TWIN FALLS SQUADS DIVIDE TWO GAMES WITH TIGER TEAMS

Bruin Girls Lose to Jerome Coeds, 17 to 19, White Boys Run Away With 30 to 11 Victory.

The Twin Falls basketball teams split two games with Jerome in the North Side city last night. The Bruin girls lost to the Tiger Co-eds, 17 to 19, while the Bruin boys romped away with a 30 to 11 victory. In spite of the best police there was a large crowd at the game.

The Bruin boys were going good last night. They took the lead in the first few minutes of play and were never threatened. The Tigers failed to score in the first quarter while the Bruins were piling up 10 counters for this period. The Bruin offense was working nicely throughout the game and the Bruins displayed more speed on the floor than in previous games.

Tiger Come Back The Tigers came back in the second quarter to outscore the Bruins, gaining two baskets to one for Twin Falls. The Bruins were using a set play offensive with the defense tight and the scoring was meager in this period. The Tiger stars were both teams opening up with the game moving at top speed. The Tigers made their last bid for the game in this period when they scored two long ones in rapid succession. The Bruins, however, were not idle and managed to gather four baskets in this quarter.

The last period was all for the Bruins who adopted stalling tactics but when the Jerome defense came out, the Bruin broke through to loop a basket in almost every try. The Tigers got but one point in this quarter, a foul which Bird converted. For the Bruins, Kempton was high point center, with 13 counters, which was second with Brown. The Bruins scattered 23 passes, three lads did the bulk of the work for the Bruins, they were playing the floor in most of all of these stalling their shots with regularity. No one did some nice work at guard. No one for the Tigers, Bird was high man with five counters and Warsinger linger second with three. These two lads both did nice work on the floor and break down baskets. Warsinger led at the half, 11 to 3, and increased it in the third period while the Bruins were not able to close the gap. ALBION TAKES REVENGE ON SALT LAKE QUINLET

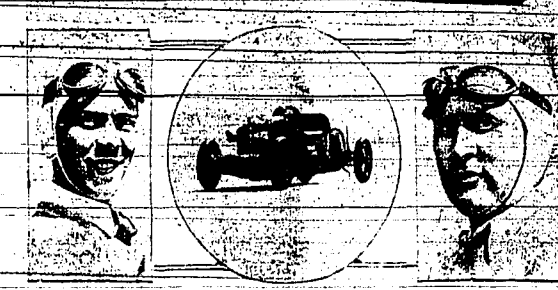
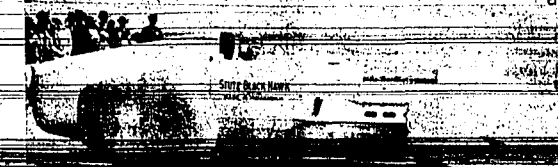

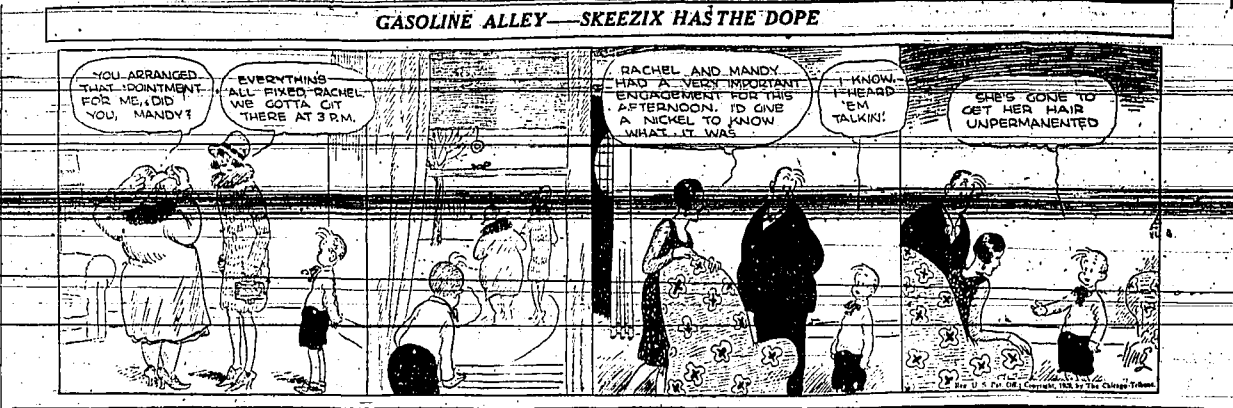
