DIVERS START WORK OF BRINGING DEATH VESSEL TO SURFACE

Submarine S-4 Lost and Found by Navy; Good Weather Prevails; Six Men Either Unconscious or Dead; Signals Stop.

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—The admiral's message said divers Wilson and Eiben had made allowance for an increase in the listening device valve leading to the torpedo room and that in his opinion there is no reasonable doubt that air began going into the torpedo room about 10 o'clock.

The admiral expressed no opinion whether the six men were alive or dead, but naval officers found in his dispatch basis for the ship's diving air had not arrived too late.

PROVINCETOWN, Mass., Dec. 21.—The submarine G-4, rammed and sunk on Saturday by a coast guard destroyer off Provincetown, was lost on Friday by the U. S. fleet.

On the first day of good weather after a northwest gale had interrupted salvage operations since Sunday, the salvage fleet discovered that a line leading from the S-4 to a marking buoy had broken loose and that the vessel was lost.

OKLAHOMA GOVERNOR HAS COURT BACKING

National Guardsmen Withdrawn From Capitol; Injunctions Impede Statesmen's Advance

OKLAHOMA CITY, Dec. 21.—(AP)—The new court order tonight left assistance to the efforts of Governor H. H. Johnston to bring a majority of the legislature belonging his administration back to their homes for the winter.

Apparently convinced that the self-called impeachment session will make no efforts in the immediate future to meet at the state capitol building, the barret tonight had withdrawn the last of three units of national guardsmen and sent out 10 days ago to prevent the house of representatives from meeting in the chamber and routing impeachment charges.

Auto in 1928 Will Take 28,000 Lives; 700,000 to Get Hurt

NEW YORK, Dec. 21.—(AP)—Twenty-three thousand persons will be killed and 700,000 injured in automobile accidents in this country next year unless the accident rate shows an unexpected improvement, the Travelers Insurance company predicted today.

The estimate based on statistics of the past two years, makes allowance for an increase in the accident rate experienced each year since completion of statistics for 1925. Complete records for 1927 were not available.

Records of 1926 and 1927 showed that some one is either killed or injured in automobile accidents in this country every 14 seconds.

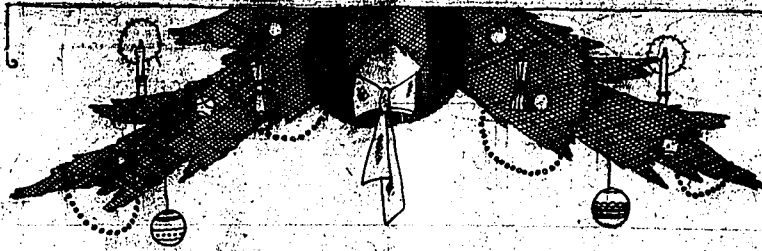
