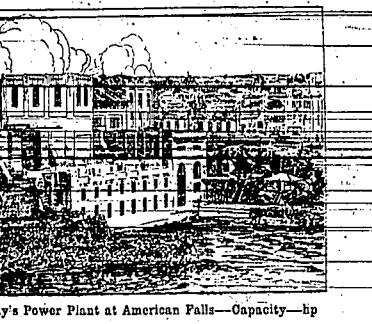

STANFORD'S ELEVEN WINS THRILLING GAME

Pittsburgh Goes Down in Defeat Before Furious Attack of Cardinals; 55,000 Fans Witness Brilliant Contest.

(By Associated Press) PASADENA, Cal., Jan. 2.—In a glorious finale to an up and down season, Stanford's Cardinals triumphed over the Pittsburgh Pirates in the annual Tournament of Roses game today, 7 to 0.

A colorful throng of 55,000 spectators saw the Cardinals' thrilling "comeback" in the third period after a heart-rending "break" had set the stage for the game. A 68-cent fumble by Wilton was picked up by Husan and the stocky Panther halfback rushed 10 yards to plant his front in Stanford's scoring drive.

Lash in Fury Lashed into fury by the sudden reverse, and after they had outplayed their rivals for two periods, the Cardinals drove everything into one great offensive. A 31-yard pass by Hoffman which set the offense in motion was followed by a 29-yard line play after line play, with Hoffman carrying the oval almost continually, for two thirds Stanford two yards from the goal.

REWARDS FOR WORKERS
 There has been recognition for inventors and captains of industry. There has been little or no recognition for the men in the ranks who have made possible the remarkable achievements of this era. They work along, undistinguished and unknown, in the great sacrifice of mass production which more and more obscures the worker's individuality.

The Harmon Foundation is going to try to remedy that. It will give awards to honor men in industry, consisting of two annual prizes, one of one thousand dollars and five hundred dollars and one hundred more for the industrial workers in the ranks. The foundation is invited to call attention to workmen considered "deserving of praise and recognition."

William E. Harmon of Boston, who established the foundation, suggests by way of illustration that the men who built Colonel Lindbergh's "Spirit of St. Louis" are, presumably deserving of such honor.

"The fact is," he says, "that there are hundreds of men and women in America who, by their invention and hard work and powers of meditation, are contributing daily to the life and well-being of America in a substantial way. They are worthy of our highest regard, which can be only partially expressed through monetary consideration."

NO MISTAKES
 "Don't you feel that you have made some mistakes?" a magazine writer inquired from Ford's surprising answer. "Never," was Ford's surprising answer. "I never made a mistake in my life."

Theosophists have borrowed it. Tremyson probably meant the same thing when he wrote that "men may rise on stepping-stones of their dead selves to higher things."

It is good New Year philosophy.

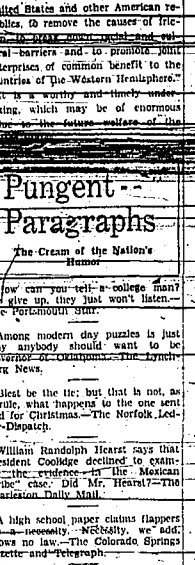
A GOOD-YEAR MISSION
 The Christmas spirit seems to be entering into American diplomacy to an unusual degree. "Good-will missions" are coming to be a common thing. The most ambitious of them all is to be undertaken soon by the President himself.

The occasion will be the sixth Pan-American Conference which opens at Havana, Cuba, on January 19. President Coolidge will leave for Havana on the nineteenth, crossing from New York in the week-end. With him will go Secretary of State Kellogg and other officials of the State Department, together with a delegation of distinguished men headed by Charles E. Hughes, Ambassador Morrow who has been prominently an exponent of good-will to Mexico for some time. A certain young man named Lindbergh, who has shown unusual ability in the fostering pleasant international relations, will be the Chicago Tribune's representative to the Chicago Tribune.

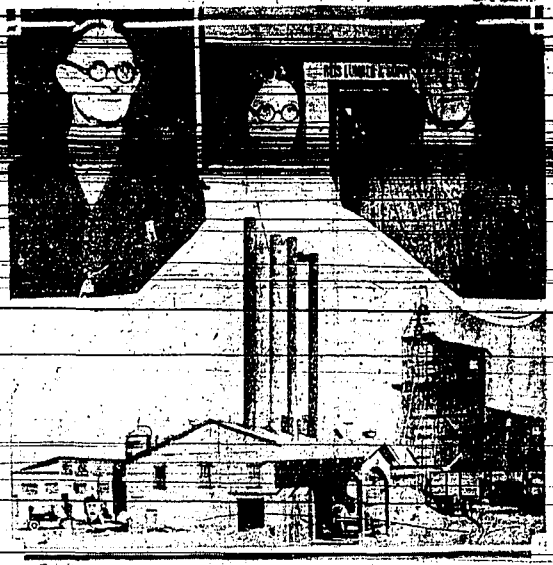

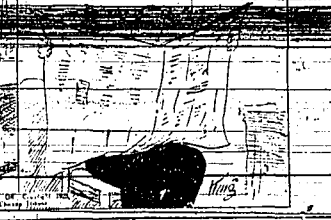

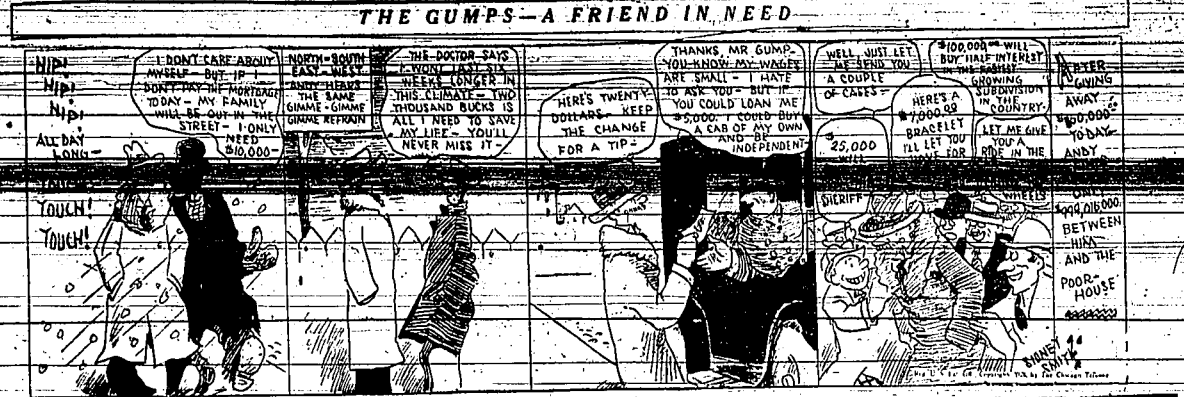
