

OGDEN RATE HEARING

UPCOMING IMPORTANT FOR SOUTHERN TRAIL

Twin Falls Delegation Back From Junction City Inquiry

Secretary of Chamber of Commerce Explains Controversy.

The delegation which returned from the freight rate hearing in Ogden, Saturday morning, has reported that the hearing, held by H. J. Benoit, and Newell S. Wright, report that the hearing which was held in Ogden, Idaho, on the freight rates of all southern Idaho growers and shippers, not only of grain, but of all other farm products.

In discussing the hearing Mr. Wright, secretary of the Twin Falls chamber of commerce, reports the following: "Up all the time the Rogers-Wells railroad was put into operation, Twin Falls was not situated geographically with relation to railroad transportation as to be at special handicaps and was practically excluded from northern California markets because of the circuitous route via Ogden and the freight rates which were levied on a decided handicap to our community.

The first real significant adjustment on farm products was obtained when the San Francisco chamber of commerce and San Francisco grain buyers requested and received a rate on grain and mill products of 45 cents which is 1 cent higher than the rate from Twin Falls to Portland.

At the hearing the Ogden grain interests were endeavoring to have the rate from Twin Falls to Ogden to San Francisco, though over 300 miles further, made the same as the rate from Twin Falls via Rogers to San Francisco. The Twin Falls delegation made the request for lowering this rate. Our Twin Falls delegation has been successful in having the rate granted to Ogden unless a similar reduction was made on the present rate of 45 cents via Rogers.

The possibility of using the legal method of transferring grain on shipping trains would be a decided advantage to mills to obtain an advantage of as much as 14 cents a barrel on flour or 5 cents on a bushel on wheat shipped to Ogden. The rate on the route was made the same as requested by the Utah people via either the Ogden or Rogers route. One such difference could have been, but one effect, namely that the price of the wheat to us just our Twin Falls.

BODY OF HERO AT SEA GOES TO WASHINGTON

Remains of Colonel Clift C. Hearn Will Be Laid at Last Rest in Arlington Cemetery.

ATLANTA, Ga., Feb. 13 (AP)—The body of Colonel Clift C. Hearn, retired army officer, and a hero of the rescue of the crew of the steamship Anthonie in January, 1926, was sent to Washington, where he will be buried in Arlington national cemetery. Colonel Hearn died at his home here Saturday night.

Through his knowledge of propellants, he was credited with having made possible the saving of the officers and men of the Anthonie, on which he was a passenger. The strike on Hearn's vessel was received by the Roosevelt and the disabled craft was holed and finally located by the Roosevelt which, however, was forced to stand by helplessly for three days in the face of a terrific storm. Studying the situation, Colonel Hearn decided that a line should be shot to the deck of the foundering ship by firing a pointed metal nose-to-ice-rope-and-using-a-powderful spring to assist the line.

IDAHO REPUBLICANS AS 1928 CANDIDATE

Pocatello and Kellogg Are Convention Cities; Delegates Will Go to Kansas City Instructed; Resolutions Pass.

BOISE, Feb. 13 (AP)—Idaho Republicans, acting through their state central committee, today offered Idaho's own Senator William E. Borah, as the Republican candidate for president. This action was taken after the state central committee had unanimously announced as a presidential candidate for 1928.

Other resolutions passed by the state central committee endorsed the local national administration, the Baldwin state administration, and the work of Idaho's congressional delegation. Representatives of southwestern Idaho counties at a special meeting passed the honor of Governor Hildreth for re-election.

Pocatello was selected as the delegate convention city and Kellogg was made the convention city and the nomination of state and congressional tickets was taken care of by the Pocatello delegate convention at which the 11 Idaho delegates to the national Republican convention in Kansas City will be elected.

Date for the nomination convention, August 28, is fixed by statute. Delegates to the state meeting will be named by county central committees and a representation will be on the same basis as that fixed for the state nominating convention. Both.

HEADS OF LARGE ITALIAN FAMILIES TO GET PENSION

Financial Burden Lifted From Shoulders of Premier Mussolini; Fascist to Pay Instead.

ROME, Feb. 13 (AP)—The financial burden of maintaining the heads of large families will be lifted from the shoulders of Premier Mussolini, who heretofore has given a treaty of his own money for such purposes. The Fascist state plans to take over such payments on a fixed scale.

Secretary General Turati, in a circular to the party leaders, sets forth a scheme for the payment to fathers of families of seven children, and something additional to the fathers of families of 10 children. The plan is still incomplete, but it is known that such a plan will have to contribute through a special tax, which money will be used by the government for adding mothers and the newborn.

"13" Proves to Be Lucky Number for COLONEL LINDBERGH

Arrives in Missouri Metropolitan Area Due to Fog and Rain; Finishes 9000-Mile Trip; Guest of City.

ST. LOUIS, Feb. 13 (AP)—Flying through fog and rain, Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh completed a 10,000-mile non-stop flight from Havana, Cuba, by landing at Lambert-St. Louis field at 5:01 p. m. today. He was in the air 15 hours and 35 minutes.

His approach to the fifth division headquarters, located at the St. Louis airport, was covered about 9000 miles on a circuitous route and had visited 15 national airports in Central and South America and the West Indies.

Approximately 700 persons, including members of the fifth division staff, were on hand to greet the aviator. Colonel Lindbergh is a member of the St. Louis club and is the guest of all St. Louis in an aerial exhibition on the Mississippi river front tomorrow afternoon.

His approach to the field was from the west at 4:56 p. m. Passing to the southwest, the Spirit of St. Louis, an airplane of approximately 1000 lbs. of weight, was scanning the field to make sure no fog was in the way.

When Lindbergh got out of the plane there was back-slapping and a chorus of greetings as President Harold M. Blaney of the chamber of commerce.

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CALIFORNIAN SEEKS FUND FOR COAST-ROAD NETWORK

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (AP)—A bill proposing the establishment of a Pacific coast national highway system which would provide three trunk lines, with laterals along the Pacific coast from Canada to Mexico, was introduced today by Representative Crall, Republican, California. It asked an appropriation of \$200,000 for the preparation of plans and other appropriations, as might be necessary, to build the highways.

The roads would form a system of motor truck highways, to meet the transport requirements of heavy commodities, and to meet the needs of the coast in time of war. They would extend through the states of California, Oregon and Washington.

RICHMOND, Va., Feb. 13 (AP)—For the first time in its history, the lower branch of the Virginia general assembly today adjourned to honor the memory of Abraham Lincoln.

Lindsay Gordon, who introduced the resolution calling for adjournment, in a eulogy of Lincoln said that "every southern gentleman now agrees with Lincoln on the slavery question" and that his death at the hands of a "southern traitor" was a severe blow to the South.

LADY ASTOR EXTOLS CIVIL WAR PRESIDENT

Famous English Woman Discusses Anglo-American Relations at Dinner in London.

LONDON, Feb. 13 (AP)—Viscountess Astor, extolling Abraham Lincoln at a birthday luncheon honoring the American Civil War president, today discussed Anglo-American relations and extolled the "100 per cent citizen" as a menace to international unity. She regarded Lincoln not as the typical American, but the embodiment of the best qualities of the citizens of all countries. His Virginia parentage she said, ultimately, probably explained Lincoln's greatness.

Lady Astor urged unity of feeling between the United States and Great Britain and expressed the conviction that they would be best drawn together by living up to their highest ideals.

"It is the 100 per cent American and the 100 per cent Englishman," she went on, "I think 100 per cent citizens ought to be locked up. They are a danger to the world."

She advised her hearers not to tremble at the "100 per cent American" but to "put him and put him in his place."



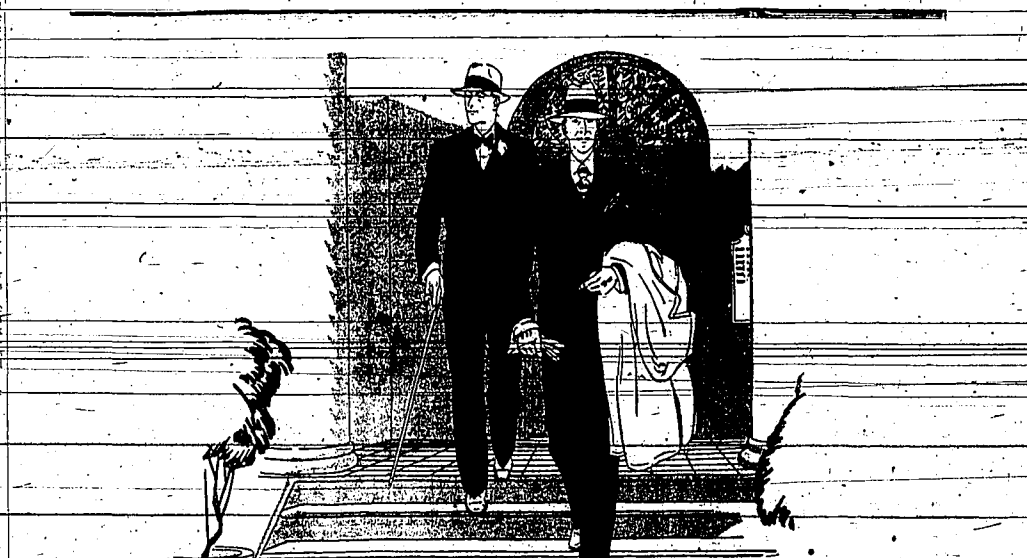

WHEAT HOLDS STEADY WITH CORN CLIMBING TO NEW HIGH LEVELS

World Market Continues Firm

Hemispheric

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13—A sharp advance in corn prices in the face of continued heavy receipts—checked the grain market during the week ending February 11. According to the Weekly Grain Market Review of the United States Bureau of Agricultural Economics, the domestic wheat market was weakened slightly by general rains in the central and western states.

While shipments of wheat from Australia have totaled around 1,000,000 bushels during the past few weeks, arrivals of the European market and prices at Liverpool are holding firm. At the same time, the market for corn quotations were practically the same as a week ago for both the March and May deliveries. Prices for foreign wheat delivered Liverpool were not materially changed from a week ago.

General rains over the west were a factor in the decline in wheat demand. Demand weakened the hard winter wheat market and caused a sharp decline in prices early in the week. A relatively high price for soft winter wheat with continued active buying by mills caused an advance later in the week. The price of soft winter wheat reached new higher prices on crop at several of the markets influenced by a relatively light supply and an active demand from southern mills which were replenishing depleted stocks.

Trade reports indicate considerable winter injury in Ohio and Indiana which was also a strengthening factor in tributary markets. The demand for spring wheat was less active and premiums for cash grain were lower particularly for light weight high protein lots. Prices for soft winter wheat No. 1 dark northern sold at the close of the week at Minneapolis at 90 to 14 cents over the market which closed February 10 at \$1.25.

The decline in prices of high protein spring wheat is due to a narrowing of the difference between the domestic and Canadian cash prices. No. 1 northern-Manitoba closed February 10 at Winnipeg at \$1.40 which would compare a general way with high protein types of No. 1 Montana hard spring wheat at \$1.40 and No. 1 Minnesota at \$1.64 to \$1.70.

Premiums on durum wheat were about unchanged. Milling active buyers of good color high protein grain. Best premiums on No. 1 amber and No. 1 mixed were about 20 cents

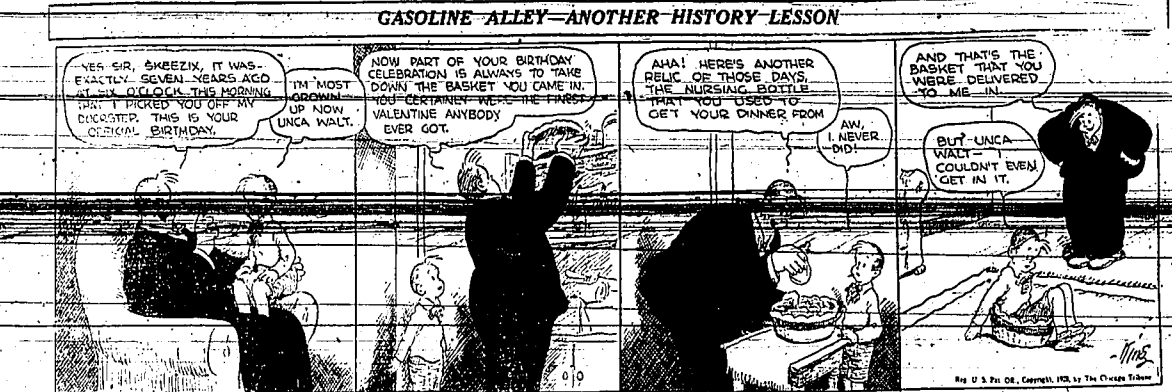

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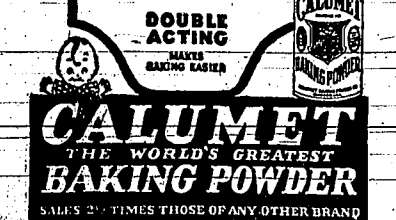

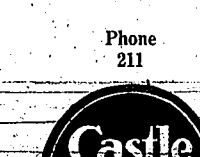
