200 MEN SEARCH IN MOUNTAIN PASSING BURLEY TAXI DRIVER

Disappearance of Man Named Hawkins, Also Reported to Police; Resembles Passenger in Case; Auto Was Disabled.

(Special to The News) BURLEY, Dec. 29.—Two hundred men made a thorough search today of approximately 200 square miles of territory between Burley and Boise, without discovering a trace of Jack Terry, Burley taxicab operator, and his unknown passenger who were missing since 5 o'clock last Tuesday evening.

Newcomer Disappears Disappearance of a man named Hawkins, a newcomer to Burley, since Tuesday evening was reported to police here today by his wife. Hawkins is said to resemble the person who was seen in the taxicab on the trip to Kimberly Tuesday evening from which he has not returned. Mrs. Hawkins said the taxicab had been unable to find a photograph of her husband which officers thought might help in the search for the missing man.

Terry's abandoned automobile, which was found Wednesday forenoon on a side road near Burley, is being searched north and west of here, was not in running order when it was abandoned. It was learned today that the taxicab had been towed, might have been caused by running at high speed.

Fool Play Theory Held Belief that Terry had met with foul play strengthened today as the search continued without result. It was recalled that Terry a few days before had refused to carry moonshine which the passenger of the taxicab had been carrying. Terry said he had been away on trips as "intervals" while away on trips.

Search today extended along Snake river from Burley to Hansen and paralleled the Old Oregon Trail through the mountains of Twin Falls and Burley to a line five miles south of the highway.

Harry F. Sinclair's Lease on Wyoming Reserve Cancelled; Order Signed at Request of Highest Tribunal.

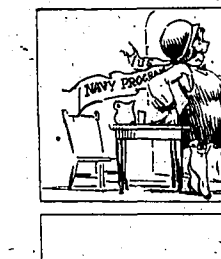

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### AIRPLANES AND TANKS PLAYING RELIEF ROLE IN ENGLAND'S STORM

### Bread and Butter Dropped Out of Sky to Snow-Imprisoned Residents; Floods Adding to Distress; Many Suffering.

(By The Associated Press)  
LONDON, Dec. 29.—Airplanes and armored tanks are playing relief roles in England's great storm—the fiercest blizzard in some parts of England since the days of the years.

Bread and butter were dropped from the sky into Western and Southern England, where thousands of inhabitants are snow-imprisoned. Two airplanes from an airbase near London carried supplies to the snow-bound town. The food was placed in bags and dropped with parachutes.

Villages Isolated  
Tanks from two army stations in Hampshire were employed to crush a pathway through the roads piled high with snow. For four days three villages—Llanvethrone, Llanvethrone and Llanvethrone, lying near the foot of the Black mountain, Monmouthshire, were isolated unless a few cows, soon it is feared the villagers and cattle will suffer severe privation.

Floods are adding to the distress. They are widespread in the case of the river in Huntingdonshire, while the Thames floods from Old Windsor to Watlington show little signs of subsiding.

Break tales of suffering in all the snow-buried counties of southern England and Wales were told in London tonight, while weather experts are not yet able to foresee immediate relief from cold, which has gripped Britain and parts of the continent.

On the sea, too, violent easterly gales have prevailed, causing distress to shipping in varying degrees for all ways. Many rural villages are still cut off from supplies by snow drifts reported to be from 10 to 14 feet high.

Meeting the emergency caused by suspension of the mail train Lord Templemore was for two days carried the mails from Winchester to Alresford, Hampshire, over a route of seven miles, and the post has volunteered to do this work until regular service is resumed.

An aged farm laborer of Somersetshire, missing in the blizzard, was found dead, frozen in the mud and snow.

The Imperial air ways service to Paris was resumed today after a two-day suspension. The southern Atlantic way has resumed its Folkestone-Boulogne service, but the Dover-Calais service is still suspended, for the fourth day because of heavy sea in the channel.

London, though it experienced an unusual snow fall, suffered least of all southern England.

The inhabitants of many parts of Europe are also suffering from the long-extended cold and heavy snow. So severe is the winter in Transylvania that wolves have been attacking the people.

While critics went out to get Hunt, a complete confession involving the Thoms murder, was taken from Hickman. When Hunt was confronted with Hickman's account of the crime, he too, according to officers at the jail, confessed his participation in the holdup and the exchange of bullets which resulted in the death of the druggist and the wounding of Hunt and a police officer.

Hickman appeared in two courts today in company with his lawyer, Jerome Walsh, Kansas City, who traveled from his home in the county to represent the youth's mother to represent her son.

Just as he was taken into the court of Municipal Judge Myron Westover where a complaint charging kidnaping, issued earlier in the search for the abducted school boy, was dismissed to make way for action on the indictment.

From there Hickman, pale as a ghost, was led into the court room of Superior Judge Carlos Hardy, before whom he appeared on a misdemeanor charge six months ago, to hear the murder and kidnaping indictment read to him for formal arraignment.

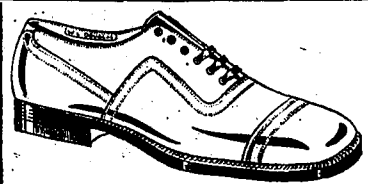

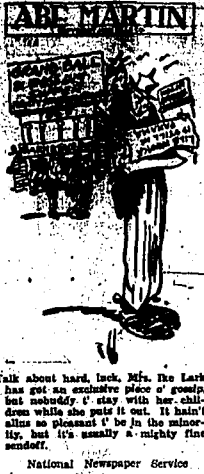

### MINISTERS PROTEST AGAINST LICENSING HISLOP DANCE HALL

Protests Are Filed Asking That Renewal Be Denied; Signers Mostly Members of Evangelical Churches of City.

Members of Twin Falls Ministerial association, leading a campaign for suppression of the dance pavilion at the T. George Hislop and Son orchard, eight miles southeast of Twin Falls, presented to the county commissioners in special session here yesterday afternoon, petitions signed by 232 persons. The petitioners stated they believe the dance hall to be a menace to the morals of our young people and an occasion for unlawful drinking. They requested revocation of license for the pavilion and protested against issuance of any such license.

The petition was submitted to the commissioners by Rev. Arthur O. Pearson of the Presbyterian church, Rev. H. C. Humphrey of the Methodist church, Rev. C. O. Curtis of the Christian church, and Rev. E. C. Barton of the Baptist church. The petition was taken under advisement.

**Signed Same Time**  
The petition is signed by 232 persons of whom 17 give the number of street address or rural delivery route. The petitioners bear evidence of having been signed some time ago, as those whose names are attached have been away from Twin Falls for several weeks. All signers appear to be connected with the churches named, and the petitions are said to have been circulated at churches.

**Text of Petition follows:**  
"We, the undersigned citizens of Twin Falls county, being legal voters, hereby respectfully petition your honorable body to revoke any license or permit which may be held by T. George Hislop and Son, to conduct a dance hall at his place in Twin Falls heights addition, or refuse the granting of any permit or license requested, on the grounds that we believe the dance hall to be a menace to the morals of our young people, and an occasion of unlawful drinking. The disorderly conduct of patrons of this dance hall returning from dances late at night, has become a nuisance to the people of the neighborhood."

**Hislops Are Away**  
Mr. and Mrs. T. George Hislop, accompanied by their son Tom and his wife, have been in California for about a month, and expect to remain until about March 1. The dance hall is managed at the present time by George Howe, orchestra leader.

The dance hall has been running since the spring of 1926. Last August a petition for renewal of license was filed and \$10 was deposited with the sheriff's office. At the same time a \$200 bond of the Aetna Casualty company was placed on record, giving a guarantee that the business would be conducted in a quiet and orderly manner and that the laws of Idaho would be observed. The protesting petition does not deny that this condition has been complied with.

**Withdraws Petition**  
On consulting legal authority, owners of the pavilion learned, it is stated, that modification of the statute rendering issuance of a renewal of license unnecessary, and there-

### HEAVY MAIL DURING PERIOD OF HOLIDAYS

Postoffice Gives Complete Figures of Pieces Sent Out Exclusive of Parcels Post.

The Twin Falls postoffice yesterday gave out this statement relative to the number of pieces, exclusive of parcel post sent out in the pre-Christmas period:  
From December 15 to December 24, inclusive, 126,300 pieces of mail went through the canceling machine. During the same given period last year 108,000 pieces were canceled, making an increase of 18,300 pieces that went through the canceling machine this year.

The peak this year was reached on December 22 on which date 24,400 pieces went through the canceler and the next highest amount for a day was twenty-third on which date 20,900 pieces were canceled.  
None of the above figures include parcel post packages—no accurate figures being kept on parcel post matter.
