1928 CONVENTION OF DEMOCRATIC PARTY TO BE HELD IN HOUSTON

Meeting Goes to Far South for First Time in History, 1000 Leaders of Bourbons at Capital Jackson Day Dinner.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—After declining to take their next convention to the South this year, for the first time in history, democratic leaders from all parts of the nation came together at the Jackson Day dinner designed to help to harmonize the differences that made for party disunity at the Madison Square Garden convention in 1924.

Houston, Texas, one of the smallest cities ever to entertain a national party gathering was chosen for the 1928 convention after a five-ballot contest with San Francisco, Chicago and New York. The democratic national committee only one of the central figures of the Madison Square Garden battle of William O. Weaver, attended the dinner tonight, but the other, Governor Alfred Smith, New York, sent a message expressing his regret at being absent and urging the party to unanimity.

No References to Past Neither Meadon, who has voluntarily retired from the political arena, nor Smith had any reference in prepared statements to past differences. Instead each sounded a rallying cry for the party—way to the White House.

Other prominent states of harmony in efforts aside from the addresses at the dinner. During the day friends of Governor Smith in the national committee decided to defer until convention time—June 26—their plans to change the system of selecting delegates. It was believed that they would be elected by the committee itself and not the party nominees for president.

Richard Cantillon, associated with Hickman in the kidnaping, announced today that he would ask for a change of venue, to be held in the town of Angeles county are biased and prejudiced against the defendant.

Cantillon said that he would go into court tomorrow with his application to transfer Hickman's trial to another jurisdiction. Attaches of the district attorney in Angeles county, where the indicted slayer is confined, expressed the opinion that the cantillon will be granted his request to have the trial held elsewhere. This date set for it is January 25.

Hickman started his day in jail with a haggard visage, the result of the night's rest. He has spent the last two days in the jail.

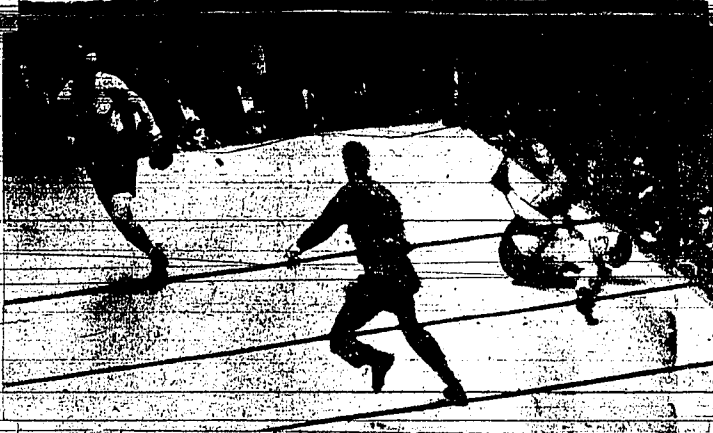
