# MEXICAN PRESIDENT ESCORTS LINDBERGH TO SCHOOL FUNCTION

## American's Bashful Beau Has Firm Grip on Heart of Old Southern Republic After 72-Hour Visit; Airman Honored.

(By The Associated Press)  
MEXICO CITY, Dec. 17.—America's bashful beau today had a firm grip on the heart of Mexico after 72 hours in the southern republic.  
President Calles personally drove to the American embassy to escort Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh and Ambassador Dwight W. Morrow to a school children's fête attended by nearly 50,000 persons, in order to show special honor to the American flyer.  
The children of the Lindberghs were called back from their holidays participated in the fête at the Mexico City stadium. The day was proclaimed a holiday, the second so proclaimed officially since Lindbergh's arrival.

### Towns Send Telegrams

Between 400 and 500 Mexican cities and towns have sent telegrams to the popular idol asking him to visit them. It is doubtful, however, if Lindbergh will go elsewhere than the capital while he is in Mexico, although at last thereby learning his location when lost near Mexico City, is especially appreciated.

There is some discussion as to whether the Christmas dinner, Ambassador Morrow is planning to be a private affair or a large informal public function.  
"My mother probably will fly from Detroit to Mexico City with some stop en route," the aerial ambassador said today. Mrs. Lindbergh will be a guest of the embassy and it is understood here she plans to leave Detroit Monday.

The swelling wave of popularity will reach a great tomorrow, with a parade of 50,000 or more, probably 150,000, workers in honor of the flyer and with his attendance at a "charro" or lassoing and riding exhibition, and with his possible attendance at a bull fight.

### Capital Curious Over Action

The bull fight is not on the flyer's official program but he has received an invitation from the management of the bull ring. The capital is displaying intense curiosity as to whether the flyer will attend the fight, which some 60 protests from individuals and human organizations in the United States and of the flyer's absence might be construed as an affront to the Mexican people, in that it would be considered by many an expression of disapproval of the Mexican national sport.

# ONE WEEK REMAINS FOR BONUS CLAIMS

## Manager of Veterans' Bureau Calls Attention to Need for Prompt Action.

BOISE, Dec. 17.—Just one week remains for world war veterans to file their claims for "adjusted compensation," declares C. H. Eustelson, regional manager of the United States veterans' bureau office for Idaho.

January 1, 1928, is the last day on which a claim may be filed, the manager says. Veterans are cautioned by the manager against confusing "adjusted compensation" with compensation paid by the veterans' bureau for disabilities incurred in the service. "Adjusted compensation," says the manager, "is better known as the bonus." Every man or woman honorably discharged from the army, navy, marine corps or their branches from world war service, is entitled to this additional pay and the United States veterans' bureau is making an intensive campaign to see that everyone gets his compensation. It is computed on the basis of the number of days the man or woman was in the service and is paid in the form of an endowment insurance certificate which matures in 20 years. After two years it has a loan value which increases from year to year until at the end of 20 years it is worth 100 cents on the dollar.

"So, Mr. Veteran, check up on your claim. Make sure that you have filed your claim so that you have your certificate. Application forms may be secured upon request from the United States veterans' bureau regional office, Boise, Idaho, or any American Legion post or Red Cross secretary throughout the state. Fill out the application and be sure it is postmarked not later than January 1, 1928."

# REMIUS MURDER CASE MOVES ON TO CLOSE

## Final Pleas to Jury Start; Charles P. Taft, II, Faces 10 Men, Two Women of Panel.

CINCINNATI, Dec. 17.—Final pleas to the jury in George Remus' murder case were begun today.  
Charles P. Taft, II, Hamilton county prosecutor, faced the two women and 10 men of the jury who for five weeks have heard the evidence in the trial of the former Chicago lawyer who became the "king of bootleggers" and finally killed his estranged wife, Florence, here last October 4.  
Taft had only an hour in which to open for the state because he had to divide the two hours left of the session with the defense. The two hours of argument to be completed next Monday, to be followed by Judge Chester B. Shook's charge to the jury and delivery of Remus' fate into their hands.

Fifteen soviet officials, including Consul General Plitchev, were deported from Canton and Hankow, the nationalists in Shanghai have contained themselves with more moderate methods, merely requiring the registration of all Russians with the declaration whether they are "red" or "white." This course of action is being followed despite the fact that it has been reported that had the communist coup at Canton proved successful, it would have been followed by a similar coup in Shanghai.

### Consul Ready to Leave

Soviet Consul Kovlovsky with his staff is ready to depart whenever he is required by the banking nationalists who have severed relations with soviet officials in Shanghai that refuse to take refuge in the French concession, but the French consular authorities have instructed the French post to notify all Russians employed by soviet concerns that they must leave the concession under a time limit which will be decided by the police. Meanwhile the French police are picketing the homes of the Russians.

The soviet government has replied promptly to the recent Nanking note regarding relations. Mr. Kovlovsky, this afternoon handling Que Tai Chi, the Nanking foreign consul, the Russian reply drawn by Foreign Commissioner Tchetcherkin.

# COLLISION ON OCEAN CAUSES EXCITEMENT IN NATION'S CAPITAL

the submarine at the time of the accident and that others not listed might have boarded the craft after the explosion, after a recent report.

As in the case of the S-31, which sank after a collision off Block Island on September 19, there was much speculation as to how long the man imprisoned in the submarine, provided they were still alive, might be able to ward off death.  
The crew of the S-31 which had been on the surface was given about 40 hours, but it was not known how long the S-4 had been running submerged, or how low was the supply of oxygen when it was rammed by the coast guard destroyer Friday.

### Men May Live Five Days

Admiral Hughes, chief of naval operations, who remained on the job right to the end of the rescue operations, was of the opinion that the trapped crew could live from one to two weeks. He was hopeful that the craft was not lying in more than 150 feet of water, and that her 21-foot hull could be hoisted on end if necessary, and punctured, the men leaving from the top sticking out of the water.

Although assured that every effort was being made to rescue the men in the S-4, Admiral Hughes had no objection to personally directed rescue operations. After four hours' search in the vicinity of the disaster, word came from the navy search party that no survivors had been picked up.

### Admiral Hughes was in constant communication with nearby naval bases. Word from Boston that the "oil slick" had been discovered where the collision occurred, convinced naval officers here the submarine had gone down.

Hughes ordered the Boston navy yard to send high divers to the scene, directing that they descend to the sunken vessel and tap the sides in the hope of receiving signals from the men inside.  
The submarine tender, which under Rear Admiral Brumby, was in charge of rescue operations after the S-31 sank, was directed to make all speed for Provincetown and her commanding officer, Captain Brumby, was told to assume command. The Bushnell, also a tender, and the Falcon and Chewink, auxiliary vessels, were ordered to accompany the Camden. The Falcon and Chewink, both took part in the attempts to raise the S-31.

where they attended the Idaho state seed show. ACTION AWAIT GOVERNOR BOISE, Dec. 17 (AP)—What action will be taken by Governor H. C. Baldrige and John S. Welch, commissioner of agriculture, on the anti-shipment of Idaho potato growers for a special session of the legislature to consider more stringent potato marketing and branding regulations, awaited the return of the governor and commissioner, who are expected here tomorrow morning. Governor Baldrige and Commissioner Welch are now en route to Boise after attending the Idaho seed show at Malad.

M. L. Dean, director of plant industry, said he would meet with Commissioner Welch tomorrow on the general potato situation. Victor Shave, secretary to Governor Baldrige, was unable to reach the governor to advise him of the request from Idaho Falls. Mr. Shave said the matter would be taken up with the chief executive upon his return. Potato shippers of this section declared themselves in accord with the movement for special legislation to make statutory present departmental regulations. The opinion was expressed that enforcement of branding and trading regulations would be more effective if made statutory, instead of in the form of departmental regulations. Growers of this section attribute the present depressed potato market to an over-supply and large shipment of ungraded, field run potatoes in unbranded sacks.

\$60,000 for use of the Illinois senatorial campaign in 1928. Total of Contributions Upon their first appearances before the committee in Chicago and prior to Washington, D. C., Schuyler told of their contributions to Smith's primary campaign fund and also to donations of other sums in that connection on behalf of George Brennan, defeated democratic candidate for senator, and for propaganda against the world court.

They refused, however, to go into other contributions on the ground that they did not relate to the senatorial contest. Subsequently the United States supreme court in the McQuinn party case upheld the right of senate committees to conduct inquiries on the ground that it was to be presumed that they sought the information in the interest of prospective legislation. Recently Inaull and Schuyler asked that they be permitted to re-appear before the committee, which had decided to report their cases to the senate for such action as it might deem appropriate.

Discuss Vore Issue Besides discussing cases, the committee today took up that of William S. Vore, Pennsylvania, who also was denied the oath of office as a senator last week because of expenditures in his primary campaign, but no date for beginning that hearing was fixed. # VAN EATON ENTERS NOT GUILTY PLEA TO FELONY CHARGE

Man Who Shot William H. Jenkins Denies Intent to Commit Murder; Appeals to Habeas Corpus.

Walter (Buck) Van Eaton entered a plea of not guilty last evening before Probate Judge O. A. Batley to the charge of assault with a deadly weapon with intent to murder on the person of William H. Jenkins last November 24. He was bound over under \$2500 bond, which he had not furnished last night. He will have a hearing December 28 at 10 o'clock a. m.

**Habeas Corpus Issues**  
Van Eaton, who has been in jail since the shooting took place at the John W. Tebben home on Thanksgiving night, was brought before Judge H. F. Ensign Saturday afternoon on writ of habeas corpus issued on motion of his attorney, E. V. Larson. After his removal from the jail and before his presentation in court, he was placed in the county on a warrant, alleging assault with intent to commit murder. Mr. Larson contended that after formal arrest he should have been brought immediately before the magistrate issuing the warrant and that, since this was not done, he should be released. O. W. Witham, prosecuting attorney, said that the complaint had been filed less than half an hour before and the state was ready for the arraignment at once. He said Van Eaton was not put in jail after the arrest on the warrant. He declared Van Eaton had not been arrested previously because the state wanted to be sure that Jenkins would not die. Judge Ensign said that since the prisoner was under arrest on a warrant, if the state proceeded at once to bring him before the magistrate it was acting within the meaning of the law. Mr. Larson said that was all he wanted, so the prisoner was arraigned.

**Jenkins Is Recovering**  
Jenkins, who was shot in the groin and left leg, was brought to his home at 313 Fourth avenue west Sunday afternoon in an ambulance from the county hospital. He is said to be recovering steadily. Mrs. Tebben, who was shot in the right leg on the same occasion, is said to be almost well. Van Eaton, whom it is alleged, shot himself in the head, striking a scalp wound, has recovered.
