SUSPECT IN MURDER BY PHOENIX POLICE

Word That Prisoner in Arizona Might Be "Blacky" Miller Gets to Sheriff-Pace Through J. E. Leighton of Twin Falls.

(Special to The News) BURLEY, Jan. 24 (AP)—A man believed to be "Blacky" Miller, wanted in connection with the murder of John J. Terry, Butley taxid driver, last December 27, is a prisoner at Phoenix, Arizona, according to advice received by Sheriff P. D. Pace. The sheriff has wired to Phoenix for additional information but had not received a reply as this writing.

Twin Falls Man Claims Reward Word that the Phoenix prisoner might be the hunted man, came to Sheriff Pace through Leighton, chief of police who advised that Twin Falls citizen just returned from Arizona had brought back information that Miller was in Phoenix, Arizona, and offered for apprehension and conviction of Terry's slayer. The Arizona prisoner, it was stated, had arrived in Phoenix only a few days ago, and had been sentenced for gambling on some other misdemeanor. Investigation in Twin Falls when Miller was employed for some time as a cafe dishwasher, said to have indicated that Miller had a habit of coming to Phoenix.

Miller, unidentified passenger, is believed to have been the mysterious passenger with whom Terry disappeared. Terry was found four days later on the roadside near a hole in the ground through which he had been shot through the back of the head.

FRED HOYT'S PLANE IS COMPLETE WRECK

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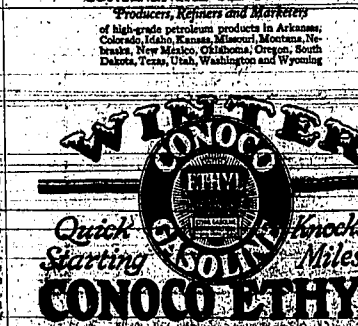

IDAHO LOADS ONE CART OF FIVE CARS OF POTATOES MOVED

Average 120 Cars Per Day Shipping Point Demand for Off-Grade Stock Increases

IDAHO FALLS, Jan. 24.—Out of every five cars of potatoes that were shipped on the Snake river flats last week, one car was loaded in Idaho. The daily shipments from the state averaged 120 cars per day—just one less per day than during the preceding week. The average for the same week a year ago. The only state to exceed Idaho in volume was California, which moved about 150 cars per day, states the weekly potato market review issued by Wendell Cullum, market news correspondent for the department of agriculture at Idaho Falls.

The total Idaho shipments for the season now amount to 12,000 cars, and have nearly passed the corresponding figures of last season. It should be remembered however, that while final shipments last season were only a little more than 17,000 cars, the potato stocks in the state were up much earlier than usual. Two years ago final shipments amounted to over 15,000 cars, and the present shipments are 1,600 cars ahead of the movement at this date two years ago. It is even thought there may be between 10,000 and 11,000 cars yet to ship this season. The increase over the movement of the previous year would not be as great as indicated by a comparison with last season alone.

Demand for Off-Grade Potatoes

The demand at Idaho shipping points has increased for No. 2 and No. 3 and partly graded stock, and there has been a slight narrowing of the margin between No. 1's and off-grades in some sections. This condition, dealers and shippers point out, is a sign that the market is becoming more liquid, but rather than the market for No. 1's being injured by the competition of the increased amount of partly graded stock which is being shipped.

Loaded cars of U. S. No. 1's are being sold at 85c, and some of medium size or quality at 75c. No. 2's have held firm at 45c, with the average of 45c, while combination grades ranged 55c to 60c and a few best as high as 65c. In packing the combination grades have been sorted out, which have been selling around 1.25. On Rurusa, a few sales of No. 1's have been made at 75c, while partly graded plain-bag stock was in good demand at 65c to 70c.

The prices to growers have been mostly 55c to 60c for bulk Russets, U. S. No. 1's, and the warehouse for Rurusa, the growers have received 65c for sacked U. S. No. 1's, and about a dime lower for the average run of plain-bag stock.

Prices Accelerate Movement

Following the recent increase in prices on Russets in Oregon, 150 Idaho arrivals there jumped to 30 cars per day last week, and the market dropped back a little. Quotations for U. S. No. 1's are 1.10 to 1.15 for U. S. No. 1's, and 1.15 to 1.20 for Wisconsin Round Whites. The last week's market for Idaho potatoes, with closing quotations on Idaho stock at \$1.35 to \$1.40. The market for Idaho potatoes during the week were 85 cars to Southern California, and 22 to Northern California, and a total of 107 cars to the coast markets, which was slightly less than the usual 20 per cent of the movement.

Distribution of Idaho potatoes throughout the south and east has been excellent during the past few weeks. Shipments are reported daily to practically all of the southern states and through most of the eastern territory, in addition to the large volume which moves through the western coast markets to eastern points. Up to the first of the year, shipments had been reported to 43 states and to Mexico and Cuba.

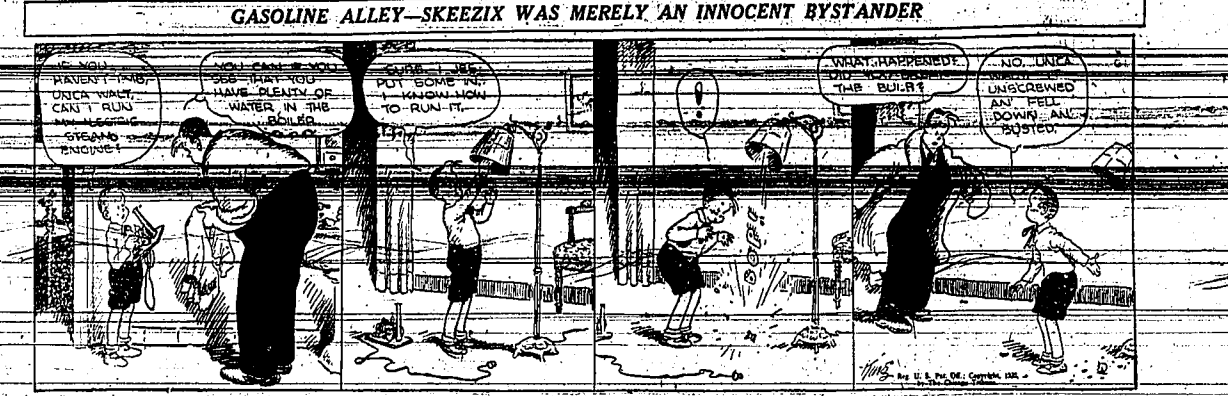

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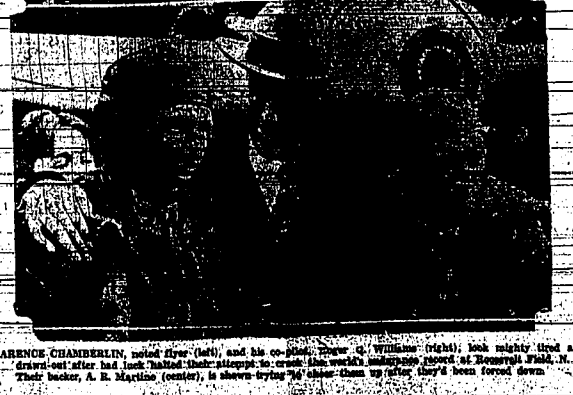

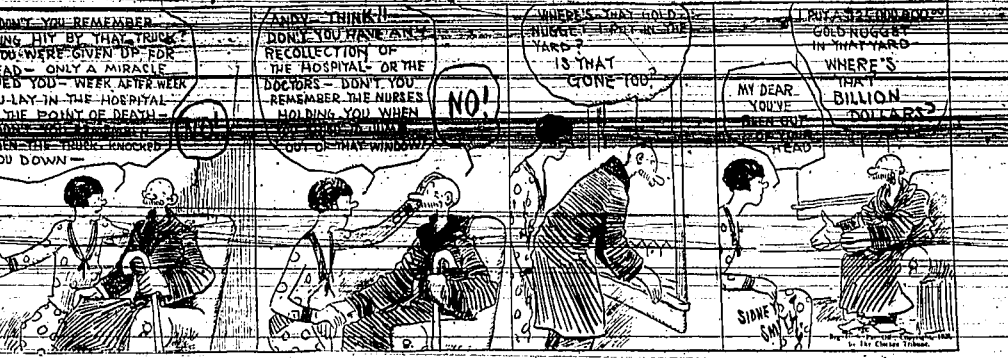
