FORMER GOVERNOR OF INDIANA FIGHTS AGAINST ED. JACKSON

State Calls Ex-Chief Executive to Help in Convicting Official on Charge of Bribery; Tells of \$10,000 Offer.

(By The Associated Press) INDIANAPOLIS, Feb. 15.—Warren T. McCray, former governor of Indiana, who recently was paroled from prison, today was called upon by the state to help convict the present governor, Ed Jackson, on a charge of bribery. McCray testified before a grand jury today regarding the appointment of a prosecuting attorney for Marion county, which Indiana is the county seat, but that he refused.

McCray Appears Feebly
McCray, the last witness of the day, appeared feeble for his 63 years and was helped to the witness stand by a court attendant. After testifying that Fred B. Robinson, his former political opponent as agent for a group of firms in which \$10,000 was offered for the purchase of a license to launch into a description of the vast made by Jackson's short time as governor had been turned down, Jackson, then secretary of state, McCray testified, came into the executive offices and talked with him about that proposition. 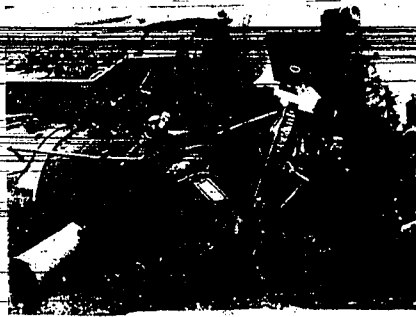

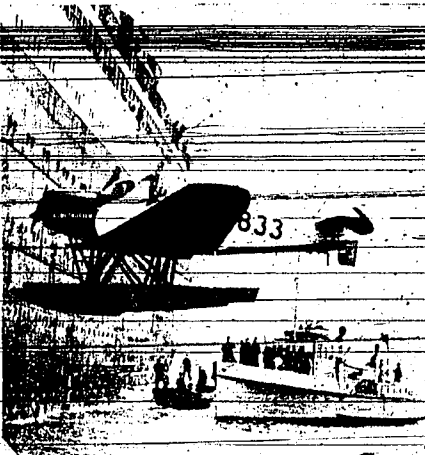
