FEEDING POLICEMAN INTO HIS HANDS

Robert W. Stewart Obtains Writ From Supreme Court to Answer for Defiance of Senate Committee; Out on Bond.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—The judicial arm of the government reached out today to remove Robert W. Stewart, outstanding Teapot Dome witness, from immediate jeopardy by continuing his confinement.

Stewart was imprisoned by Justice Bailey, the chairman of the board of the Federal Reserve Bank, after he was taken from the custody of the assistant sergeant-at-arms of the senate.

The writ was obtained 15 minutes before the senate convened with galleries and floors jammed and with all arrangements made for receiving and detaining Stewart in the senate chamber.

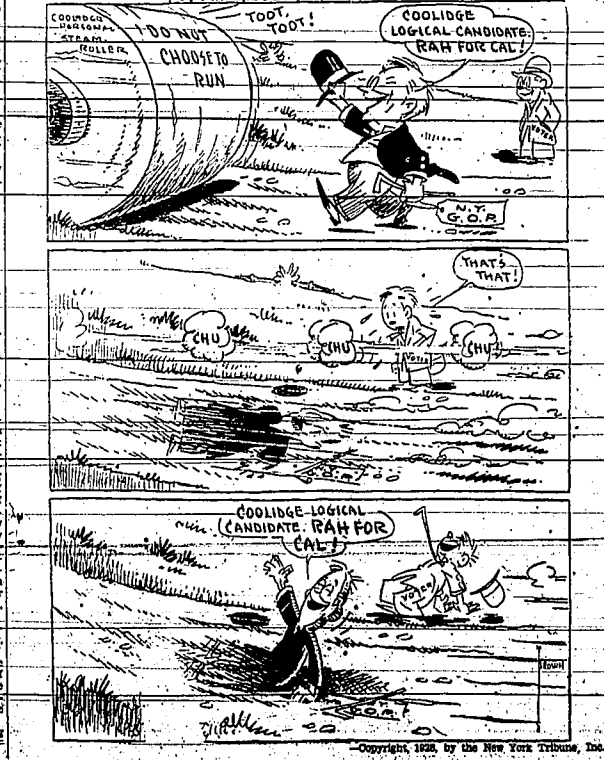

"In order that anyone interested in baseball will not be overlooked we are taking this method of reaching them before all those interested in baseball for Twin Falls. 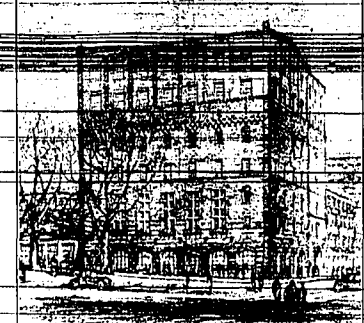

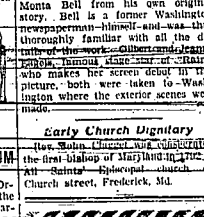

### APPROPRIATION FOR WAR MEMORIAL GETS POSITION IN BUDGET

Tentative Grant of \$1000 for Structure to Commemorate World War Dead.

Twin Falls county's first county budget will include a tentative appropriation of \$1000 for construction of a memorial to the county who sacrificed their lives in the World War.

This was the decision given yesterday by Twin Falls county commissioners to members of a delegation which submitted formal application for inclusion of the memorial appropriation in the budget.

Members of the delegation included R. P. Parry, chairman of the Win. Falls American Legion post's memorial committee; Major George C. Halley and Captain J. L. Hodgkin. They stated that they had been given a grant of support for the request in all counties of the county.

Problem of Limitations. The commissioners individually expressed approval of the manner of procedure in making application for the appropriation, and pointed out that the principal problem to be solved was one of trimming the budget to the limitations of the county's main income—taxes, which was expressed in the budget.

Definite plans for the construction of a memorial were not outlined by members of the delegation. Under state law adopted in 1921, each county is authorized to appropriate \$1000 for a county memorial.

Plans were specified for the construction of a memorial to be agreed upon by the county commissioners and the county commissioners of American Legion posts of the county.

Public to Voice Views. The county budget, which is to be compiled this year under terms of a new legislative act, is to be made up by the county commissioners out of estimates to be submitted by all county officials and employees not later than next February 15.

The budget, when completed by the commissioners, is to be submitted to the general public at a hearing to be held on April 1. In compilation of the budget the commissioners are to be assisted by advisory committees named by the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce on request of the county board. Members of the advisory committee are W. H. Turner, Kimberly T. McConner, Twin Falls, and Guy H. Shearer, Piler.

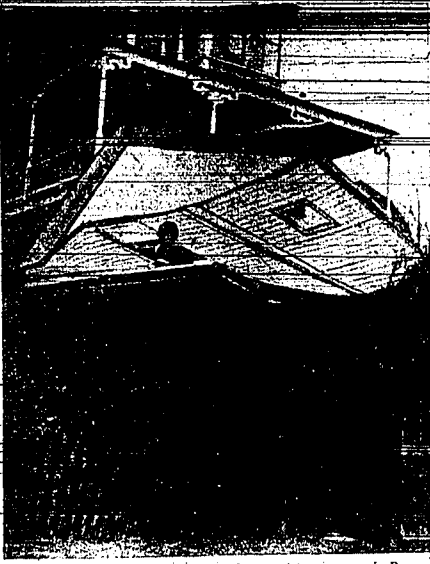

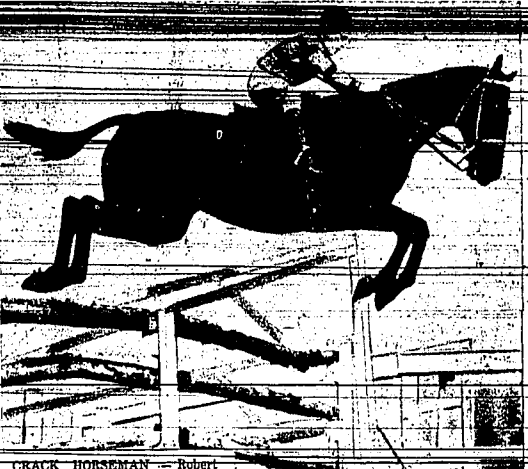

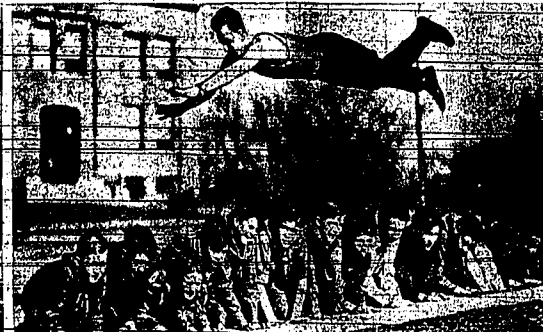
