

# HOUSE APPROVES TAX BILL; \$289,170,000 TO BE CUT FROM INCOME

### Democratic-Republican Coalition Holds Whip Hand; Three Major Amendments Pass; 366 to 24 Vote; Radical Changes.

(By The Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—With a democratic-republican coalition holding the whip hand, the House today passed the tax bill with three major amendments which were vigorously opposed by republican party leaders.

On a final showdown, however, only 28 republicans were willing to go on the record against the measure after exhausting every parliamentary means to eliminate the three contested amendments among them.

### Strike at Three Amendments

The three amendments which republican leaders sought to keep out of the bill at the last minute had been adopted earlier in the week under rules which prevented roll calls.

MAJOR BALL LEAGUES AT ODDS WITH MINORS

Drastring Step Is Taken by Big Circuit Owners; Dissatisfaction Over Drafting System.

NEW YORK, Dec. 15 (AP)—If the minor leagues of the country desire to cut off relations completely with the majors and indulge as a result, in a free-for-all scrap or player scramble, they are perfectly free to do so.

Respectfully to the initiative taken by the minors, who are dissatisfied with the draft system, the majors announced that the major-minor agreement may terminate on January 14, 1928, when the seven-year period of its operation expires if the minors desire its cancellation.

Agree to Truce Despite this war-like gesture, it appears likely to be a bloodless affair. The majors, at the same time, have agreed to a truce until February 1, when the minors will signify whether or not they desire to break the relations, negotiate a new agreement, or continue under the present system.

Meanwhile, on a status quo basis, business will be as usual between the upper and lower strata of the game conducted under the terms of the existing compact.

The action of the majors was disclosed after a six-hour joint session, presided over by Commissioner Landis and lasting the three-day ball parley here to an official close.

It was the climax of a protracted series of conferences and talks for a winter to be over in the relations between the principal baseball groups.

The text of the major league resolution adopted is as follows: Resolved, that the major leagues in response to the inquiry of the National Association of minor leagues inform the National Association that the major leagues are willing to have the major-minor agreement terminate on January 14, 1928, if the National Association so desires.

Piece of Strategy By this piece of strategy the majors unexpectedly conceded the point over which the minors had anticipated considerable argument—the life of the major-minor agreement. The minor league committee, composed of John H. Farrell, Heraldo, and William O. Brammigan, came to the meeting with conflicting possibilities.

One concerned a clause making the agreement effective as long as Commissioner Landis was in office. Another interpretation was that the agreement should be cancelled with the conclusion of his first seven-year term.

# LARGEST STILL EVER TAKEN IS SEIZED AT DEEP CREEK CANYON

Officers entered the cabin upon their arrival and found one of the E. Barius brothers in bed. Placing him under arrest they hurried to the still house in the clump of trees where they found Barius and the other Ellis brother operating the still, according to the officers' report.

**Building Well Expended.**  
The still was one of the best equipped in the largest ever taken in this county, officers stated yesterday. It was installed in a well built still house which was constructed in a side hill in its excavation being four feet deep and had been built. Above this rock walls had been built and the roof timbered over and the interior covered over with earth. Inside were nine vats having a capacity of 1690 gallons, officers stated. They estimated that about 1600 gallons of mash were contained in the vats.

Steam heat was employed to cook the mash. Water was pumped into the house from a spring higher on the hillside. The still was entirely of copper and had a capacity of 10 gallons per hour. The two men were seen operating the still at the time of the only a short while and had completed the manufacture of about 10 gallons of liquor which the raiding party discovered in two five-gallon kegs.

**Deputy Sheriff Jones and his son Paul brought the trio to the county jail about 2:30 o'clock Thursday morning.** Deputies Dotson and Prater remained behind to guard the still. After delivering his prisoners to the jail, Deputy Jones returned to the scene of the raid and aided his fellow officers to destroy the equipment. They brought in the two five-gallon kegs of liquor as evidence.

The three men taken in the raid stated that they had been operating the outfit but a short while. They told officers that they had been postponed a few hours they would have had about \$100 worth of liquor on hand. The trio was being employed on the potato harvest in this vicinity until the recent cold weather. At the close of the potato season they went to Deep Creek canyon and constructed the still house and had just completed its equipment and started operations when the officers raided them.

No charge has yet been placed against them. It was intimated that the men might be turned over to federal officials for prosecution.

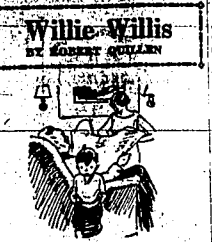
# SCHOOL SOCIETIES JOIN IN CHARITY MOVEMENT

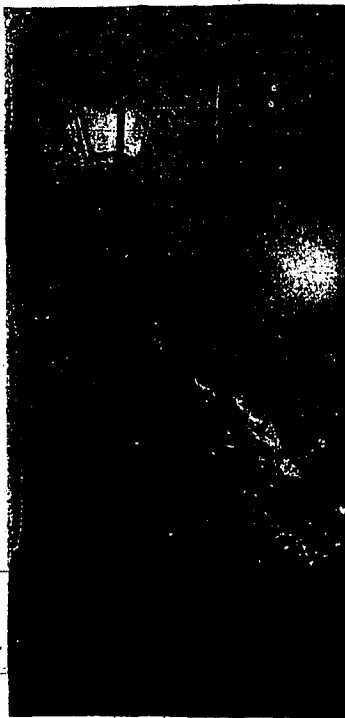

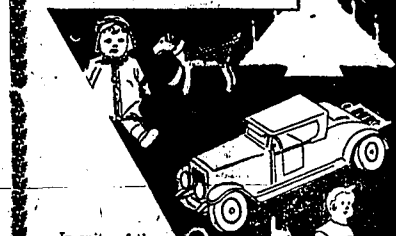
