**FRENCH WOMEN NOT TO BE DRAFTED FOR SERVICE OF MATION**

**Proposal Ator Bringing in Considerable Gallant Oratory; Painleve Is Advocate.**

PARIS, Feb. 16. (AP)—The French senate today rejected a bill which would have permitted the draft of French women for service of the state in time of war.

The proposal to mobilize women in time of war was part of the general reorganization bill which has been before parliament for almost a year. The chamber has already approved the measure by a vote of 500 to 31.

There were no objections at the time to this chapter of the army reorganization bill, and in the final vote only communists opposed the measure.

Minister of War Painleve defended the measure the best he could when it reached the senate this afternoon and the senators, many of them brand and bewitched, some of their fathers and some of their grandfathers were against the measure.

The country will never accept the forced conscription of women, said Senator de Montigny, every father of a family will energetically repulse the drafting of women.

Senator Appellard said the senator was warmly applauded as he took his seat and the article amended the bill to read "all French of the masculine sex" shall be liable to mobilization in time of war.

The scheme of the war department under the amendment bill did not mean that conscription would be extended to bear arms in case of war, but that their main role would be to replace their husbands in the place of clerks in industrial and in all sorts of administrative departments.

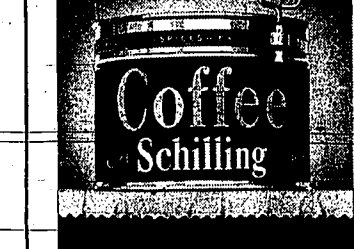

## RUPERT QUINTETS WILL PLAY GOODING'S SQUAD

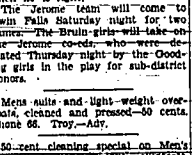
