do not know how the man could have done more than grunt."

The skull was found in the excavations made by the Smithsonian Institution in Santa Barbara when a Cretaceous skull was extracted that was declared to be the most primitive that has ever been found.

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Dr. Osadal has made a close comparison between the skull just found and the one he has christened "The Santa Barbara skull," and those of prehistoric man found in the same region. He said that there is a big difference, the one now in his possession is, he believes, of a much earlier period. To check up on the so-called Gibraltar skull, he said, he will try to get it to the Smithsonian Institution.

The Santa Barbara skull shows the man had a very long and wide nose, eyesockets much larger than modern man's, a pointed upper jawbone that extended farther downward and at a more acute angle than anything so far discovered in the form of human remains.

"I am inclined to believe," said Dr. Osadal, "that the shape of the mandible was much like that of the gorilla."

"The skull about the base on the sides and back shows ridges to which the jawbone was attached and that do not show in ordinary skulls or even in those very old, proving that the jawbone was not attached to the torso, as was extremely strong, as in animals."

"Another feature is the narrowness of the upper jawbone where it runs down to a point to hold the front teeth, the resemblance to the mandible of the gorilla. Apparently there were only about five teeth across the front."

ADVISORY SHIPPERS PROGRAM TO COVER HOST OF PROBLEMS

Representatives of Central Western Board Will Discuss Waste Elimination, Storage and Economic Conditions.

Outline of the principal matters which will be discussed at the fourth regular meeting of the Central Western Shippers' Advisory board to be held here next Wednesday and Thursday, was given last evening by W. L. Harvey of Denver, executive representative of the board. Harvey stated that subjects will not be handled in a dry way, but will be told in a colorful manner.

Waste Elimination
Under the heading "Elimination of Transportation Waste" will be discussed the effect of such methods as heavier loading of equipments; distribution of equipment; and the increase of railroad efficiency by means of increase of miles per car per day, increase in the average turn-around of active car units, and decrease of demurrage assessments and packing charges. Proper marking and grading of freight, peddling of railroad cars and adequacy of present storage facilities will be presented in turn. Under the storage of facilities head the question of storage at point of origin, in point of distribution and the relationship of this problem to farm credits will be handled.

Commodity Committee Reports
The reports of the commodity committees will forecast car requirements for the first quarter of 1928; will compare economic conditions of each industry with the same quarter last year; outline complaints and offer criticisms and suggestions for betterment of railroad service. Reports by individual lines will be the final major subject dealt with. Nearly 400 persons, including bankers, farmers, manufacturers, wholesalers, retailers and jobbers will attend. There will be a good representation of railroad officials present.

CROPS MADE POSSIBLE BY NATURE'S PLAN OF HOPPER PEST CONTROL

Elaborate Process So Intricate That Nature Alone Can Guide It to Perfection—Is Credited for Survival of Agriculture.

(By the Associated Press)
 WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 (AP)—An elaborate process so intricate that nature alone can guide it to perfection, is credited for the survival of American agriculture.

The tremendous scheme, revealed by Dr. N. A. Cobb, federal chief nematology, has revealed the subtle function of the nematode subgrasses, commonly called the hairworm. Years of study and investigation have convinced Dr. Cobb and his associates, whose work has been assisted by approximately 150 of the nation's foremost nematologists, that grasshoppers, in limitless herds and a thousand species, would devour practically every farm crop but for hairworm parasitism.

An avicious enemy, the nema enters the grasshopper's body when it swarms eggs of the hairworm, matures there, and bore its way out. The grasshopper dies from the wound. Nature has perfectly correlated every detail. The nematode's success is as ruthless and deliberate as premeditated murder. Instinct forces the grasshopper to feed several inches from the ground on the exposed surface of plant leaves. To make sure the victim is trapped, the female hairworm is so constituted that the cannot lay eggs in a shadow.

Emerging from the ground in the spring, she ascends to a position well lighted by the sun, irrevocably the spot on which grasshoppers feed. An overdose of eggs would cause premature death for the grasshopper. It must live until the nematode has reached an adult stage, and nature makes it her business to see that it does. Twenty eggs may be laid in one place, but each egg is equipped with polar filaments that become entangled with the "fur" of young leaf hairs. As the leaf grows and the hairs spread apart, the eggs become sufficiently scattered to keep the grasshopper from getting more than two or three eggs during the entire feeding season.

The contents of a grasshopper's alimentary canal are eliminated approximately once every hour. In that time the hairworm larvae must work from the egg into cavities of the victim's body, there to thrive on the food that has digested. Again, nature is lavished. The equatorial region of a sublethal soluble in less than an hour.

An even more astounding circumstance, leading scientists to believe environment may be responsible for determination of sex, enters nature's colorful scheme. Female hairworms, growing from half an inch to six inches in length in six weeks, are many times larger than male nemas. Whether it is because of limited room to develop in the grasshopper's body because of insufficient food supply, the hairworms, regardless of the sex propensity in the larvae, always become male when a large number of eggs are swallowed and as invariably are females when the number is limited.

In every case, Dr. Cobb says, a parasitized grasshopper immediately becomes sterile. Tests have shown that fields attacked by nematized grasshoppers are free of the pest in following years or until unfinished grasshoppers from adjacent territory invade them. That, he says, explains "grasshopper waves" in this country.

MORE CORN IN YEAR OF 1927 THAN DURING 1926

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 (AP)—Although corn yield in the Balkan states is regarded as distinctly disappointing, the department of agriculture has reports from five European countries that production will be slightly higher than anticipated.

The American corn crop now is estimated at 2,763,249,000 bushels, which is four per cent above the 1926 yield. Fourteen countries, representing about 80 per cent of the total Northern Hemisphere corn production, show a prospective crop of 3,211,256,000 bushels.

URGENT STABILIZED PRICES
 LONDON, Dec. 8 (AP)—Robert Boothby, unionist member of Parliament from East Aberdeenshire, believes price stabilization is the only remedy for the disastrous condition of agriculture in Great Britain.

He suggests that stabilization might be effected through an imperial wheat pool and urges the immediate formation of an economic general staff to advise the government on economic problems which ought not be made the subject of political controversy.

CORN BORER NOW IN 55 NEW COUNTIES OF NATION

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 (AP)—Despite the flight waged against him in his first domain, the European corn borer has drawn the spread in virgin fields. His advance sweeps wide in a ragged arc, like the sweep of a monster fan. Federal scouts have found the pest in 55 new counties, pushing the battle front still further south, west and north. Ohio suffers most, but Michigan, Indiana, and Pennsylvania feel the new attack. Berrien county, Michigan, is the borer's western outpost, and close behind it borers have been found in Marshall and St. Joseph counties, Indiana. Northward the borer has advanced to Chetopa county, Michigan, and southward in Ohio as far as Pickaway county.

Several hundred thousand dollars of the Government's \$10,000,000 "clean-up" fund is left to fight the borer. Much of it will be used to compensate farmers, at not more than \$2 an acre, for cleaning up 16,000 acres of river bottom land in the old infested area. Authorities force a compulsory clean-up of 20 per cent of the more heavily infested parts of last spring's campaign area, after farmers have accomplished whatever they can by voluntary control.

Secretary of Agriculture Jardine has expressed the opinion that after July 1, 1928, infested states will take full responsibility for necessary regulatory measures while the Federal Government conducts scouting and quarantining activities to prevent long distance spread of the insect.

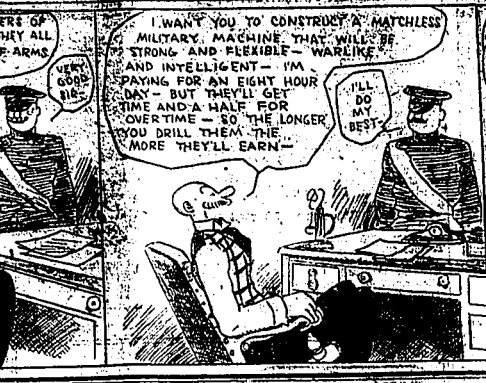

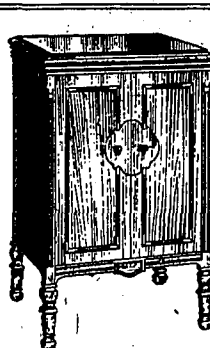
