SEARCH FOR BURLEY TAXICAB DRIVER AND PASSENGER IS FUTILE

Flagging Hopes and Disappointment of Explanatory Theories Mark Hunt for Missing Man; Man's Brother Here.

## SHORTAGE OF ELIGIBLES FOR PROHIBITION POSTS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 30—The civil service commission has re-announced the examination for assistant prohibition administrator for enforcement work, assistant prohibition administrator for persuasive work, and deputy prohibition administrator. ## LOS ANGELES POLICE INVESTIGATE MURDER

### Hunt for Dead Woman's Jewelry is on; Physician Under Arrest for Crime; was Agent.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 30 (AP)—Search for \$80,000 worth of jewelry, believed to be the property of Mrs. Amelia Appley, whose body was found bound in a sack near San Fernando last Monday, was started by police here today after identification of the dead woman as the widow of F. Appley, wealthy Chicago inventor who died several years ago. Dr. Charles M. McMillan, 57-year-old physician, who was arrested last night and charged with the murder, was taken today to a San Fernando morgue where the body had lain unidentified until yesterday. The body was found dressed up in canvas and there were indications, police say, that the woman might have been beaten.

Deputy sheriffs investigated recent real estate transactions of Dr. McMillan, who had been indicted as Mrs. Appley's agent. Mrs. Appley was the owner of valuable property in Chicago. He said that questioning of North Hobart residents brought the information that shortly before Christmas day, sounds of a violent quarrel had been heard at the Appley home. When Mrs. Appley's body was found, officers said the woman had been dead about 24 hours. Dr. McMillan, who was arrested while going through papers relating to Mrs. Appley's personal affairs, denied the papers in Mrs. Appley's manner of her death. He said he last saw her alive December 21.

Asked the papers in Mrs. Appley's home was a pencilled will drawn in favor of the physician. Police said it was in his handwriting and was written on stationery of the Duluth Hotel, Duluth, Minnesota, and was signed with the names of Amelia Appley, McMillan, Mollie Burke and Amelia Eilenburg. A piece of canvas which deputy sheriffs declared was similar to that which was used to wrap the body of Mrs. Appley, was found by investigators in the garage at the Appley home.

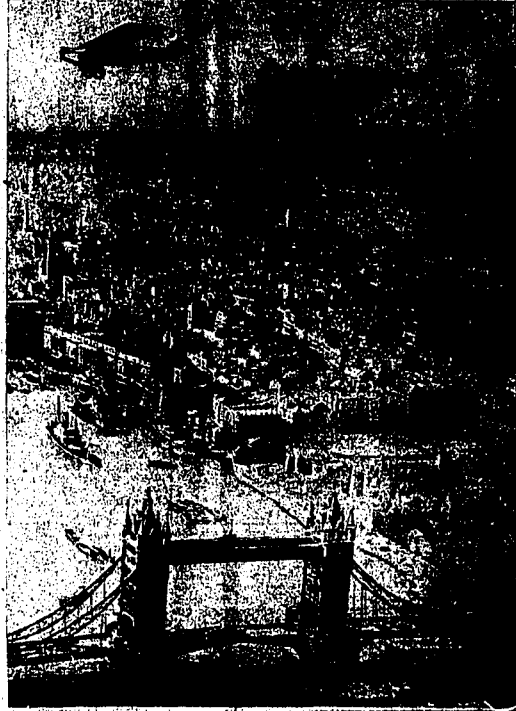

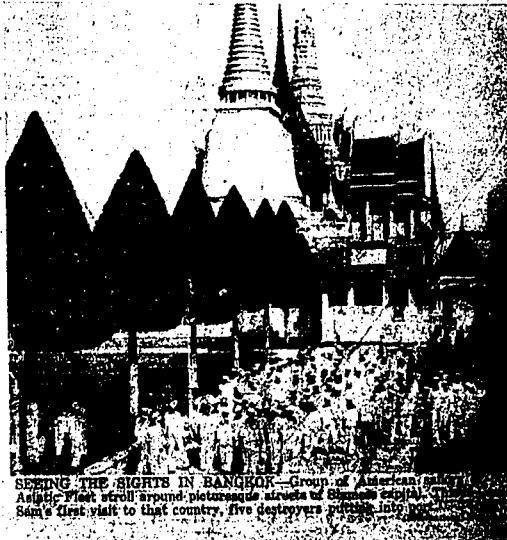

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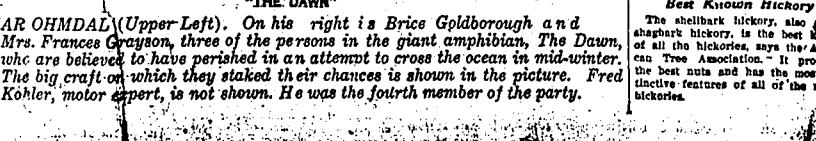

It was alleged that Brown opened an office in the court house to conduct a private certificate bureau for profit, and that in pursuance of this object, he closed one of the passageways and stairways leading by obstructing transaction of business, and that, apparently in collusion with Mr. Stewart, or his employes, the records of the bureau's office were being used for private gain.

#### Order is Short

The temporary injunction was brief in its terms. The principal prohibition it contained read: "That said S. Claude Stewart, his deputies, and agents be enjoined and restrained from working in connection with the said Charles H. Brown or any other person furnishing records and data in said assessor's office to assist such other person."

#### Order Too Broad

The contention of Stewart is that this injunction is too sweeping in its terms and that it might be construed to deprive him from receiving private persons access to the records or from furnishing data to which they might be entitled. Judge Ensign's term of office in Twin Falls ends today, and this matter will not be understood, he argued before Judge W. A. Babcock after he and the attorneys in the case had agreed on a date as far as the present auto certification bureau is concerned it will be decided by the court, though it may be extended temporarily, and probably, it is stated, only 1500 registration certificates have been issued so far and there are about 8000 motor vehicles in the county.


