DEPOSITIONS OF BOY  
CONFIRMED COURT  
HICKMAN TRIAL

Some of Slayer's Associates in High School Think Killer Acted "Peculiar" and "Not Consistent" During Last Years.

(By The Associated Press) LOS ANGELES, Jan. 31.—An array of 20 depositions was paraded through the sandy trial of William Edward Hickman today by defense attorneys, who offered testimony that he was "not consistent" as the judgment of youths in their teens, as to the mental condition of his schoolmate on trial for kidnaping and murdering Marian Parker.

While some of Hickman's Kansas City schoolmates thought he acted "peculiar" and "not consistent" during his senior high school years, others believed him upset, disturbed and more so from falling in love with a girl named Helen, who did not believe him when he said he had been intimate with a girl friend. Under the cross-examination of the state's attorney, James Castello, several had admitted they did not believe Hickman was being insane until after Marian Parker was kidnaped and killed, and one as late as September "had no doubt" of his sanity or of "his great change," his being or not.

Mother's Condition Described  
Mrs. Eva Hickman, the defendant's mother, was disclosed by Arkansas physicians' reports and depositions. Her condition was described as "bordering on insanity" and "bordering on insanity."

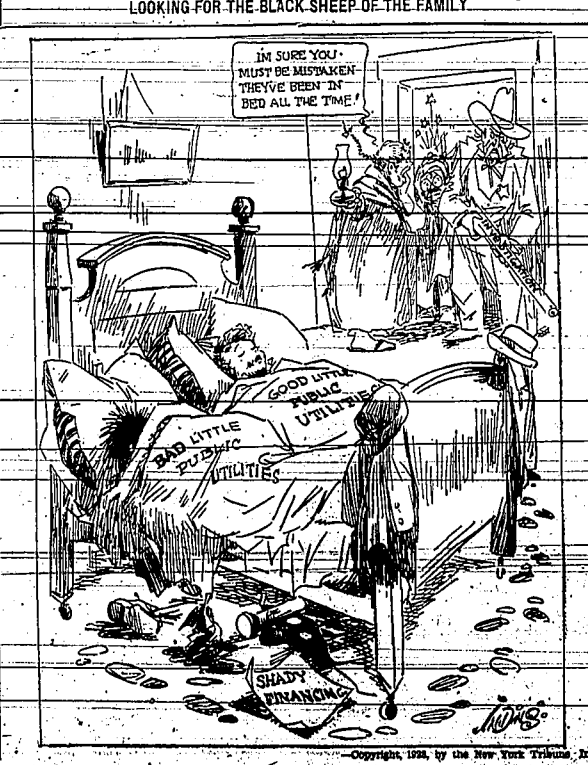

Members at Annual Meeting Approve Program of Hatching Improvement and Vote for Two Banquets Each Year.

Southern Idaho Fish and Game association members, at an enthusiastic and well attended annual meeting last evening in the main rooms here, reviewed with approval the past year's record of achievement, endorsed program for permanent improvement of fish hatcheries and rearing ponds here, elected officers for the coming year and voted to hold a second banquet meeting each year.

H. C. Edmunds, retiring secretary, was unanimously elected president of the association to succeed Alvin Harbour, retiring after two years' service. Other officers were elected as follows: President, R. E. Eggen; Vice President, R. E. Eggen; Secretary, R. E. Eggen; Treasurer, H. R. Grant; Twin Falls directors, H. L. Shill, W. L. Bowman, and C. J. Wilson of Jerome and Alvin Harbour of Twin Falls. Holdover members: W. L. Bowman, R. E. Eggen, Thompson and W. L. Knight of Twin Falls.

**Prize for Big Fish**  
The association's second banquet meeting for the year it was decided to be held some time soon after the opening of the fishing season, next May 1st, and tendance to be at the regular annual banquet meeting for which arrangements will be made by the association's officers. ### GOES TO FINAL REST

Hugh Ambrose Jennings, Picturesque Diamond Leader Is Summoned Beyond in E.A.S.

Scranton, Pa. (Wednesday Morning News) Feb. 1 (AP)—Hugh Jennings, noted baseball player, died at 1:15 o'clock this morning.

Jennings was one of the foremost figures in America's greatest outdoor game. For three years in succession he led the Detroit Tigers to pennants in 1906, 1907 and 1908.

He was a factor in the success of the team in 1921, 1922, 1923 and 1924. In 1925 he was in charge of the club during the long period in which the team was confined to its home with injuries.

Jennings, a graduate of Cornell, found time between baseball campaigns to obtain an education and master the law. During the winter months he conducted a law practice in Scranton, Pennsylvania.
