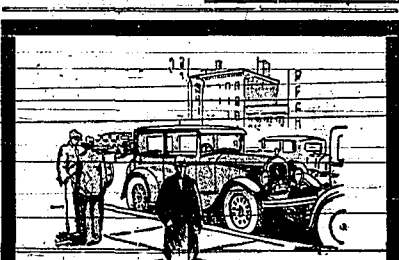

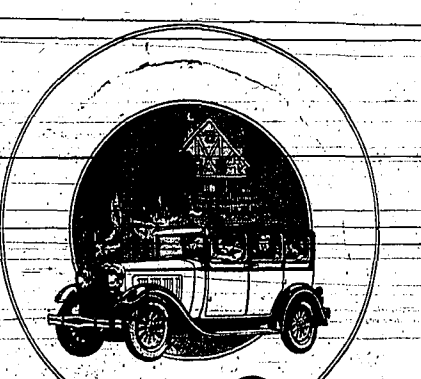

### RED CROSS WORKERS OF DISTRICT TO MEET HERE

A conference of home service workers of eight chapters of the American Red Cross in this district is to be held in Twin Falls on Tuesday, January 16. It was announced last evening by the chairman of the Twin Falls chapter.

The conference here is to be one of a series of similar meetings to be held throughout the state. Objective of these meetings, which were suggested by Charles H. Hudson of the Boise regional office of the Veterans bureau, is to bring about a better understanding of the common problems of the Red Cross chapters and the Veterans bureau.

Delegates to the Twin Falls conference will assemble at a luncheon meeting at the Park hotel, and will continue the discussion as late as may be necessary throughout the afternoon.

Chapters to participate in this conference are those of Blaine, Cassia, Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln and Miniwala counties, and Rubi and Twin Falls.

### SALESMAN'S CAR UPSETS IN SNOWDRIFT ON ROAD

### INVESTIGATION OF NEEDS FIRST STEP IN SOLUTION OF SCHOOL HOUSING PROBLEM

An investigation to determine the necessity for additional housing for pupils of Twin Falls school district is being made by the school board.

The suggestion, it is stated, was presented in response to invitation extended by the board in the course of recent consideration of the district's housing problem. Herein Mr. O'Hama's letter, which was made public last evening, with consent of members of the board.

"I have noticed from the papers some discussion of the question as to additional housing to take care of the school children in independent school District number 1. It seems to me that this could best be handled in an independent manner by the board, by appointing a committee of say 15 members, selected from different parts and portions of the district and representing all of the various school districts to meet and make an examination of the following questions:

1. Of the necessity for additional housing at this time and taking into consideration the necessity of the district for the next five or six years.

2. If this committee should determine that additional housing is necessary, let it then make recommendations as to the location of such additional buildings or buildings to take care of the present demands and the demands that might arise upon the district for the next six or seven years.

A report from a committee of this character would greatly aid the school board the members of which have not the time to analyze the subject in detail and completely as may be necessary in order to arrive at the proper solution. In addition to this, the recommendations of a committee would greatly aid and assist in submitting the matter to the voters for consideration and would carry great weight with it.

"I wish it distinctly understood at this time that in making these suggestions to the board, that it is in the slightest degree any member of the board or the board as a whole, but simply to offer a suggestion that may help and I trust the members of the board will consider it in the light that I have intended it."

### DRIVER FINED AS RESULT OF STRIKING SCHOOLBOY

As a result of running down a school boy as he was dismounting from a school bus, J. L. Rupp, employe of the Casey-Parker Hardware company, has been arrested to appear next court evening on a charge of passing a school bus while passengers were leaving the vehicle.

Following the defendant's plea of guilty, he was fined \$10 and costs by Probate Judge C. A. Bailey.

David Troothman, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Troothman had returned to his home about two miles northwest of Twin Falls on one of the city school buses and, dismounting from the machine, had started to cross the highway when he was struck down by the machine driven by the defendant. The boy is recovering from the injuries received in the accident.

**CHERRIE TO TELL OF WONDERS OF HIGH AND**

Lecturer Will Describe Route Followed by Roosevelts and Marco Polo, Picture Squares

The illustrious expedition to central Asia, which will be described here in the lecture to be delivered January 24 by George K. Cherrie, one of the four members of the party, completed its first American legions to follow the path taken by Marco Polo, the famous world hiker, whose descriptions inspired Columbus to seek a shorter route to India with resultant discovery of America.

Verifying Marco The expedition undertaken to verify the accounts of the ancient globe trotter consisted of the Roosevelt brothers, Theodore and Kermit, Supt. C. C. Cutting and Mr. Cherrie. They brought back numerous slides and motion pictures showing the scenery in the great Asiatic region. It is said that the beauty of the Himalayas, higher description, an eloquent and vivid world and vivid picture of them was given in Twin Falls last year by Bishop H. Lester Smith of Helena, in a lecture at the Methodist church, was declared by Bishop Smith himself to be quite inadequate. They will be shown in pictures in connection with the lecture.

Among the Balisevik Mr. Cherrie, besides being one of the members of the Roosevelt party, went on his own account into Soviet Russia and by request is combining the two lectures, giving first the lecture on the expedition to central Asia. He was one of the party selected to accompany his exploring party in South America, into which country he had made no less than 30 trips, but these are beyond the purview of the lecture here.

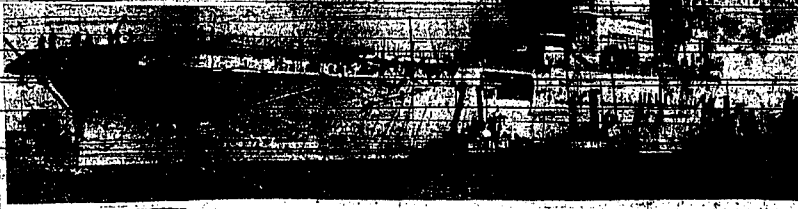

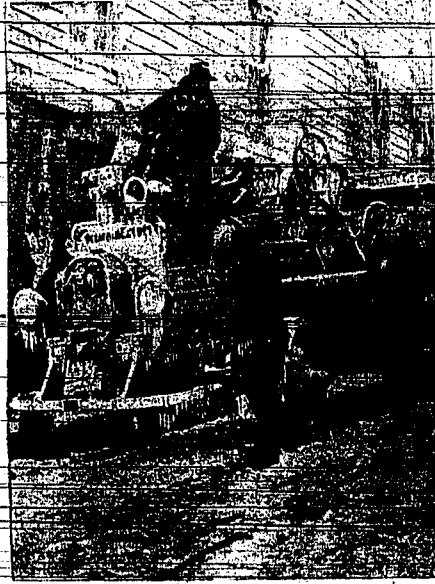
